Dear Miss Ima: My great-grandfather is said to have been a prisoner in the Civil War. Where can I write to get a copy of his records?

Dear POW: Try sending a self-addressed, stamped envelope to Andersonville National Historic Site, Route 1, Box 85, Andersonville, GA 31711. Include the name of the prisoner of war, which war, and any military information, such as unit, you might know. You will be billed for copy costs only.



Dear Miss Bugg: Who were The Koreshans?

Dear Wondering: The Koreshans were a group of Chicago area people who established a communal society north of Naples in the late 1800s under the leadership of Cyrus Teague, who was an army surgeon during the Civil War. Koresh was the Hebrew word for Cyrus. He taught that we lived on the inside surface of a large globe with the sun at its center, therefore, the surface we lived on was concave rather than convex. His master plan was to build a New Jerusalem that would be populated by hundreds of thousands of believers. The Koreshans were intellectuals, artists, and musicians. The men lived separately from the women and were celibate. After Teague died, their numbers diminished. [*The Tree Climber*]



Dear Ima G* Bugg: I have often heard the terms Quadroon and Octoroon. What do they mean?

Dear Curious: These are terms used to define the amount of Negro/White blood a person has. Commonly used are:

- Negro – Usually applied to one of full Negro blood
- Sacatra – 7/8 Negro & 1/8 White
- Griffe – 3/4 Negro & 1/4 White
- Mulatto – 1/2 Negro & 1/2 White
- Quadroon/Quarteroon – 1/4 Negro & 3/4 White
- Octoroon/Sang-Mele – 1/8 Negro & 7/8 White

Dear Miss Bugg: I wrote a county clerk six weeks ago, asking that she look for a marriage record I really need. I'm just worn out looking for the postman and nothing has come from this clerk yet. What can I do about this?

Dear Tired: Trust me, you're not half as worn out as today's county clerks are. Many clerks offices are dealing with a 1990's volume of mortgages, litigation and land deals with a 1970's size staff. They simply do not have time to look in old books, some of which are not even indexed. Why not plan a visit to this courthouse, call to make sure it is open on the day you plan to go, and ask what time would be best for you to arrive. If a trip is out of the question for you, then write a genealogical society in that area and ask for research help. Think of it this way, a nominal fee to a researcher would be more economical than driving across the country and staying in a motel.



Dear Miss Bugg: I read in a book that my ancestor was "of that ilk". I'm mad. Can I sue for libel?

Dear Hot Head: Chill out! Many times in Scottish literature we come across the term, "of that ilk." Most of the ime it follows the name of a Clan Chief. The Old English word "ilca" means "same." The term "of that ilk" was used in both Scotland and England but over time has come to have different meaning in both countries. In England the term "ilk" means "kind" or "class." In Scotland the phrase has more to do with kinship. According to the *Concise Scots Dictionary*, "of that ilk" designates the head of a landed family. For example, the head of the MacPherson family from the MacPherson estate would be referred to as "MacPherson of that ilk." [*The Family Tree*, August/September 1999]



Dear Miss Bugg: My grandmother's death certificate states she was born in Mississippi, but Census records and all my prior research indicate she was born in Georgia and moved to Mississippi at about age 6. Is it possible a mistake was made on her certified death certificate? What can I trust? Is there a way to verify this further?

Dear Trusting: Two principles are at work here: First, death certificates are rarely filled in by the person who died and second, the one piece of information you can count on is the place and date the person died. You are right to collect all the evidence possible on your grandmother's life. Next you should obtain death certificates on your grandmother's siblings. One of them may have listed a Georgia birthplace and will verify the family's location there during the years you believe they resided there. Siblings' death certificates can provide valuable clues. They may be filled out by a family member whose existence or married name you questioned. The names of attending physicians and funeral homes may prove to be helpful. You do need to determine the state in which the death occurred in order to obtain a death certificate. A Louisiana resident traveling in Texas who dies in Texas will have a Texas death certificate, but the probate of the deceased's estate will be in Louisiana. Dear Miss Bugg: I know for a FACT that my family lived in a certain county in 1860, but the census taker missed them when he did the census. Was this a common occurrence?

Dear Miss Know It All: Actually, no, the census takers generally did an excellent job, especially if you consider the conditions under which they worked. But, you're right, some people were inadvertently omitted for one reason or another (sometimes they just wouldn't cooperate with the enumerator!). Also, if you're working from the index, try going to the actual enumeration; there are some indexing errors. If that doesn't work, check the census records for the adjacent areas; sometimes the boundaries were unclear. The next place to go is the county courthouse. Check the property tax rolls; they were usually compiled annually and listed the head of the households along with the value of certain taxable items. Then check the land and probate records. Many times microfilm copies of courthouse records are available at the local library or archives or in the Family History Library. Also, check to see if there is a city directory for the area for that general time period; the local library may have these in book form or on microfilm.



Dear Miss Bugg: When I was a young man, I remember my grandmother taking me to the family cemetery way out in the country. I recently visited the area hoping to be able to find the old cemetery and all I found was a beautiful lake! Now what?

Dear Drowned: Put away your snorkeling gear. When progress occurs in an area containing a cemetery (new highways, lakes, shopping malls, etc.), usually the graves are removed to a new location. A good place to start is with the city or county engineering department, or in the case of a lake, the Army Corps of Engineers. They will generally have records of where the graves were relocated to and may even have lists of who was moved. You might also consult local newspapers (if you can determine when the lake was built), the county health department (permits may have been issued), and the local funeral homes (they may have handled the relocations). Also, a court order may have been required, so check at the local courthouse.



Dear Miss Bugg: I have seen this wonderful collection of Civil War military correspondence and documents (some 40 or so volumes of *War of the Rebellion*) in the library, but I have few opportunities to spend hours reading it. What can I do? Confiscate a copy?

Dear Larcenist: Don't do that, you would have even fewer opportunities to do research in jail! This massive, wonderful collection of both Union and Confederate documents is now online thanks to Cornell University and you can read it at your leisure in your home. The only hitch is there is no online index. The material is arranged in chronological order so I suggest you spend your library time zeroing in on the time and place you want to read about, consult the index at the library and then read the actual pages at <http://moa.cit.cornell.edu/MOA/MOA-JOURNALS2/WARO.html>

Ten Genealogy Projects for a Winter's Day

This is the time of year when most people hit the winter doldrums. The holidays are over, the guests are gone, and the excitement has worn off. The gloom of winter descends and we start looking for things to do around the house. For me, this is the time when I tackle the genealogy projects I never seem to get to at other times of the year. It's a time when I get things organized.

Let's discuss 10 family history projects that can be done on a cold winter's day. Some of them can be done alone, and others can become a group or family event. All of them, however, provide the opportunity to accomplish some goals that you've put off throughout the rest of the year.

Project 1: Data Entry and Filing

Take all those scraps of paper, photocopies of books, copies of vital records, microfilm printouts and other materials you've stashed in the drawer and sort them out. Analyze them and take the time to finally enter the data into your genealogy database program. What you don't enter, organize into folders by surname and/or region. Organize the files into a location where you can easily refer to them, or pull them to take with you to the library or other research venue.

Project 2: Create a Master Binder

I never take original materials with me when I head to the library or on a research trip. I always take a binder containing printed reports from my database with me. You can create a master binder too. Mine contains a master pedigree chart of all my direct ancestors, and descendant charts of the most important, most frequently researched family lines. It also contains family group sheets for every important family groups I'm researching. In my case, there are over 250 family group sheets in my master binder. Since I've printed the family group sheets from my computer database, I chose to print all the notes for each individual as well. While this is a large binder, it contains all the information I need when I go researching. It provides essential reference information as I'm searching, helps me avoid duplicating my previous efforts, and provides details and citations that allow me to corroborate information I've already discovered. You can take the whole binder with you or only the sheets you need for a specific line you're researching that day.

Project 3: Sort and Label Photographs

This is an excellent family project. If you plan this with older relatives, be certain you have writing materials so you and they can make notes. The process of looking through and labeling our family pictures has always been a source of great stories and information. And don't limit yourself to old photographs! You should be labeling all your photographs, even those from last summer's vacation. Make sure you use archival safe marking pencils, and be sure to store them in archival safe boxes or mount them in archival quality photo albums.

Project 4: Read a Relevant History Book

Make some time to do some reading about a time and geographical area from which your ancestors came. You do your best genealogical research when you have studied the places, periods and the political and economic influences where your ancestors lived. This knowledge can perhaps clarify for you the reasons they emigrated, why they settled in particular places, and why they chose specific occupations and ways of life. It may help you better understand their experiences in the context of the historical times in which they lived.

State, county and local histories abound. Also, this may be a great time to catch up on reading the magazines, journals and newsletters from the genealogical and historical societies to which you belong. They are jam-packed with excellent articles and queries.

Project 5: Organize Your Personal Genealogical Library

If you don't already have an area set aside for your reference materials, perhaps now is the time to start one. A bookshelf or a bookcase can be dedicated to housing all your books, magazines, journals, maps and other essential materials. Do-it-yourself bookcases are relatively inexpensive and can be quickly assembled with only a few common tools. For less than \$5 at an office supply store, you can buy a package of three folding cardboard vertical magazine storage containers. Use one for each magazine title or society's journals; use another for storage of folding maps; and use another for all the miscellaneous brochures and pamphlets you've collected from various places.

These cardboard organizers can also be used to hold papers filed by surname until you're ready to file them in binders. Be sure to label each container so their contents are easily located at a glance.

Project 6: Write Letters

You know there are copies you want or need of vital records, military service records, pension files, and other documents at the National Archives, at various state archives, and at courthouses across the country. You've been procrastinating about writing letters and sending in forms for them for far too long. There's no time like the present to write those letters.

Using your computer and a simple word processor, it is so easy to create a template letter. Simply write the letter to the first agency and print it off. Then, change the addressee and the specifics about the information/records you're requesting and print off the second one. Keep going until you have a stack of letters of inquiry written. Address those envelopes, affix the stamps and send them off. Be sure and keep a copy for your files so you know who you wrote to and can do follow ups for slow responders. You'll be surprised how much you'll receive in response and how quickly!

Project 7: Throw a Genealogy Party

Invite some of your friends, family and acquaintances who do genealogy to your home for a "genealogy party." Use the opportunity to exchange information, share tips and research techniques, and to tell stories about their best and/or worst genealogical experiences. You can even make up silly party favors using inexpensive items like erasers, toy trees, pencils, postage stamps, and toy magnifying glasses. Cookies shaped like family trees or like bones can add some fun to the occasion. Ask everyone to bring copies of a favorite family recipe to share with others too. There's nothing like a midwinter party to shake off cabin fever.

Project 8: Library Research

Winter weather in most places isn't conducive to outside research in cemeteries, battle-fields and the like. A visit to the library, the archives, or to an LDS Family History Center can be a productive use of time. This is a great opportunity to cull through all those inside records. Set a goal for yourself that you'll learn about at least one new type of record that you've never used before.

Remember, though, that you won't be the only one headed for the library. Arrive early to stake out a good spot, take lots of change for the copy machines, and be sure to take a plate of cookies for those wonderful, helpful librarians.

Project 9: Call Three Relatives

You can always learn something from your relatives. Why not select three relatives you seldom talk to and give them a call? In the course of the conversation, ask questions about the family. Certainly don't turn the call into an interrogation session, but open the door to additional conversations. Take the opportunity, too, to ask if you can send them a family group sheet and a SASE, and ask them to add information. You never know what you may find out.

Project 10: Make a Family Recipe

Another great family project is to make a treasured family recipe. If you can get members of the family to help, all the better. Use the opportunity while either making or eating to talk about the origins of the recipe and family members who have made it. Make sure that the recipe is written down and that family members know where it is recorded.

Finishing Up

Well, there are ten projects for you. I'm sure you can think of others but perhaps these ten will motivate you to have some fun with your genealogy and accomplish some goals along the way. Let me know how they go!

SOUTHERN HISTORICAL SOCIETY PAPERS

975 SOU

Comprising forty-nine volumes, the papers are a fundamental source for the writing and study of Civil War history. Due to a previous lack of a comprehensive and accurate index, their true value was never realized. Now several years of dedicated labor have resulted in a three volume, comprehensive index that endeavors to correct errors, identifications, provide geographic and other references, and fill in the gaps in the War Department's "Official Records."

ANCESTRAL TRAILS

The Complete Guide to British Genealogy and Family History, by Mark D. Herber

A comprehensive and up-to-date guidance on tracing British ancestry, and researching family history. "Ancestral Trails" opens with chapters useful to beginning researchers, explaining the basic steps in searching for family roots. For experienced researchers, later chapters cover records that are harder to find, such as legal and property records. Research in Scotland, Wales, Ireland, Isle of Man and the Channel Islands are covered, as are CD technology developments and the Internet. Illustrations of major types of records, detailed further reading lists, and examples of 16th and 17th Century alphabet handwriting styles are included.

THE HUGUENOTS AND THE REVOCATION OF THE EDICT OF NANTES

Vol. I: 1610-1685; Vol. II: 1685-1802, by Henry M. Baird

The Edict of Nantes was the Magna Charta of Huguenot rights that were in full force at the death of its author, Henry IV of France. Distinguished in war, the Huguenots became noted for their advance in the arts and in peace. Their prosperity was interrupted under the reign of Louis XIV, culminating in the formal recall of the Edict. The great emigration was a direct result of the recall. The reign of proscription ended with the Edict of Toleration issued by Louis XVI, and the Declaration of the Rights of Man at the beginning of the French Revolution. A map of France shows the Military Divisions established by the Political Assembly of La Rochelle (1621) and the Huguenot Cities of Refuge under the Edict of Nantes (1598-1622).



COBB CO (GA) MEMBERSHIP LIST

The Cobb Co, GA Genealogical Society has sent us their 1999 membership list in booklet form which will be placed in the Genealogy Collection at Shreve Memorial Library. Included is a listing of their some 175 members with their names and postal and e-mail addresses, along with surnames being researched. There is a separate index of surnames cross-referenced to the member list. As many of our ancestors came through Georgia on their way across the South, you may want to review this listing.

DeSoto Parish Courthouse Records Index

This is an index of the original DeSoto Parish, Louisiana Courthouse records dated prior to 1911. These records were stored in the new Courthouse built in 1911 and had deteriorated over the years. They have since been donated to the Archives Department of Noel Memorial Library at Louisiana State University in Shreveport, Louisiana for restoration and preservation.

These records have been microfilmed by members of Friends of Genealogy, Inc. The resulting 16 rolls of film are available for viewing at the Noel Memorial Library and in the Genealogy Collection at the Shreve Memorial Library, both in Shreveport, LA; the Allen County Library in Fort Wayne, IN; the Central Branch Library in Conroe, TX; the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, UT; the Dallas Public Library in Dallas, TX; and the DeSoto Parish Library in Mansfield, LA. They are also available for purchase from Friends of Genealogy, Inc. This series began in Volume XI, No. 2 (Second Quarter, 1999)

WILLIAM J. HUTCHINSON PLANTATION, CADDO PARISH, LA

Ledger Book #4, Time and Wages - 1867 & 1870

This information was compiled from the Hutchinson Plantation Collection in the Archives and Special Collections in the Noel Memorial Library at Louisiana State University in Shreveport, Louisiana.

William J. Hutchinson (1832-1913) settled in Louisiana in 1842 with his family and brother, Robert. The family purchased land in Bossier and Caddo Parishes and established the "Caspiana Plantation" in the Spring of 1852. The entire collection (comprising 24 linear feet of shelf space) includes business correspondence, receipts, advertisements, ledgers, account books, and wage and time books primarily for the period 1850-1891. Other materials include family correspondence, photographs, diaries, maps, and other materials relating to social, economic, and educational aspects of life. (Collection 075)

Following the Civil War, the South had to adjust to a wage-earner economy. Black families had no assets, landowners had no sure labor force, and everyone lived on credit. William J. Hutchinson experimented with sharecroppers and daily wage earners. This ledger reflects former slave families working on the daily wage basis, with cash advancements and store credit accounting, and was maintained by various overseers working for Mr. Hutchinson. During the years 1867-1870, he lived at Evergreen in Bossier Parish and visited Caspiana frequently.

MILITARY ROSTER OF THE PRESIDIO DE NUESTRA SRA. DEL PILAR DE LOS ADAES

This presidio was founded in 1721, near the present site of Robeline, LA (at that time, the extreme northeastern edge of the Province of Texas). It was located about 15 miles west of Natchitoches, Louisiana, and intended as a frontier outpost, to check French expansion in east Texas.

With Spain's acquisition of Louisiana in 1773, this became unnecessary, and the presidio, along with the nearby mission of San Miguel de Los Adaes, were ordered closed.

The following roster, dated 23 May 1730, was compiled and signed by the then Governor of Texas (and Captain of the presidial troops), Don Juan Antonio Bustillo y Zevallos. Ages and time of service were given only for the three officers.

WELDING LINKS: WELDING LINKS VIA WORLDCONNECT

To stay young and healthy, keep learning. That's what the medical experts keep telling us. Of course, family historians have already figured this out because genealogy is an ever-learning process and look how young we all are. This hobby gives the old gray matter plenty of workouts as we try to find, identify and untangle the twigs, branches, and roots of our family trees.

WORLDCONNECT, a popular GEDCOM-based project launched by RootsWeb.com, is an incredible new (and free) finding aid. <http://worldconnect.genealogy.rootsweb.com/index.html> Through it, in just a couple of months, I have located several new cousins -- descendants of siblings of my ancestors -- who have provided me with new information. Additionally, I have been able to share some of my research.

However, despite the many marvels of this electronic age, technology cannot think for us. It makes it easier to find each other and share information, but we still have to use our noggins and sift through the chaff to find the wheat. An example of the challenges facing us turned up when I went exploring for information on Charlemagne after a reader informed me he had uploaded a large GEDCOM of royal and "Mayflower" lines. I have no royal or noble lines, and am somewhat awed by those who can make legitimate links to ancient pedigrees of medieval Europe.

A cursory search for "Charlemagne" at WORLDCONNECT turned up 63 results, and of those all but one apparently pertain to the most influential king in Europe in the Middle Ages. Another search on the Web turned up a great deal of historical and genealogical material about him, including the fact that he was born before his parents were married. When I went back to compare the genealogical files I saw several discrepancies:

-- His date of birth is given as 2 April 747 by several, while 2 April 742 is listed by the majority. All the historical sites and encyclopedia references I found give only the year 742 or circa 742, while a couple of genealogical sites give the complete date.

-- His place of birth (listed as unknown by historians) is listed by genealogists variously as: Aachen, Ingelheim, Ingolheim, and Aix-la-Chapelle. Ingelheim is listed as being in Rhinehessen, Hesse-Darmstadt, Rheinland, Prussia, Deutschland, and Carolingian. Since I knew several of these localities did not exist by those names in 742, I went scurrying to gazetteers and atlases (online and offline). The city of Aachen (now located in Nordrhein-Westfalen, Germany) is thought to be the birthplace of Charlemagne. Aachen in French is Aix-la-Chapelle. At the time of his birth this would have been part of the area called Austrasia in the Frankish Kingdom. Localities should be entered in our databases as they were at the time of the event, not where they are now.

Charlemagne's date of death is given as 28 January 813/14 by many genealogists, while the historians record it as 28 January 814. I am puzzled by the use of double dating since it was only used in the 16th to 18th centuries in conjunction with the changing from the Julian calendar (Old Style) to Gregorian calendar (New Style), starting in 1522 in Venice and eventually in Great Britain and its colonies in 1752. The Julian calendar would have been the one used in the 9th century, and January 1 was the first date of its year, so why the double date?

While examining many files, I looked closely at one I had posted at WORLDCONNECT and discovered that my software has converted a "meeting locality" of a couple into a marriage place for them -- presenting completely inaccurate information. I rechecked my notes and original entries, and they are correct, so it is a glitch in the way certain parts of the data are being handled by the GEDCOM. You might want to take a closer look at your own posted data and, of course, be careful about accepting any and all information you find. Electronic databases are wonderful tools, but they are just finding aids -- not sources, and they may or may not be accurate. Humans and machines both make errors.

SHREVEPORT TIMES OBITUARIES

March 19, 1890 -- November 12, 1890

Obituaries in the early newspapers were limited and placed in various locations in the copy. Therefore, it is most difficult to locate this data. Furthermore, very seldom were family members mentioned. Frequently, much more emphasis was placed on obituaries from out of the city than local residents. The following obituaries are in a series of 1880s and 1890s obituaries which have been extracted from the *Shreveport Daily Times*, Shreveport, Louisiana. [Note that if the date of death is listed as *about* - date of newspaper is given.] The microfilm is located on the third floor of the Shreve Memorial Library, Genealogy Department, Shreveport, Louisiana, the Allen County Library, Fort Wayne, IN, the Central Branch Library in Conroe, TX, the Dallas Public Library in Dallas, TX, and the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, UT. This series began in Vol. IX, No. 2 (Second Q, 1997).

Captain J. C. LaHone Lived 2 miles East of Marshall, Texas died on the 17th of March 1890. Burial was in Greenwood Cemetery [*probably in Greenwood, LA*]. He moved to Marshall in 1873 and was a store keeper. He lived in Louisiana before the War. He is survived by his widow, four sons, and four daughters. [Times 19 Mar 1890]

Anna Ruth Shephard Lived and died in Shreveport on the 18 of March 1890 at 10 a.m. at the tender age of 2 years and 5 months. Funeral services were at the family residence and the burial was in Oakland Cemetery. She is survived by her parents J. H. & Hattie Shephard. [Times 19 Mar 1890]

T. H. Kortum Born in Canada, now a resident of Shreveport for the past 8 or 9 years died on the 31st of March 1890 at 2 a.m., at his residence at the age of 34 years. His occupation was the Jewelry Business located on Texas Street. Funeral services were held at the family residence on McNeil St. opposite the Courthouse with the Rev. Dr. Van Lear officiating. Burial was in Coushatta, Louisiana. Survived by his wife and one child. [Times 2 Apr 1890]

W. A. Ponder Died, residence in Robeline and a member of the Legislature from Natchitoches. [Times 3 Apr 1890]

Eliza Pettis One of the oldest citizens died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Lula Green, of apoplexy on the 31st of Mar 1890. [Times 3 Apr 1890]

John Drago Born in Trenton, LA and living in West Monroe, LA, died on 26th of March 1890 age 60 years. He was a paymaster for the Vicksburg-Shreveport & Pacific Railroad. Member of the "Knights of Honor" and survived by his wife. [Times 3 Apr 1890]

Dr. W. Guthrie Dropped dead on the 2nd of April 1890. Funeral services were 3rd of April 1890 at 4 p.m. and the burial was in Springville Cemetery. [Times 3 Apr 1890]

Mamie I. McFarlin Resident of Shreveport, died on the 29th of March 1890 at the young age of 18 years. Her parents are Q. V. McFarlin & M. E. McFarlin. Her mother is buried at Oakland Cemetery. [Times 3 Apr 1890]

Rosa Kaufman Resident of Shreveport died on the 31st of March 1890 at 6 p.m. at the age of 28 years. She is survived by her spouse Meyer Kaufman. [Times 3 Apr 1890]

J. B. Mading Mr. Mading was a resident of Bossier Parish for 50 years. He was living in Plain Dealing, Louisiana at the time of his death on the 3rd of April 1890. He was 78 years of age and a member of the Red Land Lodge #148 F.& A.M. [Times 5 Apr 1890]

Dr. A. F. Clarke Born in the year 1811 in Kentucky and a resident of Shreveport, died at the residence of McElstner at the age of 79 years. He was a physician and graduated from medical college in 1835. He was in the Mexican War and has been living in Shreveport since the 1840s. His wife was the widow of Watt Smoker and the mother-in-law of M. C. Elstner; she died in May, 1885. Also mentioned was James Boormon. [Times 8 Apr 1890]

Miss Byron Laurence A resident of Choudrant, Louisiana died at the age of 40 on the 10th of April 1890. She was found dead in bed of a suicide. She had taken 2 bottles of laudanum and the reason was unknown. Burial was in Choudrant, Louisiana. [Times 11 Apr 1890]

Ben V. Long Born in Harrison Co., Texas and a resident of Caddo Parish nearly all of his life. Found dead floating in water in the swamps near Rush Point; cause of death unknown.
