HARMON - HARMAN HISTORY, 19 B. C. to 1970 by Grace Harmon McGary. It is a well indexed book and sells for \$8.50 and may be ordered from the author, Mrs. Grace Harmon McGary, Louisville, Ill. 62858. The author includes so much ancient history that begins after the flood and the dispersal of Noah's sons. The family name Harmon begins in Germany, nineteen years before the birth of Christ, with a military leader that defeated the Roman army. The spelling of the name Harmon has had variants in all the countries they have lived, France, Holland, Germany and England. This family came to America in 1634 and it is from the early settlers in America that this book is most concerned. A beautifully written book and a tribute to a Family.

1820 FEDERAL CENSUS OF ILLINOIS, compiled by Lowell M. Volkel and James V. Gill. This is an 8½ x 11" soft back and sells for \$5.00 and may be ordered from the Heritage House, Rt. 1, Box 211, Thomson, Illinois. This book is indexed alphabetically and to the right of each name is given: County, Township, Census Page and Census line.

WILKINSON COUNTY, GEORGIA - GRAVESTONES WITH GENEALOGICAL Information compiled by Joseph T. Maddox of Irwinton, Georgia 31042.

WILKINSON COUNTY WILLS, 1817 - 1920 with GENEALOGICAL Information, compiled by Joseph T. Maddox of Irwinton, Georgia 31042.

The above two books contain some of the most valuable information to residents this area. Most of the early settlers came from GEORGIA, but there was always some who stayed, and some died and here is a record of them. Mr. Maddox has done a superb job of compiling these records and must have spent a lot of time to correlate the genealogical information with the Gravestones and Wills. SOCIETY OF COLONIAL WARS IN THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA is a register of the members of this organization, with brief genealogical information. The purpose of this group is to perpetuate the memory of the events of colonial history from the settlement of Jamestown, Virginia, May 13, 1607 to the Battle of Lexington, April 19, 1775. GOD'S COUNTRY - A HISTORY OF POUND RIDGE, NEW YORK by Jay Harris, 8 x 10½", Hard Back. Order from The Pequot Press, Chester Conn. 06412 - Price \$30.00. This book contains 541 pages and has numerous maps, pictures as well as genealogical information. The author is a newspaper woman and has documented all her findings. The era covered is from the Revolutionary War up to the present time. Many church records are included. This book would be invaluable to any one researching early settlers of the New York area. A copy of the 1850 census is given, an appendix and indexed. The book shows that the author has given many hours to her research and compiling of information.

NO BEGINNING - NO ENDING...By Logan D. Wilson. This book is 8½ x 11". Hard Back in red with gold title. The price is \$10.00. Order from the author at 1518 Travis St., Garland, Texas 75042. If you are interested in how this country was settled, with family traditions, Indian stories (real 'uns)? how a southerner got his citizenship back after The War Between The States of just looking for a lost ancestor. Then this book is for you. It includes 143 names of allied families and is written in a style that makes it read almost like a novel.

DESCENDANTS OF WILLIAM BARNETT, 1679 - 1762, compiled by James Duff Barnett, a descendant of the original William Barnett. How the book came to be written is an interesting story. Dr. James Duff Barnett, in his will, left all his genealogical material to some organization for editing, extending, copying and distribution to genealogical libraries with funds to complete and "to be used for the transportation of this gift". The Genealogical Forum of Portland, Oregon received this trust in July of 1959. This legacy consisted of an eight drawer filing cabinet, filled with material and also an assortment of maps. It was a monumental task. However they fulfilled the wishes of the legacy and this book is the result. It is a 8½ x 11", soft back and the price is \$5.50 post paid. The first meeting of the legislature of California established the northern line along the fortieth parallel of latitude. Later other counties were formed from it. Title to the county has been claimed by 7 Governments: Spain, England, France, Mexico, Bear Flag Republic, Russia and the United States. This book begins with Queen Bodicea, 52 A.D. and shows the direct line of descent from 125 most renowned Kings of Europe until 1400 A.D. Also shows the relationship to many Knights and Barons. The book is beautifully done and reflects the care and time that the author used in compiling it. All material is authenticated.

GENEALOGY OF THE ODIORNE FAMILY IN AMERICA, compiled by David W. Ordiorne, and can be ordered from the Masterco Press, Inc., P. O. Box 328, Ann Arbor, Michigan 48107. The price is \$10.50 pp. This is a history and genealogy of one of the oldest New England Families. They can trace their ancestry back to William Odiorne and Agnes Hickens, who were married 24 November 1625 in Sheviok, Cornwall, England. It is not known when the first Odiorne came to America but the records show that he purchased land in Portsmouth, N.H. and it is from his descendants that this book traces to the present time.

THE PIONEERS WERE OUR ANCESTORS, VOL I & II. Written by Irwin Anderson Watson. Price \$8.00 per volume. This is the history of the Anderson, Ayres, Armstrong and related families. It begins in Hardin County, Tenn. and gives their experiences from there to Grayson County, Texas. The book reads like a novel, they include so many stories of experiences during the War Between the States and how this family, who were a close knit group, came to Texas. This book is a genealogy of the Parr family (with allied branches of Holdren, Hutchinson, Moore, Jolly, Franks, Sheets, et al.) covering eight generations of descendants from Stephen Parr, 1730 to 1968, through Maryland, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio; including early English, Quaker, Pennsylvania, Delaware and Maryland records. Full of human interest as well as accurate data, the book contains a listing of over 1,000 descendants, the Parr Coat of Arms, maps of where the family lived in Smithfield Township and Marshall Counties, Ohio and a picture of Clement La Dell Parr.

THE SINEATH FAMILY AND AFFILIATED FAMILY LINEAGES by William Rudolph Bauer. Order from William R. Bauer, 113 Valcour Rd., Columbia, S. C. 29210, Price \$25.00 postpaid; hardback, indexed. This is a requisite to a complete genealogy. The author says no expense has been spared to make it as complete as possible. The first 250 pages is a genealogy of the Sineath Family. The next 83 pages are lineages of affiliated families: Alston, Bauer, Boineau, Ichabod Davis, Farley, Flowers, Kirton, Meteringham, Rhame, Mickler, Ulmer, Villepentoux, Sennott, Sennett and or Synath) is found mainly in Ireland. Sir Walter Sinnett, a Knight of great valor, came to Wexford, Ireland about 1172. It is the belief of the author that all the Sinnetts of England and America are

descendants from this ancestor, and practically all of these are from County Waxford, Ireland ancestors. Earliest records in South Carolina spell the name Sineth, Synith and Sinith. The earliest record of the surname Sennott in South Carolina is found in a 1749 land record in Fredricksburg Township (later Camden). They moved to other counties in South Carolina and to North Carolina and Georgia and later to Florida.

SOUTHERN-BORN AND BRED, 315 pages, hardback, \$14.75 postpaid, order from Mrs. Estelle Rogers Vaughn, 7 East Canal Ave., Lewes, Del. 19958. This genealogy is divided into two books, the first a reprint of Dr. W. L. Lipscomb's "A History of Columbus, Mississippi - During the 19th Century". Photographs and illustrations are throughout this book with an index of about 500 names, and addenda by Mrs. Vaughn. Dr. Lipscomb's history discusses everything from the Site of Columbus, The Earliest Inhabitants of Columbus (before 1821), A Farewell to the Log Cabin, Religious - Churches and Benevolent Societies to the Civil War in Columbus. The Second Book is a Genealogical History of the Family of Judge Stephen Albert and Mary Owen Brown of Columbus, Miss. This part starts with a detailed table of content, then the Diary and Autobiography of Judge Stephen A. Beown. Each family is discussed individually with old photographs, federal census, tax rolls, deeds, tombstone inscriptions, wills and other records are used to document this family history. Surnames of some of the family groups discussed are Brown, Vaughn, Thompson, Owen, Sims, Allen (Allin), and Grant.

A FAMILY HIERARCHY IN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, 1619-1971.

By C. E. Cameron, 4816 Reith Road, Kent, Washington 98031. This book contains Cameron and Allied Kinze and Warth Families, including many other allied families with the proved ancestor lines of this Cameron House from their arrival at Plymouth, Massachusetts in 1620 on the first ship "Mayflower". This book was copyrighted in 1972 and has Library of Congress Catalogue Card Number 73-186942. Anyone researching New England ancestors would do well to read this book. The author has authenticated all material. Many names are mentioned that might give a lead to some long lost ancestor. Because an ancestor has not been mentioned in history, is no indication he did nothing notable or of value. Many people do fine things in their lives that the press or historians know nothing about. One reason that Louisiana can be a genealogist's "Garden of Eden", is the structure of the law, which preserves a woman's identity and allows a married woman's maiden name to be known in almost all cases. The original settlers were mainly direct, or one or two generations removed, from frontiers of pre-Revolutionary southern colonies of North Carolina and South Carolina. The information in this book was collected between, 1960 and 1962 and is related to that time. Throughout the book there are interesting accounts of the families.

THIS MAN DAVID, by Juanita Daniel Zackary. Order from Quality Printing Co., Inc. P. O. Box 1060, Abilene, Texas 79604. Hardback 243 pages, illustrated, documented, index, maps and charts. Descendants of the emigrant ancestor, David Rumph the first, are indeed fortunate to have such a complete record of their family, up to the present generations. The Rumph family, of German-Swiss origin, was given land grants in South Carolina, and came to America to escape Protestant persecution in Europe. David I, presumed to be the son of Christian Rumph, had five sons and five daughters. As a young man, he moved to Georgia, settling in Randolph Co., and became a very prosperous and influential citizen. The Civil War cost him, not only a son, but his fortune. Conditions were so bad in Georgia after the war, that the family decided to move to Texas, about 1870. One of the sons, Mal, married a Bossier Parish girl, Eliza Ann Butts, in Benton, La. They joined the rest of the family in the trek to Texas, drifting from Hunt to Fannin to Red River to Grayson Counties. David was determined to go even farther West, and became one of the first permanent settlers of Taylor County. Here he died at age seventy of pneumonia. Two of his sons moved westward to the Panhandle, leaving their mother, Mary in Taylor Co. From the hardy stock of "this man David" came many distinguished descendants...doctors, ministers, military men.

SHROCK FAMILY HISTORY, order from Oscar R. Miller, Box 133, Berlin, Ohio 44610. \$3.00 postpaid, 121 pages with index and historical introduction. Descendants of Henry Shrock and Barbara Miller Shrock, from 1807 - 1971. Research indicates the family emigrated to America from Germany, however they originated in Switzerland. John Schrock emigrated in 1785, was grandfather of Henry Shrock. John listed in 1790 Census of Lancaster Co., Pa. A total of 1,386 descendants are listed. The book is full of interesting family group pictures, also a copy of land deed from Gov. of Ohio to Henry Shrock, 7 Nov 1834. A most interesting and orderly record.

Nicholas Scherrer, born about 1675, died 20 Feb 1764, Oberbetsback, Kheinland, Germany. Three known children: George Theobold, a daughter who's name is unknown, and Jacob Daniel. The emigrant to America was Jacob Daniel Scherrer, b. 11 Nov 1726 at Germany, d. 26 Sept 1795, Guilford Co., N. C. He was a tailor in Germany. Within three years of his coming to America he married, Hannah Sophia Dick, 7 Oct 1755. The rest of the book deals with his family and descendants that came to Montgomery County, Illinois. After the second generation the name changed from Scherrer to Scherer.

At least two more typists will be required for each issue and special publications to type off-set masters. Electric typewriters are required for this work.
