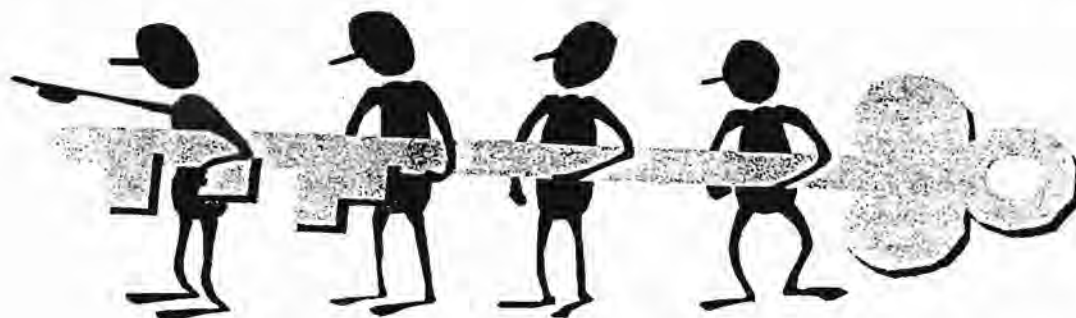

# ASK

Miss Ima G\* Bugg

Miss Ima G\* Bugg, our own unique, lighthearted research associate, has agreed to try to answer our questions and give us some research clues. Dear Miss Ima: I find my ancestors in Spartanburg District, SC shortly before the Revolution and it seems there is just so little to research for that area at that time. I really wish they had settled elsewhere.

Dear Finder: Well, it's too late now. That's where they settled and that's what you're stuck with. Sorry about that. There are some good deed abstracts for the decades following the Revolution and you may find valuable clues there. Deeds provide info on marriage contracts, gifts or divisions of property among children, remarriages of widows, and sales of slaves. Deed records help you "follow the money" in a family. Don't be anchored to a definite time period, even if you have evidence the family moved, look at deed abstracts in the decades after they left an area, because the deed may not have been recorded until some time after the sale or, then as now, they may not have been able to sell the property just when everyone was heading west and may have had to wait years to sell the old family farm.

Dear Miss Ima: I find my ancestor enrolled in a Georgia militia unit during the Civil War. Is this part of the Confederate Army? I hope so, I genuinely desire to join the UDC.

Dear Desirous: I don't know about the UDC, but let me tell you about the GA militia. When the War of Northern Aggression broke out, most folks thought it would be over in only a few months. Well, as things dragged on and the war continued, the lack of viable male inhabitants in GA distressed more people than Scarlett O'Hara. There was simply the matter of maintaining law and order since all the good guys had joined the Confederate Army and left. Gov. Joseph Brown began organizing state troops and the Confederate Army began taking them off just as quick as he organized them. So, Gov. Brown and the state legislature passed laws to organize the state militia and all free white males between 16 and 60 were to register in their respective counties. Duplicate lists were to be made and sent to the state adjutant and the superior court in each county. Most of these lists survived and you can be proud of your ancestor's participation in this "home guard."

Dear Miss Ima: My great great grandmother died in 1843 according to the family Bible, yet there she is listed in the 1850 Census with two more small children. Did she have nine lives like a cat? I had heard once that my great great grandfather had remarried, but surely he could not have found a second lady named Arminta. Is this just a huge coincidence?

Dear Miss Kitty: Maybe the given name Arminta had the nine lives. And here is a practice I learned of not too long ago: If a man lost a wife and then married an Indian woman or a part-Indian woman, he sometimes attempted to conceal the second wife's heritage by renaming her his first wife's name. It is difficult to conceive of now, but there was a time when some families were not proud of kinfolks with Indian blood. Try to find descendants of both the elder and younger children in the family and compare photos. There may be enough dissimilarity to support the theory of a second wife.

Dear Miss Ima: I cannot go to Washington, D.C. because my husband says whoever leaves has to take the kids with them, but I sure would like to do some long-distance research at the National Archives, particularly get some military records. Can long-distance research be done there?

Dear LDR: Sounds like you will have a very secure marriage with nobody leaving. Here's the deal on requesting records from the National Archives – it all must be done through **forms**. Bureaucracy, gotta love it! At least the forms can be ordered by e-mail. Address your e-mail to [inquire@arch2.nara.gov](mailto:inquire@arch2.nara.gov) and (very important) put the word *Form* as the subject of your e-mail. In your e-mail include your name and your postal mailing address so they can send the form to you. They will not use e-mail to supply a form. You can only order one record per form, so state how many of each form you need. The Form for military service and pension records prior to World War I, including the Spanish-American War, is **Form 80**. Other forms are **Form 81** for Passenger Arrivals; **Form 82** to order copies of Census Records – requiring knowledge of the publication, roll, and page number; **Form 83** for Eastern Cherokee applications; **Form 84** for Land Entry papers – Federal lands only; and **Form 180** for military service records for World War I and later. Now once you have the form and you fill it out, it must be submitted via the U.S. mail. All this requires is postage and patience. Good luck.

Dear Miss Ima: Just exactly how large is an acre? Is it rectangular shaped? Is this an English measure? Some things just seem so imprecise, how can a deed say “100 acres more or less”?

Dear Precise: Your measured interest in acres is well grounded. An acre is the amount of land an ox can plow in one day. But I'm sure you will be more pleased with the definition of 43,560 square feet. Shape is unimportant in the concept of an acre. It is rather like a cord of wood, it may be stacked or laid out in numerous configurations. I believe the acre is an English measure, but I am not sure it is exclusive to *The Isles*. You would need to work one week during August with a surveying team in Louisiana to fully appreciate the phrase “100 acres, more or less.”

## PROVIDENCE BAPTIST CEMETERY

Providence Baptist Cemetery is located in southwest Caddo Parish. Take Louisiana Highway 525 west from Spring Ridge for approximately 2.5 miles, turn right (north) on Providence Road and go approximately 1.2 miles. The cemetery is on the left in Section 3, Township 15, Range 16 West. The survey of this cemetery was made in October, 1989. When possible I have included the obituary as annotation. Publication of these records began in the First Quarter, 2001 Journal, Vol. XIII, No. 1.

IVY, Newton B. [WOW Emblem]

13 Jun 1861 – 23 Jun 1904

Obituary – *The Shreveport Journal*, June 24, 1904. As we go to press we are pained to chronicle the death of Newton B. Ivy which occurred at his home in Texarkana Annex in the early part of last night. Mr. Ivy had been ill for near four weeks. At one time he was thought to be convalescent and made two trips down to the city which is supposed to be the cause of a relapse which proved fatal as above stated. Mr. Ivey has been a citizen of this city for a number of years, a term of which laterally he spent as one of the popular merchants of Holmesville. He leaves a wife and four children to meet stern life without the husband and friend. The family and friends left early this afternoon with the remains to bear them twenty-three miles into the country to lay it away in the burying ground at the old homestead. The Journal tenders sincere condolence.

Mrs. Susie Alfred, one of the best beloved and most highly esteemed ladies of this city, died yesterday morning at her home on Pierre Avenue, at 12:45 o'clock. Mrs. Alfred had reached the advanced age of seventy-six years, and had been a consistent member of the Baptist church for the past fifty years, having united with the Bethany church which is near Providence, in 1861. After the death of her husband, she remained at their home at Providence for four years, then she removed to Shreveport, where she has since lived. Mrs. Alfred is survived by six children, five boys and one girl, they being Joe, Glenn, Oscar, James and Miss Bettie, all of Shreveport, and Rev. Gus Alfred of Lampasses, TX. The funeral was held at 4 o'clock Tuesday evening at the residence, conducted by Rev. A. D. Kendricks, of the Parkview Baptist Church. The remains will be forwarded to Providence early this morning, where interment will take place this afternoon.

## **The Amazing Earle Berryhill**

By Shirley White

My ancestors, the Berryhills, were descendants of the Cherokee Indians who traveled the Trail of Tears from Tennessee to Oklahoma. The Berryhills settled in Creek County, Oklahoma in the town of Sepulpa, and profited from participation in the Glenn Pool oil field through an Indian allotment. Earle Berryhill was born 1903 to Theodore and Rilla Berryhill, on a ranch southeast of Sepulpa. The family moved to Claremore when Earle was 13 and he graduated from Claremore High School.

Earle married Selma Bishop and moved back to Sepulpa as a young man. Theodore had bought several buildings in Sepulpa, putting them in Earle's name, and built the Berryhill Building there when Earle was only 6 years old. Earle and Selma had a son, Robert, and a daughter, Sally Ann, who married a Bingham.

Earle Berryhill was an all-around sportsman, but especially enjoyed football, softball and golf. In 1937 he organized and sponsored the B & B Clothiers softball team which came to be known as Sepulpa's *Suit Men*. That first year the B & B Clothiers, managed by Denver C. Grigsby (Chicago Cubs "Rookie of the Year" in 1924) made it to the world championship play-offs at Soldier's Field, losing to Briggs Body Works team of Detroit after 18 innings with a score of 1-0. Play of this game was broadcast nationwide by NBC radio.

Another interest of Earle Berryhill was amateur golf. He won the Oklahoma State Amateur Championship in 1933 and again in 1935. In 1935 he shot 146 on 36 holes for Medalist honors. He also played in Western, Trans-Mississippi and National Tournaments including the Los Angeles open and the Broadmoor Invitational at Colorado, often winning as a Medalist or runnerup. The notable players of his day referred to him as *The Personality Champion* because of his unruffled demeanor under stress.

Here is an excerpt taken from *Golf Magazine*, October 1977 issue: "Stout (a pro golfer) got into golf under the late Ed Dudley at the Broadmoor back in the days when Colorado Springs was a hustler's paradise. One of the hawks who plucked the chickens at that time was the legendary 'Titanic' Thompson (a wealthy Texas gambler). 'One of the guys nobody would mess with, not Titanic, Lawson Little, or any of them, was an oil-rich Indian named Earle Berryhill' Stout recalls. 'He'd play them a five or ten thousand dollar Nassau (a type of wager), or anything they wanted to play and the higher the stakes, the better he played. They called him The Red Man's Revenge and rightfully so.'"

Despite his formidability on the golf course, the sport that merited his inclusion in Ripley's "Believe It or Not" column was billiards. Berryhill, playing against a Brunswick representative in the B & N Billiard Parlor of the Berryhill Building in Sepulpa, Oklahoma, ran all the balls in succession in a snooker game for a total score of 117-0. He won the game and a \$100 bet. Earle Berryhill died in 1950 at age 47, but he lived a full and exciting life.

The records list the taxpayer's name, the year of assessment, and quantity of land as well as the values of land, livestock, and personal property. We are listing here only the amount of land shown for each year; a blank field indicates that there is no listing for that taxpayer for that year. The years 1865-1868 are combined into one tax roll. "None" indicates that the taxpayer is listed for poll tax and/or personal property tax and does not own land.

“T. H. Morris’ Drug Store will hereafter be open at all hours of the day and night. Ward’s Drug Store will be open at all times . . . for the dispensing of medicines.”

## **The Stoner Families of Shreveport, LA**

**By Danielle Neal**

Much interest has been focused on historic Greenwood Cemetery on Stoner Avenue in Shreveport. A grant has been awarded to refurbish and restore this cemetery and it is now designated as Greenwood Garden Cemetery. The Stoner family for whom Stoner Avenue is named sold the original plot of land to the city at a very reasonable price. I undertook the project of finding out more about this family.

There were two Stoner families in Shreveport following the Civil War. One family was headed by John Henry Stoner of Tennessee and the other was headed by George W. Stoner of Kentucky. I believe these men to be at least second or third cousins, but in the time spent I have not been able to make a connection yet. They apparently had no business dealings together, did not witness each other's deeds, indeed, there is no evidence they were even acquainted.

John Henry Stoner was the first to buy land in Caddo Parish, purchasing two lots in 1866 and two more parcels in 1867.

John Henry Stoner was listed in early Shreveport City Directories as an undertaker and carpenter in business with W. W. Waring. Later Waring had his own undertaking establishment and John Henry Stoner continued as a carpenter and undertaker. He listed his profession in the 1880 Census as mechanic and by the 1884 Shreveport City Directory he was listed as a builder.

J. H. Stoner had numerous land transactions, buying from and selling to John Heath, also a carpenter, originally from Indiana. Deed records indicate J. H. Stoner was in Shreveport in 1870 and he married Eugenia A. Broussard January 30, 1870, but he is not listed in the 1870 Census. The only enumeration I find for him is in 1880 [Caddo Parish ED 19, Sheet 45] where he and Eugenia have the following children:

Effie Stoner, born 1873

Fannie Stoner, born 1877

Dimple Stoner, born November 1879

In addition to these daughters, there was Mary Jane Annette Stoner, born July 28, 1874, died October 19, 1875, who is buried in Oakland Cemetery. The only other bit of information available about this family is in the *Biographical and Historical Memoirs of Caddo Parish, Louisiana*, where we find that in 1882 a new home was built for them.

They must have moved from Shreveport in the ensuing years, for there are no marriage records for the daughters and no further cemetery records.

George W. Stoner first purchased 8.08 acres in Section 32, Township 18 N, Range 13 W in 1868, this land being sold by James F. Smith of Kentucky, through John W. Smith who

held James Smith's power of attorney. In 1869 George W. Stoner purchased an adjacent 28 ¼ acres from this same James F. Smith with John W. Smith, Power of Attorney.

It is George W. Stoner who is connected with Stoner Avenue and Greenwood Cemetery, as proprietor of a nursery just southeast of Silver Lake on an 1873 Shreveport map. Silver Lake lay just south of downtown Shreveport in 1873 and gave Lake Street its name. I believe the site of present-day Ernest's restaurant would have overlooked Silver Lake. No doubt Stoner Avenue was the road out to Stoner Nursery.

Deed records indicate George W. Stoner bought a good deal of land, had out-of-state investors, and had his ups and downs in Shreveport's Reconstruction economy. By Resolution of the City Council August 7, 1877 in November of that year Nicholas W. Murphy, Mayor, purchased from George W. Stoner 6.63 acres for the amount of taxes due, \$587.50. Thus began Greenwood Cemetery.

George W. Stoner is found in Shreveport through the 1900 Census [Caddo Parish ED 31, Sheet 18] where at age 71 he and his wife, Lizzie, live in Jewella Precinct with their son Ernest, age 31, who lists his occupation as truck farmer. In this census Lizzie Stoner indicates she has had 6 children, only 2 of whom are living. Her marriage is of record in Montgomery County, Kentucky, on November 15, 1855. George W. Stoner was age 28, born in Madison County, Kentucky and living in Christian County at the time of marriage. Elizabeth "Bettie" Hathaway, age 16, was born and still lived in Montgomery County, Kentucky when married.

Information in the 1880 Census enumeration [Caddo Parish ED 19, Sheet 51, Line 32] gives the following children:

Samuel Stoner, born 1860 in Texas

Sterling Stoner, born 1867 in Kentucky

Ernest Stoner, born 1871 in Louisiana

Early Stoner, born 1874 in Louisiana

In addition to these four sons, there was a daughter, Sallie B. Stoner, born 1863, who died of yellow fever October 17, 1873. Her obituary is in the *Shreveport Times*, but place of burial is not mentioned. With a marriage in 1855, I would surmise that there was a child before Samuel who died young.

Mrs. Elizabeth H. Stoner's succession was filed in 1901; George W. Stoner's succession was filed in 1907. Microfilm of these suits is not available for library research yet. I found no record of their burial.

Samuel Stoner, eldest known son of George W. Stoner and Elizabeth Hathaway, married a Frances Eliza ? and they had at least three children: Ernest R. Stoner, Early Roy Stoner and Ethel B. Stoner. This information I glean from the index of Caddo Parish Civil Suits and we may place Samuel's death as occurring shortly before Elizabeth H. Stoner's 1900 enumeration in which she says only 2 of 6 children are still living. Widow Frances Eliza

Stoner marries George W. Leopard on December 22, 1896 in Caddo Parish. Their enumeration in 1900 [Caddo Parish ED 31, Sheet 20, Line 26] shows these children:

Early Roy, born May 1891  
Ethel, born August 1894  
Mary Roy born August 1896  
Robert, born October 1897

Surnames are not listed for these children so I do not know if they are all Stoner minors or if two of them could be George Leopard's children from a prior marriage.

I found no marriage or burial record for Sterling Stoner. Ernest Stoner, third known son of George W. Stoner and Elizabeth Hathaway, married Mamie T. Snead in Caddo Parish on August 31, 1910. There is a civil suit in the index in 1920 styled Mamie Snead vs. Ernest Stoner and in the 1920 Census enumeration [Caddo Parish ED 40, Sheet 45] Mamie is listed with her mother, Mary Snead; her siblings; and with her daughter, Phronsie Stoner, born 1913, and her son, Jewel J. Stoner, born 1915. I do not find Ernest Stoner in the 1920 Census.

Early Roy Stoner, fourth known son of George W. Stoner and Elizabeth Hathaway, married Benenna Dennis, daughter of physician Hiram P. Dennis in Caddo Parish August 2, 1897. This family is found in the 1900 Census enumeration [Caddo Parish ED 32, Sheet 15] with their first child, a daughter named Lucille. I find no further census enumeration for them.

Of the family members thus chronicled, there is one follow-up lead on one of the children of the deceased Samuel Stoner (1860-1899?). A Genforum inquiry was posted in the Stoner Family forum March 10, 2000, where Samuel G. Stoner of Portland, Oregon, asks for information on the Stoners of Shreveport. He indicates that his grandfather was Early Roy Stoner, born about 1890, and his father, Samuel Francis Stoner was born in Shreveport about 1920.

This family is enumerated in 1920 [Caddo ED 40, Sheet 49, Line 41] with the household of Henry S. Roach, dairyman, whose daughter, Mary C. has married Roy Stoner. In the enumeration they have the following children:

Mary Roy Stoner, born 1915  
George W. Stoner, born 1917

I e-mailed Samuel G. Stoner and posted a response on Genforum, but to date I have not received any response from him.

George W. Stoner (1828-1907) can be traced back to an illustrious ancestor. George W. Stoner was the son of Peter Burris Stoner (b. 1800 KY), who married Frances A. Tribble January 3, 1822 in Madison County, KY. George W. is found in his household in the 1850 Census [Christian Co., KY, page 378] along with a younger brother, Peter Stoner, born 1834.

This Peter Burris Stoner was the son of Michael Stoner, a comrade of Daniel Boone. The exploits of Michael Stoner may be found at [www.earlyamerica.com/review/fall98/frontier](http://www.earlyamerica.com/review/fall98/frontier). In short, Michael Stoner (1743-1815) was a German whose name was originally George Michael Holstein, and he was born in the Schuylkill River region of Pennsylvania. Michael Stoner accompanied Daniel Boone on his first long hunt expedition into the Kentucky country. In April 1774 Daniel Boone and Michael Stoner were the two volunteers Lord Dunmore sent into Kentucky to warn a surveying team of imminent hostilities and bring the surveyors back to safety. Michael Stoner was part of the expedition that established Fort Boonesborough. In 1810, at age 62, Michael Stoner visited Daniel Boone at his cabin on the Upper Missouri. They hunted together for about 6 months before Daniel Boone's rheumatism forced him to return to his cabin. Stoner and his son continued the trek, going some 1,600 miles up the Missouri to the Yellowstone River before returning home to Wayne County, KY.

I was not able to establish why these two Stoner men came to Shreveport. They may be the George W. Stoner and the J. H. Stoner who served in Confederate regiments formed in East Texas, but no Stoner is listed as receiving a Confederate pension in Louisiana. As usual, I have ended up with about as many questions as answers. If I ever succeed in contacting present-day members of either family, I will be happy to write up a sequel.
