In May, a panel discussion was conducted by Mrs. Margery Wright and Mr. Norman E. Gillis. These experts were able to answer many questions asked by those present, and a great deal of information was presented.

Our June meeting was highlighted by reports from Mrs. Martha Harvin on the Dallas Workshop and by Mrs. Frank Slimer, Jr. on her recent trip to Fayette, Sumter and Tuscaloosea Counties of Alabama. Mr. Rupert Peyton, retired newspaper editor, gave a very interesting summary of the first white settlers of Bossier Parish.

The program for July has not been completed, but a representative of the Shreveport Beautification Bureau will discuss their Oakland Cemetery project, Dr. T. V. Holmes, Jr. will report on the Institute of Genealogy at Samford University, which he and E. M. Tipton attended, and plans for the Workshop will be completed.



In addition to these, the collective records of General LeRoy Stafford Camp of the Confederate Veterans have been microfilmed by the United Daughters of the Confederacy and placed in the Library. A committee of the UDC has indexed these records, thereby making them easier to use. We are fortunate to have these valuable local Confederate records preserved. Much credit and appreciation is due these ladies for their contribution to local history.

EDGEFIELD MARRIAGE RECORDS: South Carolina did not issue marriage licenses early, making it impossible to find maiden names of many women. This book has 4,000 entries alphabetized by grooms names, with index of brides names. The marriages were compiled from newspapers, family Bibles, tombstones and other sources, and the book is a boon to researchers who do not have access to many sources used by the author in compiling this list.

ALABAMA PORTRAITS: Has small picture of the portrait, name of person or person in the picture, with description and brief biographical data, and name of of present owner of the protrait and city where he now lives. An excellent book, well done.

PORTRAITS IN TENNESSEE: An inventory of portraits of early settlers of Tennessee and Alabama, does not have pictures of these portraits, but gives general descriptions of them, and can be very helpful to lucky Tennessee researchers.

This report was prepared by Mrs. Margery Wright, Genealogy Librarian, Shreve Memorial Library. Mrs. Wright is doing a wonderful job and we should let her know how much we appreciate her efforts in our behalf. Genealogists in this area are most fortunate to have someone with her ability and dedication working for them. #### **REPORT ON DALLAS WORKSHOP**

#### Martha M. Harvin

The 16th Annual Genealogical Workshop of the Dallas History and Genealogical Society was held in Dallas on May 15-16. Many Books and pamphlets were on display, along with maps, some of which could be purchased by those attending the workshop.

Mr. Herchel W. Anderson, President, welcomed the 134 registered at the Friday Session. Mr. Norman E. Gillis, of Shreveport and publisher of Mississippi records, gave a most informative talk on "Migrations from Mississippi to Texas." Mrs. Mary Bondurant Warren editor of <u>Georgia Genealogist</u> and <u>Carolina Genealogist</u> and <u>Family Puzzlers</u>, discussed "Genealogical Sources in Georgia and the Carolinas." Miss Pollyanna Creekmore, editor and compiler, and expert on East Tennessee, talked on "An Imaginary Tour of a Tennessee Courthouse." After supper, there was a panel discussion, moderated by Miss Mabel Wilkerson of the Dallas Society, based on questions previously sent in and answered by Mr. Gillis, Mrs. Warren and Miss Creekmore. All three of these speakers are experts in their fields, and were able to answer questions put to them during the afternoon session without notes or hesitation.

My special interest in going to the Dallas Workshop was to meet Mrs. Mary B. Warren. She had answered a letter I sent to the Athens Georgia Historical Society, asking for information on the origin of the name of Newton in my mother's name. Through her, I found a groups of "new" cousins, whom I had the pleasure of meeting later in Athens, Ga., and had lunch with them. Later, Mrs. Warren sent information to me on several lines that she found in the course of her research.

Registration began at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, at El Centro College, and the attendance was much larger than the first day, but I do not know the exact number attending this day. Miss Creekmore gave a comprehensive talk on "Courthouse Records and the Formation of Some of the Early Counties in Tennessee." Mrs. Warren followed with an illustrated talk on "Reconstructing Lost Records Through the Use of Newspapers," showing slides of pages from old newspapers during her talk. After lunch, Mr. Gillis continued his talk on "Migrations from Mississippi to Texas." Miss Creekmore followed with "How to Find Your Ancestors in Tennessee." Since I had to leave to catch a bus back to Shreveport, I was unable to hear Mr. Gillis lecture on "Publication of Genealogical Material, but he is a successful publisher and editor of genealogical material and I am sure he was of great help to those who were interested in having their own material published.

This is the first workshop away from Shreveport that I have had the priviledge of attending, and it was a very rewarding experience. Many publications and pamphlets were given to those holding lucky numbers each day, and the last number called was <u>mine</u>, for the one book I wanted most of all, "Kroger's Index to Thirty Thousand Immigrants to Pennsylvania," donated by Miss Pollyanna Creekmore. Since Shreve Memorial Library has Rupp's book of the same name, but no index, it has given me great pleasure to donate this volume to our **Genea**logy Department.

Mrs. J. R. McDonald, Chairman of the Workshop, and her committee did a wonderful job of organization and showing genuine hospitality to all those attending. During the coffee breaks and lunch period, a fabulous collection of books and maps were available for examination and purchase, some being brought by Miss Creekmore and others by the hosting Society.

The following data were brought in to Shreve Memorial Library to Mrs. Wright by a gentleman who did not leave his name:

From individual cemetery plot, still partially enclose with 48" x 1/2" steel spike fence. Located in Mt. Zion Cemetery on Mt. Zion-Lake Bisteneau Road, three miles southeast of Haughton, La., top of hill just beyond Clark's Bayou, left side of road, between PLANT and HODGES Family Cemetery plots. The monument bears the following inscription: "W. D. Vanarsdel, born April 27, 1814, was murdered August 1867 for his money and jewels. -- Erected by his twin sons, E. V. and A. W." The stone is marked "a Reynolds Headstone No. 160, Poydras, N.O."

Copying Tombstone inscriptions from old cemeteries is one of our main projects. We have records from several old cemeteries in Caddo, Union and Claiborne Parishes that will be published soon. #### NOTES ON OUR CARR FAMILY

#### Ema Lee Tipton

James Carr, 1739-1781, is said to have been the son of Robert Carr of South Carolina. Hannah (Hobbs) Carr, 1739-1806, married 1st an Oglesby, with one son born to this marriage, Elisha Oglesby, who is incorrectly listed as a son of James Carr. Hannah had a brother, Thomas Hobbs, who lived in Washington Co., Va. in 1780.

Elizabeth (Dobbins) Carr, 1778-1838, was the daughter of Alexander and Mary (Carson) Dobbins. Mary Carson was the daughter of John and Ann Carson of Bedford Co., Va.

William and Elizabeth (Dobbins) Carr had 14 children. When William died in 1856, he had 140 living descendents. His brothers also had large families. Most of my records were obtained from descendents of James D. Carr, 1797-1865, who have maintained family records down to the present generation, and have done quite a bit of research. Much data will be found in <u>Early Times in Middle Tennessee</u> by John Carr, 1773-1857, son of James and Hannah Carr.

Since Hannah and all her children moved to Sumner County Tennessee in 1784-85, the best places to find records are Sumner, Macon, Trousdale, Davidson and Wilson Counties, and in the Tennessee State Archives. Many descendents still live in Middle Tennessee, but shortly after the War Between the States, some of them moved to Missouri and to Kansas, and today, they are scattered all over the south and southwest.

Elizabeth Carr, born 8 Feb. 1818, was my great-great-grandmother. In 1837, she married Thomas Turner in Sumner County, and died in Wilson County Jan. 1915. If you are a Carr descendent, I will be glad to share my limited data with you. We spent two weeks in Tennessee in 1967, and hope to return some day to continue the research.

Address all personal mail to Mrs. Ema L. Tipton, Rt. 1, Box 403-D, Bossier City, La. 71010. I will look forward to hearing from you, but don't give up if I'm slow about answering your letter. I stay about six months behind with my own family records and correspondence.

#### FAMILY TRADITIONS

#### Ema Lee Tipton

Family traditions may prove only that someone in each generation cared enough to repeat them to younger members of the family. After a few generations, they may no longer resemble the original facts beyond a few names and places. However, you should never ignore or neglect your family traditions. Most of them are basically true and contain many important clues to the past. They are of little value outside your own family until they are proven, but if you set out to prove them without a good healthy sense of humor, you may lose your cool in a hurry. That ancestor who was supposed to have been a full chicken colonel may turn out to be a buck private in the rear ranks, and no matter what Washington you descend from, it won't be George. There are also other risks in trying to prove your old family traditions.

Being taught from infancy that my paternal grandmother descended from one of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence, my first project in genealogical research was to prove this beyond all doubt. Within three weeks I proved beyond all shadow of any possible doubt that she did <u>not</u> descend from this man and now some of my father's people won't even speak to me.

My maternal grandmother was supposed to have been a first cousin of another very famous man, but all I could learn was that she may have been a 3rd, or 4th, or 5th cousin, twice removed. As a result, all my mother's people seem to have a very low opinion of me as a genealogist.

Under similar circumstances, almost anyone with any sense at all would know it was <sup>+</sup>ime to stop tampering with sacred family traditions. But not me! I just love them, ollect them like mad, and prove or disprove each one with equal joy. I'm not one of hose nuts who insists on digging out and publicizing every minute detail of some unhappy story, no matter whom it hurts or embarrasses, and I don't mind leaving the dark dim past as dark as possible for some things as long as it doesn't cloud the truth, but the whole truth, nothing but the truth about most of my ancestors always seems to have a few details that are fine and good and special. Of course, much of goodness and beauty is said to be in the eye of the beholder, and perhaps I am just a bit prejudiced in favor of my own kin.

Like many of you, we were brought up on fine old traditions that we must always remember and live up to lest our dear departed ancestors turn over in their graves. As a child, this terrified me, but now I just wish they would get up and answer a few questions.

Some version of a popular story exists in almost all old families and has been published in many proud family histories as being true, even in branches of mine. It tells of an ancestor who was tall, handsome, very wealthy, a famous statesman and/or military hero, always dressed in a velvet suit, lace trimmed shirt and brocade vest, strolling about the garden or library of his huge stately mansion, sipping some ambrosial concoction from a silver goblet and discussing important business matters with his equally stalwart, handsome, well-dressed and eventually famous sons, while beautiful ladies, dressed in bright silks, laugh and gossip in the cool shade of the spacious, flowered bordered, tile-floored veranda, sip tea from translucent china cups and do dainty handwork to keep from appearing idle, and hundreds of happy slaves sing as they tend the lush fields that stretch up and down the rich valley as far as the eye :an see - preferably the eye of an eagle or someone with a good telescope.

In many families, certainly in branches of mine, the real story would go like this: An ancestor who is rather frail and homely, an obscure farmer and part time Justice of Peace or School teacher, veteran of one brief, reluctant enlistment in an old war, dressed in frayed homespun, leaning against the well curb, gulping water from a gourd dipper and shouting encouragement to his equally scrawny, homely, poorly dressed sons who are struggling with logs in a partially cleared woodland, while pretty ladies, dressed in faded cotton, laugh and gossip in the cool shade of the crowded, cluttered, puncheon-floored porch and hall of the big Double-pen log house, sip coffee from chipped mugs, and busily card or spin cotton to weave into material for the family's clothing, and a few solemn-faced slaves whack aimlessly at the weeds and grass choking out the spindley cotton that shrivels in the hot, dry, leached-out hill land which stretches about one-half mile up and down the road to the adjoining small farms.

I can tell you right now, my hill-farm ancestors worked hard, and they had more sense than to wear their Sunday clothes for every day, and all the good dishes were saved strictly for company, weddings and funerals. When folks start bragging about their long solid line of wealthy, aristocratic ancestors, I can't help wondering why so many of mine seem to have "come from the poor side of the family", no matter what family they came from. However, poverty didn't seem to bother them, and most of them didn't seem to realize they were poor. Their homes were filled with love, laughter, and loyalty. Their joys were magnified and their sorrows minimized by the entire family sharing them, and they were too busy making ends meet, getting ahead, bringing up their children, and enjoying life for such foolishness as inferiority complexes, deepseated frustrations or damaged psychies. For more than 200 years they sometimes had to laugh to keep from crying and often whistled in the dark, but I never heard of one of them dying of loneliness, boredom or self-pity.

Don't fret if some of your family traditions turn out to be 99% untrue. The 1% that is true is what you are looking for, and frequently outweighs all the rest in importance and real value. Traditions are usually born of memories, often vague childhood memories, when some older relative tells the story from a half-forgotten past. Some families have had more good story tellers than others, and so just naturally have more good and interesting traditions. I'm sure that if grandpa had known I would some day try to check out his stories against the courthouse records, he would have been more explicit and would have included more details so I wouldn't have so much trouble now. If grandma had once thought I would ever check up on anything she said, she would have been perfectly furious, so I guess it's just as well I waited until she was gone to begin my research. No one ever questioned the complete accuracy of anything grandma ever said. Never!!

You must have guessed by now that I come from several long lines of very talented story tellers and that I treasure my legacy of old family traditions very highly. I certainly do! They are about all the legacy I ever had, and I wouldn't trade them for all the tangible riches in the world.

At a recent meeting, we were all charmed by the story of a family who came from South Carolina to Alabama in a borrowed wagon because they had lost everything and were too poor to buy a wagon of their own. The lady who told it was extremely proud of her ancestors who had the courage to start over in a new land, and the way they overcame the hardships they encountered there. Many families were impoverished by the Revolutionary War; many other in the South lost everything in the War Between the States. Their courage in these terrible times, and their ability to begin again seem more important to me than what they lost.

If you can only warm your pride with the story of some long ago famous wealthy ancestor, then your pride must be a cold, puny, insecure thing beyond all imagining, and very hard to live with. Honor your forefathers for what they were, not what they had, or what someone said they had.
