In the meantime, have a "genealogically" great summer!





1962 SESQUICENTENNIAL EDITIONS OF THE BAPTIST MESSAGE (Continued from Vol. 5 No. 1)

Edition No. 5. 1925-1962 PERIOD OF SPECTACULAR BAPTIST GROWTH:

The Roaring Twenties was an era of extremes; of depression and plenty, of extraordinary piety and reckless abandon. In Baptist life the decade was especially significant because the Cooperative Program was started in 1925.

As the Roaring Twenties drew to a close Louisiana Baptists numbered 130,500 in 785 churches. Total gifts to missions in 1929 amounted to a record \$246,805, proving the value of the Cooperative Program before the economic depression set in.

By 1938 the economy was improving and the Convention reported that more than \$200,000 had been received from the churches.

While Baptists suffered economically during the Thirties, they enjoyed a substantial increase in membership: up to 198,000 in 1940 from 134,000 at the beginning of the decade. A spirit of confidence was being felt as the decade of struggle grew to a close.

Like the cloud of the atomic bomb that was introduced in this decade, Louisiana Baptist work mushroomed (The Forties). Led by Executive Secretary W. H. KNIGHT and other leaders, Baptists added nearly 100,000 members and increased the state budget approximately 700 per cent.

During this period three additional hospitals were acquired: Baton Rouge General (1944), Beauregard Memorial in DeRidder (1947), and Homer Memorial (1949).

The 1947 Convention meeting in Pineville, voted to move the denominational headquarters from Shreveport to Alexandria where a three-story building was purchased.

In 1948 a centennial celebration was held at Mt. Lebanon church to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the organization of the Louisiana Baptist Convention. Louisiana Baptists then numbered 263,207 in 1,000 churches.

So, while the Forties brought World War II with its suffering and frustations, it also laid the foundation for a period of spectacular Baptist growth and development that continues to this day.

In 1960 two major building programs were completed by the Convention. The \$1.3 million multi-purpose Baptist building

was completed in Alexandria. The beautiful and practical three-story structure stands as a symbol of Louisiana Baptist strength and solidarity through the Christ they love and serve. Arcadia Home for the Aged also took its place among the eight institutions supported partially or totally by the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

As Sesquicentennial Year draws to a close, Louisiana Baptists can look with justifiable pride at the accomplishments of the past 150 years. But the past is prologue to a future in which Louisiana Baptists will reach even greater heights in their service to Christ and their fellow man.

The US Census Bureau Age & Citizenship Searching Service has moved from Pittsburg KS to Jeffersonville You should write for the new application form #BC-600 for a search of any census after 1920. The

fee for this search is \$25.00. Write to Bureau of the Census, PO Box 1545, Jeffersonville, IN 47131-1545.

Don't assume that every child is listed in a person's will. Prior to the 1780's, the British law of primogeniture, which held fast in the colonies, dictated that a father's real property passed to the eldest son upon the death of the father. Sometimes, the eldest was not mentioned in a will because the father knew that the son would receive his property by law. (course he could have been disinherited also. JsB)

When submitting forms to the Federal Archives for military records you should include the wording, "Send complete Medical Fild." Medical records are not filed with the military records. If a veteran was injured, hospitalized or received medical discharge, there would be helpful information in the medical file, but you must request it.

When the original pages of the 1820 census for Pittsylvania County VA were microfilmed by the government, one of the pages was skipped (accidentally???) during the microfilming process. This error resulted in one entire page of listings being left out of the microfilm. The following are heads of families that were left out as a result of the mistake:

Fees for Missouri vital records have increased. A certified copy of a marriage license went from \$2.00 to \$22.00. increase in fee will go to combat child abuse and domestic violence. The charge for birth and death certificates, including search and one copy is now \$2.00.

The Nebraska Attorney General has declared state birth and death records open to the public. Researchers may copy info from the official records if they do not intend to order a certified copy. The fee for certified copy of a birth certificate is \$6.00 and a death certificate is \$5.00.

New York Vital records - Only town, county or state employees may do the search, fees are charged according to the number of years needing to be searched. Birth info is provided only if it has been on file at least 75 years and applicant knows person is deceased. Death, if the records has been on file at least 50 years. Marriage, if record has been on file at least 50 years and applicant knows the applicants are deceased. If the applicant is a direct decendent or has been designated to act on behalf of a direct descendant, the waiting period may be waived upon proper documentation. Fees begin at \$6.00 for a 1-3 year search, uncertified copy, or notification of no record. The New York Dept of Health holds original records for birth & marriages for entire state of NY beginning with 1881, deaths from 1880. Cities of Albany, Buffalo, Yonkers, & NY City have most of their own records.

Castle Garden Immigration records, before 1890, are kept at Bayonne, in the New Jersey Federal Records Center.

Illinois research - restrictions set by public officials last year: birth certificates will be issued only to the person named in the record, their legal representative, or the parents named in the record. Identification is required. Applications for marriage certificates issued since 1968 are available only to parties to the marriage or by court order. Death certificates will be issued only to a person having a personal or property right interest in the record. access policy not yet stated. BUT...on a happier note... the state of IL Historical Library will look up and copy obituaries for \$1.00 each plus a SASE. Send name of deceased, date of death, and the county in which the death or burial occurred to: Illinois State Historical Library, Old State Capitol, Springfield, IL 62706.

MORRIS FINCH WARNER THOMAS WILLIAMS

William "Billy" MORRIS & his bro-in-law Col. Thomas Cargill WARNER came early to the St. Tammany/Washington parish area prior to the LA Purchase. Billy marr Charlotte WARNER, dau of Whitten Hall WARNER & these 2 couples came from SC after the Revolution. Col. WARNER was a surveyor before 1803. Billy had a watermill right on the Marion co MS line, but just inside LA line in St. Tammany par (now Washington par). Billy also served the courts as a deputy sheriff. I believe he served the Spanish & later the US courts but can only find records prior to 1809. My theory is he lived just inside Spanish Terr in 1798 but was able to take the oath because the boundry was not yet firm & he did most of his business with Americans on the MS side. Can this be proved? Russ WILLIAMS in his book "KINSMEN ALL" says the foundations of the mill were still visible in 1960 when he saw them, but this doesn't prove when the mill was built. Even in 1830, when Chessely Bostic MORRIS, son of Billy, married Martha (Patsy) dau of James THOMAS, Chessley was listed as a citizen of Mariom co MS even though he lived on the LA side. DOCTORS SEEK MEDICAL PAST OF MOTHER BORN IN MUSKOGEE, OK, AS HER YOUNG SONS STRUGGLE WITH GENETIC DISEASE

Teri AMES was born in Muskogee 13 Mar 1962 to Jo Ann REID, whose maiden name was Anita Joan PURKEY, daughter of Rosa Lee Juanita CLEMENT & Lewis Eldon PURKEY. Teri's father was William Clyde RODDEN, Jr who died in Muskogee.

Christopher AMES, age 9, & Geoffrey, age 6, are both suffering from ALD (Adrenoleukodystrophy) which distroys the sheath around the nerve fibers. Both boys are on a special diet & receiving Lorenzo's Oil. Both have been granted a wish through the Make-A-Wish Foundation of Northern Arizona.

A nation wide search is underway to find a compatable bone marrow donor for Geoffrey, which would give him a 90% chance of survival. Christopher's condition is advanced.

This disease, which is passed on by symptomless mothers to their sons, is so rare that only 75--100 new cases are diagnosed each year.

Teri's mother, grandmother & great grandmother, Jenny Pocahontas ROSS, were all born in Muskogee, OK. Her 2nd great grandmother, Mary Ann SPEARS married William Coody ROSS, son of Andrew ROSS, brother to Chief John ROSS. Mary was dau of James & Elsie FOREMAN SPEARS. A WALDROP FAMILY HISTORY

Luke WALDROP Sr. first appears in America in 1749 where he received a land grant in Granville County NC. He had sons: John, James, Joseph, & Jechonias. There is a family tradition that says he had at least one daughternamed Mary Ann who married Samuel HENDERSON. Circumstantial evidence seems to indicate that Luke Sr. had a son named Luke Jr. It is known that this WALDROP family dropped from sight in Granville County NC sometime between 1769 and 1771. Shortly after these dates, WALDROPs having the same given names show up in South Carolina.

Luke WALDROP Sr. was a man of the sea. He owned a merchant ship, configured as a sloop. Luke WALKDROP Sr.'s father is unknown at this time, but may be the Michael WALDROP who arrived in America around 1699 where he received a land grant given by King George III in 1771, and who also received land from William CLAIBORNE who traded 150 acres in Virginia for passage to America from Scotland in 1682. Though this Michael WALDROP had a son named Luke, it is unclear at this time if Luke WALDROP Sr. was the son of Michael WALDROP.

It is at this point in time when the WALDROP family history becomes very interesting. James WALDROP, son of Luke Sr. used part of his inheritance to purchase one third of a sailing vessel called the "Molly". James lived in Granville County NC and in Newberry co SC. James shipped salt, harvested grains, and plantation goods to the northern colonies just prior to the Revolution. In February of 1776, James aimed guns on the harbor guards, in an attempt to avoid paying taxes to the King of England. Williamsburg VA records show that his ship was held, and eventually sold as punishment. Shortly after he lost his ship, James WALDROP's plantation was fired upon by Tories back in South Carolina. At this point, James joined the Revolution. According to letters from George WASHINGTON to Mrs. FAIRFAX, his neighbor, James' wife, Mary HENDERSON, is mentioned as having been an excellent cook, and her cooking was particularly liked by General BRADOCK. This would indicate, according to the time, that James may have accompanied George WASHINGTON on his expeditions into PA. At least two of James WALDROP Sr.'s brothers also served in the American Revolution: John & Joseph appear in various pension records.

About this time in history, several French Huguenots arrived in SC and married some of the descendants of Luke Sr. One such family was the D'SPAINS, another the GOSSETTS. The D'SPAIN line is distinguished by such names as Benjamin LINN, one of the early Baptist ministers of KY, Addison CLARK, who founded Texas Christian University, and Randolph D'SPAIN who died at the battle of Goliad during the Texas Revolution from Mexico. These D'SPAINs started early churches in TX, fought Indians and carved out the west from the wilderness.

As was the custon of Europe, the eldest son received the majority of the property of his father. The other sons traveled westward in search of free land. Along the way, one WALDROP ancestor was responsible for starting Samford University.

The WALDROPS migrated to GA, AL, AR, LA, and finally TX in the company of David CROCKETT on his way to the Alamo.

The WALDROP who stopped for a time in Bossier Parish LA and Lafayette co AR, was Achilles Darnal WALDROP Sr. A.D. WALDROP married Hanna Matilda CROSSON. The CROSSON home is a historical landmark in Newberry co SC. Achilles was buried in a small family cemetery in Miller co AR about 5 miles south of Texardana, AR. There were only a few graves and the cemetery was destroyed by logging trucks about 1984. Only one marker remains, and it is located on private property. In Hempstead co AR, the MURRAYs and COLLINS' families had arrived early to settle the Springhill, AR lands. The COLLINS family moved from the Oglethorp colonies in GA. I suspect that the MURRAYs did also.

William Henry WALDROP, son of Achilles Darnal WALDROP Sr, moved to Sherman, Grayson co TX about 1873. His eldest son, Luther WALDROP, was born in Boone co AR, and my great grandfather, another of William Henry WALKROP's sons, John Brown WALDROP, was born in Bossier par LA. John Brown WALDROP marr Cora Ellen D'SPAIN. The Grayson County WALDROPs arrived as the railroads were attracting settlers. The PETERS Colony had settled this area. John Brown is said to have participated in one of the great land rushes in Oklahoma Territory, however I have been unable to locate any records.

The MURRAYS and CARRS (from MS), found the oil industry a source for occupations and soon these offspring followed the oil discoveries to west TX. In 1920, Howard CARR with Stella MURRAY CARR, and my mother moved to Wink, Winkler co TX. There they lived in a tent for over a year waiting for enough lumber to build a home. All available lumber was being used by the oil companies.

My father, J.B. WALDROP, resides on the family farm owned by Henry Edward MURRAY, my great grandfather, in Springhill, AR. My mother, Wanda Virginia CARR, was a registered nurse, and one of only a few nurses actually drafted in World War II. My mother died in 1981, buried in Bethany Cemetery, Springhill, Hempstead co AR. I have five generations of my family buried in Bethany Cemetery. There are many relatives living in Hempstead County from the MURRAY, COLLINS lines.

I will happy to correspond with WALDROP researchers and would welcome any info on the early COLLINS or MURRAY families from GA who settled in Springhill, AR. If anyone has the WALDROP name, I can help. There were about 9 original colonial WALDROP men who arrived between 1660 and 1750. None appear to be related in this country, however.

in Arkansas during the Civil War including some in Independence County there are only seven recognized Civil War battle sites in the state, Craig Ogilvie, travel writer for the state Department of Parks and Tourism, told the Batesville Area Civil War Round Table recently during its February meeting.

Six of those battlefields are the sites of national or state parks. Those include Prairie Grove State Park and Pea Ridge National Park, both near Fayetteville; Arkansas Post National Park near Stuttgart; Poison Springs State Park west of Camden; Mark's Mill State Park east of Fordyce; and Jenkins Ferry State Park southwest of Sheridan.

The battle site that is not in a park is within the Helena city limits. The battle was known as the Battle of Helena, Ogil-

"There is a Civil War cemetery there," said Ogilvie. "Helena also has a

tory, but we have very few battle sites in fought Dec. 7, 1862.

Although there were many skirmishes the state," Ogilvie said. He said the Poison Springs, Mark's Mill and Jenkins Ferry sites offer little other than picnic tables and historical markers telling about the battles.

> Prairie Grove and Pea Ridge parks, though, offer a lot to visitors, including displays of Civil War cannons and cannonballs, and old buildings, he said.

> The two parks are only 35 miles apart, so visitors should try to see them both on one trip, Ogilvie said. At Prairie Grove, the unique collection of buildings depict life in the area from the pre-Civil War era to post-Civil War reconstruction.

In addition, there is a battlefield museum, and walking and driving tours are available.

A re-enactment of the Battle of Prairie Grove takes place the first full weekend in December on even-numbered years, Ogilvie said, so there will be a recounty museum that has a fine display." There is an interesting county museum at Arkansas Post, but "there's not anything left of the original fort or the town," Ogilvic said.

Civil War artifacts can be found at some other state parks, including Jacksomport State Park near Newport. The old courthouse museum at Jacksonport has a War Memorial Room with some interesting Civil War items on display.

"Jacksonport is important because it was a surrender site," said Ogilvie.
"About 6,500 Confederates surrendered there."

Old Washington State Park in Hempstead County also has Civil War connections. The town itself served as Arkansas' Confederate capital after the Confederates were forced to flee from Little Rock. Many historic buildings and a weapons museum are open for tours in Old Washington State Park.

Pruning genealogy collections can kill family tree, say patrons

Avid genealogists at Lake Lanier Regional Library in Georgia and Carroll County Public Library in Maryland fear reductions in genealogy services may spell "Timber!" for their family trees.

Although the libraries maintain the cuts are reasonable efforts to cope with limited budgets, their critics have launched a high-tech protest on Prodigy, the national computer network, resulting in a deluge of online criticism from 18 states.

The controversy began after a researcher got wind of Lake Lanier library's plan to weed some 200 volumes on state history and genealogy and put the materials up for sale or move them from reference to general circulation.

"I've been called the next Sherman, marching through the South," Lake Lanier Director Jo Ann Pinder told AL. She was taken by surprise at the ferocity of the protesters, but said many of them had accepted her personal assurance that rare

materials are not threatened.

She said the library simply wants to focus more on service to students, claiming the state archives in Atlanta and the Georgia Room at the Marietta Public Library, as well as university libraries, are better suited for major genealogical research. She said experts had examined the volumes to be weeded and had found only eight of value to the state archives,

In Carroll County, the library board has formed a committee—which met on New Year's Eve to find ways to continue genealogical services—after the genealogical society and local historians urged them by everything from Prodigy to petition to maintain the library's Davis Room, where genealogy and local history are housed.

Country Library Director Martha Makosky had proposed eliminating the Davis Room and relocating its contents in answer to a \$118,755 cut to the library's \$4.2 million budget for FY 1993.

"I'm hopeful that the committee has a solution that will mean the library can retain its collection of local history and gen-

eral level of genealogy," Makosky told AL. Details were scheduled for discussion at the library board's Jan. 13 meeting.

Making decisions of this sort is "something librarians do every day," said Pindar. "It points out to me how vulnerable we are for just doing our jobs, the misunderstandings it can cause, and the hassles it can bring." -L.K.

Put "genies" back in the bottle


I see the "Genies" are at it again (Feb., p. 111). These avid genealogists think their tiny area of interest is the only function of the library and only emerge when there is something to complain about.



HISTORY OF THE KENNEDY-CALLEN-ARMSTRONG FAMILIES

Written by Mae ARMSTRONG DAVIS of El Paso TX many years ago, this copy was loaned to this editor by an aunt of my husband for copying. I have not included all of the Irish & Scotch history, nor does anyone know when this was written. It was in the

possession of the father of Chuck's aunt. JsB Among the 20,000 Ulstermen who accepted the Penn's invitation, & left Ireland for America in the first 3 decades of the 18th century in Pennsylvania history, we often find mentioned the names of Hugh, Ailsa, James, John & Jonathan KENNEDY associated with Thomas, John, Joseph, Quenton, William & James ARMSTRONG. William Patrick McGEE, Hance HAMILTON, Springetti PENN, William JACKS, the McGOUGHS, WOODS, the Harvey STEPHENS, the McAFEES, the LAPSLEYS, the OBERONS & RUSSELLs. This company of Ulstermen sailed from Belfast Ireland on the good ship "Paoli" in the spring of 1736. It took them 3 months to cross the Atlantic to America. The ship "Paoli" landed at New Castle, Deleware & from that place in canoes they traveled the tortorus streams & rivers into the interior of "Province of Penn". In that time, Pennsylvania embraced all of New Jersey & was known as Sussex.

Some of the ARMSTRONG kin had preceded the "Paoli" travelers. Pennsylvania, for history & the Chronicles of the ARMSTRONGs by Dr. James E. ARMSTRONG of Brooklyn, say that both Col. Joseph & Gen. John ARMSTRONG reached PA a few years before the Junata valley settlers came & that all were related. Gen. John ARMSTRONG of Carlisle, father of Sen. John ARMSTRONG, Sec. of War, was a kinsman of Thomas Alexander ARMSTRONG, my great grandfather. Of these Paoli passengers, we know that James ARMSTRONG & wife Betsy, settled near the others in Lancaster, where he was locally prominent. In the Indian outbreak of 1754, he, his wife, & 2 children were taken prisoners when the fort at Carlisle was captured & Gen. John ARMSTRONG's brother was killed. James escaped at once, but Betsy was a prisoner for 18 months. When she wandered through the wilderness & found a fort & learned her husband was an officer at the fort.

Near York, PA was a tract of land 5 miles wide & 30 miles long, stripped of timber, which they called "The Barrens". PENNS officials surveyed it, & the Ulstermen bought & paid for it. As soon as they were settled they build a church on 100 acres of land granted to them. They placed their windows high for fear of Indian attacks which began in 1754.

Then came a day when Sir John ARMSTRONG, a brother of James & Thomas Alexander ARMSTRONG, was with his 3 servants caught & burned at the stake by Indians. This terrible occurance occupies many pages of PA's history.

In 1754 the Indians raided Juiata Valley, killed & captured many, among them William HAMILTON, a prominent man. Finally they decided to move to Bethlehem, PA. In Bethlehem these newcomers met the great Benjamin FRANKLIN. While they admired his inventive powers, & diplimatic ability, they soon learned that morally he was as low as a beast. They often associated with the son of William PENN. They took possession of the land near Lehigh River about 5 miles from Bethlehem.

As soon as they settled in Lehigh River district, they

petitioned the council for a new county. The pepition was granted & the county of Northhampton was formed. Thomas Alexander ARMSTRONG was elected Justice & Jonathan KENNEDY, associate Justice of the new county.

Jonathon KENNEDY had 3 sons, Hugh, John, & Robert, all great Indian fighters. They, with the ARMSTRONGs were officers under Col. Alexander GRAYDON who came from Fermanaugh, Ireland and settled in Buch County TN. When Thomas Alexander ARMSTRONG signed this army roll, which is still in existance, he signed it Sir Thomas Alexander ARMSTRONG of the Lehigh District, Bethlehem, Penn. Johnathan KENNEDY had a son, Robert, who left Lehigh District and went to KY. He bought a large tract of land in the part known as Hastings County & called Kennedy Bottom. He lived to be very old & left many children. Some named Hugh Alexander, Daniel, Aisla, & Rev. John B. KENNEDY Jr.D.D.

Johnathan KENNEDY also had a son, Rev. John B. KENNEDY, D.D. They both attended JLittle Log College" which was organized to educatate Presbyterian ministers. In those days the Presbyterian Church was called the "Genteel Society".

Robert KENNEDY's son, Daniel, moved to Green County, TN. Two other sons attended "Little Log College" where all good Presbyterians educated their sons until this college was established & re-established & then became Princeton College, New Jersey.

Alexander KENNEDY went to Nashville, TN. Thomas Alexander ARMSTRONG & his wife the Lady Jane, greatly desired their son James to become a minister, moved to within 4 miles of Princeton where James graduated. And where his 2 other sons, John & William Hamilton ARMSTRONG graduated. Their names may be found on the college walls.

One of Thomas ARMSTRONG's daughters, Eleanor, married James McCOUN & moved with Rev. John B. KENNEDY, his brother Hugh, the OSBORNS, LAPSLEYS, McGEES, WOODS & others to Virginia, & after a time to Fayette County KY.

In a beautifully bound book, now in the Congressional Library, called "The WOODS McAFEES Memorial" it is stated that Capt. Hamilton ARMSTRONG, his wife Mary Randolph HARRISON, their infant son William Hamilton, the BUCHANANS, Col. George McAFEE, James McCOUN, Robert FORSYTHE, William McADAMS, Joseph WOODS, Rev. John B. KENNEDY, Jr & others came to KY from VA together & all related by blood or marriage.

Col. George McAFEE had married in Ireland, the Lady Anne HAMILTON, sister of Lady Jane, therefore he was an uncle to the ARMSTRONGS, etc. When they settled in KY they built a log church & called it New Providence, in memory of their Providence Church in VA. Rev. David RICE, D.D. had been the pastor of their people in VA, & he settled near by at Danville, & preached at Mayfield, at Boonesborough, which later became Louisville. He preached Eleanor ARMSTRONG McCOUN's funeral, when grief killed her because her little son, Joseph, was carried off by Indians & burned at the stake.

One Rev. John B. KENNEDY, D.D. had been sent as a missionary to South Carolina because there had arisin in the Carolinas a great church disturbance when the Scotch Presbyterians established church combined to a certain degree, with the American Presbyterians. Some would not combine & began to organize

independent churches called the "Presbyter of America". David RICE was also called to go as a missionary with several other ministers. After matters were settled, Rev. John B. KENNEDY was chosen to stay on as a missionary & church builder. According to Mr. John CLARK who knew the KENNEDYs, CALLENS, & ARMSTRONGs in AL & went to LA with them in 1847, Rev. John B. KENNEDY settled near an old fort in northern central SC & married in KY to Jane McAFEE. Which one of the John B. KENNEDYs he was, I do not know. In 1914, while in New York City, I received a letter fram a John McAfee KENNEDY, Route 4, Nashville, He wrote he was a lineal descendant of Rev. John B. KENNEDY, that the minister had 6 sons & 1 daughter. Said he descended from the 5th son, Clinton Harvey KENNEDY, who married Ella The eldest son was a prominent Dr. William Everett KENNEDY. A list of John B. KENNEDY's family from his mother's Bible: Rev. John B. KENNEDY born Buck co Pa. 1737

Jane McAFEE born Augusta Co. 1743
married June 5, 1765 in Fayette Co. Ky.
Dr. William Everette KENNEDY born Ky. June 10, 1767
John? McAfee KENNEDY
Charles Breckenridge KENNEDY Aug. 7, 1778
Clinton Harvey KENNEDY Oct. 4, 1783
Joshua Stubbs KENNEDY May 3, 1770
Hugh E. KENNEDY May 17, 1786

John CLARK said he heard Hugh KENNEDY when grown, went from Mobile back to old home in SC & married there. 2 children That he inherited the mills of his father and born there. returned to AL. My own grandmother, Mrs. James HARRISON ARMSTRONG was born in 1798 at Ft. Agusta Georgia. She moved to Booneville, Ky, married there & went to Hopkinsville, Christian County KY, then joined a horse back caravan to go where her 3 uncles were living in Pleasant Valley, AL. They were the McWHORTOR brothers. The approaching birth of her eldest daughter halted her in the shadows of "Red Mountain" at the present site of Birmingham, AL, then an old field where they tarried awhile, then moved on, bought a plantation two and half miles from New Valley Creek Church in Pleasant Valley, AL. Here she lived for 27 years then moved to Sabine Parish, LA. Something better drew them on like a magnet. They had a lust for cheap land & quick fortunes & sought ceaselessly for both.

Rev. John KENNEDY didn't wait for his church members to support him, but set up mills in AL which were burned by Indians but were rebuilt.

Here is a copy of John CLARKs words as told to me: "Hugh Simpson KENNEDY, your Uncle Hugh's father Hugh E. KENNEDY, was a well to do man and lived near us. I remember him well. I went to the burial of his wife. His son died soon after his mother then a few months later his father's funeral. They are all burried at Mt. Vernon where your Uncle Bob's (Robert McGough ARMSTRONG) little son was burried. Hugh E. KENNEDY owned a plantation & several farms, had a big grist mill, sawmill & was said he once owned one of Eli WHITNEYS first cotton gins. He was left his mill by his father, I heard. I also heard that Hugh KENNEDY went back from Selma to SC, the old home place, married there & 1 or 2 children born there. But came back to Selma, AL. Your Uncle Hugh was born near Selma & his mother,

father & brothers died when he was about grown. There were no trains in those days. It took us 2 months to come from Summerfield to the Mississippi River at Bamberg where we ferried Your Uncle Crit ARMSTRONG was 21 years old the day we reached the Miss. River, Dec. 27, 1826. Many of the people who traveled with us went on to Ark. The John & Ab JORDON families followed close behine us, but not in our crowd. John JORDON named Pleasant Hill. Who was in our crowd that stopped in Sabine? Well, that was in 1847. Been a long time, but as I remember, your grandfather & grandmother, 2 married sons, Crit & Hamilton, your Uncle Bob on horseback with 3 of Andy's & Aunt Millie's sons led the way. Uncle Andy, his wife, 3 sons, 2 nephews, the REED boys, brothers of your father's wife. Your Aunt Mary WOODS & family came later about 2 years. Your father, his wife Cynthia REED, their baby, Mary HARRISON & 2 servants came by way of New Orleans. Syd FREEMAN, the TATES, Harris CALLEN, a nephew of your Uncle Hugh KENNEDY, wife & baby, my father, Dr. LARKE died in Pleasant Valley, Dallas Co., so mother & I came together. Also John KENNEDY. Yes, the ARMSTRONGs came from KY after we got there. The KENNEDYs had been in Moores Bluff a long time. They were rich."

From all I've heard & been able to gather, I have decided that Rev. John B. KENNEDY, D.D. was the ancestor of the wealthy KENNEDYs who settled in the "Spanish Possessions" (AL) very early in states history. History says "Dr. William E. KENNEDY, a prominent young Dr. of Fort Charlotte, Mechlenburg, NC, unfortunately killed an important man in the community. Dr. KENNEDY was held blameless but not wishing to have trouble with relatives of MAXWELL he moved to the wilderness of AL in 1797, then known as Spanish Territory. His brother, Joshua KENNEDY later followed him & in 1815 they were the largest land & slave owners in the state. They settled at Moores Bluff. Later it became Selma, AL. The Rev. John B. KENNEDY had a brother named They were men of influence & social standing in PA. As far as I have been able to form an opinion the 2 KENNEDYs mentioned in the following story were Rev. John B. & brother, Hugh KENNEDY. Altho history mentions 2 Rev. John B. KENNEDYs, uncle & nephew. The story follows:

"At the Tenth Congress of the Scotch-Irish in America which was held at Chamberberg, Pa. Col. Thomas Alexander ARMSTRONG of Hagertown, Md. read a paper before that August Body."

Here let me state that Chamberburg was the home of Col. Joseph ARMSTRONG. Col. Thomas Alexander ARMSTRONG was named for his paternal grandfather, Sir Thomas Alexander ARMSTRONG. Hagertown was the home of Sir Thomas A. ARMSTRONG's daughter Mary, who married Col. OBERSON. The OBERSONs are named with the ARMSTRONGs both in KY & AL. We find when our people moved from Bethlehem to VA & on to KY, John & Hugh KENNEDY were always with them. One of the greatest honors which befell the KENNEDYs, altho one was Vice President under President FILMORE, was that Hugh KENNEDY with Rev. David RICE & David RANKIN met at RICE's home at Danville, KY & wrote the Constitution of KY. At that time, KY was still a part of VA & all of it called Agusta Co. From information gained I believe that Rev. John B. KENNEDY moved to "Spanish Territory" with his family when his son, Hugh E. KENNEDY, father of Hugh Simpson KENNEDY was about 11 years old. The "E" in Hugh KENNEDY Sr's name was given both by Mr.

CLARK & John McAfee KENNEDY of Memphis. He did not use it in signing his will nor is it on his tombstone, but think it was on his son's. The "E" might have stood for Everett as that was middle name of Dr. William KENNEDY of Mobile.

Hugh KENNEDY Sr had 5 brothers & 1 sister, the latter was Jane McAfee KENNEDY. She married John VOMBEST & died 27 Aug 1843.

"The Lebanon" or Mt. Vernon cemetery was near the Valley Creek Church which was destroyed by fire & which once stood on a hill overlooking Pleasant Valley two & one half miles from the James Harrison ARMSTRONG farm.

No history is worthy the name which does not tell the truth good & bad, & I pause to say here that not one of the KENNEDYs, ARMSTRONGs or WOODS of this 1847 Sabine Parish crown fought in the Civil War, the why I do not know, except perhaps age, & being large slave owners exempted them. So far this is almost an exact copy of my "ARMSTRONG History". But after this I combine the knowledge I had, with information I gained from a grandaughter of Hugh E. KENNEDY's eldest daughter, Nancy, vis: Mrs HARRELL & Mrs. DENELER of Selma, AL.

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To build The World Memorial To All Acadian Refugees Who Ended Their Exile In Louisiana.

THE ACADIAN MEMORIAL WILL BE LOCATED IN THE OLL CITY HALL NEXT TO THE EVANGELINE OAK IN ST. MARTINVILLE, LOUISIANA. FOR MANY YEARS ST. MARTINVILLE HAS KEPT THE MEMORY OF THE ACADIAN EXILE ALIVE THROUGH THE ROMANTIC STORY OF EVANGELINE AND GABRIEL AS TOLD IN LONGFELLOW'S EPIC POEM, "EVANGELINE" AND MEMORIALIZED AT THE EVANGELINE OAK. NOW, A MEMORIAL WILL BE BUILT AS A TRIBUTE TO THE REALITIES OF THE EXILE AND WILL HOUSE A WALL OF NAMES, ENGRAVED IN MARBLE, OF EVERY PERSON WHO CAN BE IDENTIFIED IN EARLY LOUISIANA RECORDS AS AN ACADIAN REFUGEE - A REAL-LIFE EVANGELINE OR GABRIEL. AN ETERNAL FLAME WILL BE A REMINDER OF THE DESPAIR OF EXILE AND A CEILING HIGH, WALL-WIDE MURAL WILL DEPICT THE ARRIVAL OF THE ACADIANS TO LOUISIANA, THEIR "PROMISED LAND".

THE SECOND FLOOR WILL HOUSE A UNIQUE MUSEUM CONSISTING OF A STATE-OF-THE-ART, USER FRIENDLY, MULTI-MEDIA, COMPUTER SYSTEM ABLE TO GENERATE INFORMATION TO THE CASUAL VISITOR AND SERIOUS STUDENT ALIKE, OR ALL ASPECTS OF THE LIFE OF EARLY ACADIANS IN LOUISIANA.

THE BUILDING TO HOUSE THE MEMORIAL WAS ORIGINALLY BUILT CIRCA 1915 AS AN OPEN-AIR CITY MARKET WHERE TOWNSPEOPLE CAME TO BUY THEIR MEAT ON WHICH A TAX WAS COLLECTED AS REVENUE FOR THE CITY. AFTER THE FLOOD OF 1927 THE BUILDING WAS CLOSED IN TO HOUSE THE CITY GOVERNMENT OFFICES UNTIL THEY WERE MOVED TO A NEW BUILDING IN 1987. PLANS ARE TO RESTORE THE BUILDING TO THE LOOK OF AN OPEN-AIR MARKET AS ORIGINALLY BUILT.
