

# FDITCORS

Decendants of Georgia and Alabama settlers who came to north Caddo Parish before the War Between the States and hundreds of their friends dedicated markers the last day of 1976 at Rodessa, La. Their forebears had first settled at Frog Level, four miles east. Honorable Noah Tyson, a fourth-generation product of these pioneers, greatly aided in securing the markers. They were two pedestals, on top of each was a giant frog above and the legend Alabama and Georgia. A scroll between the two pedestals told the story of the founding of this ghost town.

Neil Abeles, editor of the Caddo Citizen at Vivian, told the story of the families who once received their mail at Frog Level. Among them were the names of T. E. Perry, Travis Spearman, W. B. Spearman, J. P. Spearman, Sam Spearman Sr. And Sam Spearman Jr., T. H. Perry, Prof. Lawton, Shem Tyson Sr., Haly Ryan, J.A. Ham, Ben Nugent, Sam Sewell, Bill Luce, Jud Elder, Joe Boseman, Jim Jimmerson, W. H. Adams, Roland Brown, Pink Calloway, Sam Durden, Bill Foster, John Irwin, Hugh McKellar, A.C. Hartzo, Joe Atkins, John Keel, Jim Proctor, Alf Aaron, Will Godfrey, Sam Coleman, Teg Slaughter, Grant Boseman, Dr. Matthews, Robert Brown Sr., Bill Brown, Tate Caldwell, Robert Dawson, J. W. Garner, Chess Gerald and Henry McKellar, as well as the Tyson family.

Postmasters had been M. C. Spearman, William G. Spearman, John B. Spearman, George B. Park, Thomas R. Simmons, Benjamin F. Nugent, and finally Armory G. Pitts to balance out the 22-year span from 1879-1901 when it was moved to Rodessa. It had been on a star route out of Atlanta, Texas.

There are many interesting cemeteries in Caddo Parish, especially in the eastern and northern sections where early settlers lived to be above the low and unhealthy Red River bottoms.

NATCHITOCHES PARISH NOTES

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History has no geographical boundaries; like an octopus, it stretches its tentacles in all directions. Where does history begin? At what point in time does one particular portion of history begin?

Let us begin the history of the area now known as Natchitoches Parish by pointing out the first trail to the Rio Sabinas (Sabine River) and the River Hondo was marked and established fifty-nine years before the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock, and nearly a half century before Pocahontas walked the path through the settlement at Jamestown.

The study of this area deals with four different ethnic groups; Indian, Spanish, French and Anglo-American, who, in that sequence occupied a region that at one time was bordered by the Mississippi River on the east, the Sabine on the west, and the Ouachita to the north. No other area in American can claim the footprints of more glamorous characters than can the trails that led from Natchez Trace West through what is now called Natchitoches, through the Arroyo Hondo and on to the Sabine River.

In 1528 a ship from Florida was wrecked on the Gulf Coast near Sabine Bay and one of its' officers, Alvar Cabeza de Vaca, along with a dozen sailors struggled to safety. de Vaca was treasurer of the expedition and he kept a journal in which he tells of his nine years travels in a very large area. He mentions the Atoyos Indians who lived near the Sabine River. Fifty-four years later another white man visited the Atoyos whose name was de Tonti, and who wore an iron hook where his left hand should have been. He had joined LaSalle and had been left in this area until LaSalle returned. While waiting he visited this part of Louisiana now known as Natchitoches Parish, where lived a unit of Indians who lived on a stream of creeping red water, which they called "river of blood". He did not know that many years later French traders would call the stream Riviere Rouge, and the village Natchitoches.

The first group of white men to settle here were Spanish missionaries who brought the Christian faith to the American Indian long before Sir Walter Raleigh learned to smoke tobacco in Virginia. They established schools in the lands they serviced, and brought a printing press to the new world in 1536. In June, 1561, the King of Spain ordered coldiers to mark and establish a trail across the province of Tejas to the village of the Adae Indians, who were located on a stream called the Rio de los Adaes. This was located near the present town of Robeline in Natchitoches Parish about fifteen miles west of Natchitoches. This route became known as El Camino Real (The King's Highway) and L s Caminos Reales applied to the network which radiated from Mexico City. There is another road almost as famous as El Camino Real which also crossed the Sabine River close to the present town of Many in Sabine Parish which was part of the network. It is called the "Old Spanish Trail" and it led to what is now St. Landry Parish.

The French had established a colony at Mobile on the northern fringe of

The Gulf of Mexico that had designs upon trade relations with the Kodohadacho (Caddo) Indians. They tried to trade with Mexico by sending a cargo of goods to Vera Cruz; thye were not permitted to land, so they determined to establish trade relations by going overland. The traders, on returning to Mobile, reported successful trade with the Indians as far west as Adaes, but were alarmed at the encroachment upon what they considered French territory. It was determined a trading post, and perhaps a military fort must be established.

These first settlers on Red River were adventurers from Florida who sailed and paddled up the Mississippi and Red Rivers in 1685. They established a camp there that grew into or was at least the birthplace of Fort St. Jean de Baptiste. They were the first to block Spanish advancement further eastward. This confrontation occurred along the insignificant waters called Rio Hondo and which the Spaniards later named Arroyo Hondo. There are interesting items in the American State Papers relating to Rio Hondo Land Claims, some of which will be included in subsequent issues of Natchitoches Parish Notes.

Natchitoches derives its' name from a unit of the Kccohadacho Nation, while the Riviere Rouge, passing nearby was given its' name by the French. About four miles west is the Arroyo Hondo which is surely a Spanish name. Today the Arroyo Hondo consists of a chain of mud-puddles vaguely connected, even though maps honored it with the name Rio Hondo. No doubt erosion had reduced its size and depth, and insignificant as it seems today, it was the boundary line between opposing French and Spanish colonies and was recognized as such as late as the Louisiana Purchase.

The colony at Mobile was getting choice goods from France and it was necessary they be disposed of some way. The failure to establish trade with Mexico served as a challenge so they decided to trade with the Indians for a start, with the idea of gradually overcoming the Spanish. They wanted a man with leadership and the ability to trade with the Indians. They found such a man in Louis Juchereau St. Denis, a cousin of Iberville and Bienville Lemoine. He was well liked by high officials as well as couriers, was well dressed, polished and quite handsome. St. Denis started immediately to western Louisiana; he had in mind going on into Mexico, but on arriving at Grande Ecore, an important port four miles north of present day Natchitoches, he heard so much about Indian attacks he asked twenty-four braves to accompany him. He was arrested and taken to the presidio of San Juan Bautista and charged with violating the lase. Here he met Emmanuelle, the daughter of his jailor, was captivated by her beauty, she also was smitten and they were married. When he was released they returned to Natchitoches where they lived for the rest of their lives.

In 1718 war broke out between France and Spain, and St. Denis was ordered to capture Pensacola because it was the largest Apanish fort in North America. Emmanuelle went ,with him to Florida, and the Viceroy of Mexico ordered the abandonment of all missions in the proximity of the Sabine River including 7 on the west side and Los Adaes on the east. After hostilities were over the Spanish returned to Adaes determined to contain the French east of the Arroyo Hondo. Soon after they returned to Adaes, Aguyo with 2000 soldiers and citizens from Tejas and Mexico erected a substantial presidio.

The capital of the Province of Louisiana was moved **from** Mobile to New Orleans and the fort at Natchitoches became a focal point of great interest to both France and Spain.

Specific orders were given to St. Denis to destroy the presidio and missions at Los Adaes, but in spite of his orders he set in motion a plan to live in peace and harmony with the Spanish. If the truth were admitted, his plan contained an element of duplicity, and the letters which passed between Natchitoches and Los Adaes were quite ferocious, but the respective monarchs need not know that already Frenchmen were attending services at the Los Adaes Mission; they need not know that when a priest was needed at Natchitoches to conduct funerals or marriages one of the good fathers would cross the Arroyo Hondo on a foot-log, mount a waiting mule and ride to Fort St. Jean de Baptiste. France had refused to appropriate funds for the construction of a mission at Natchitoches so the officials were not in a position to punish members of the French Colony for attending mass at Los Adaes. Eventually Louis and Emmanuelle built a chapel in their residence, and its' use was not restricted to Frenchmen.

In 1744 St. Denis died at Natchitoches and was buried there. The probate of his estate is still in the court house in Natchitoches.

At the end of the French and Indian War in 1762, France gave everything she owned in the Western Hemisphere to England and Spain. To England went everything east of the Mississippi River. Of course, she did not own Florida so she persuaded Spain to exchange Florida for Cuba which England had captured during the war. Everything west of the Missippi River was ceded to Spain, and inasmuch as Natchitoches and Los Adaes were so close together it was decided to abandon Los Adaes and the settlers moved from the district. There is very little evidence of the mission having ever been at Los Adaes, but there is a monument erected there. It is a very short distance off Highway 6 between Robeline and Natchitoches.

Natchitoches - a unique parish. Through the 18th century there were French names like Grande Ecore, Riviere Rouge, Aux la Cannes, Jean Baptiste on the east side, whereas on the west side there were Arroyo Hondo, Rio Sabinas, Los Adaes and many others. One group is French, the other Spanish, while the name Natchitoches itself is Indian. Verily an unusual parish.

When the Louisiana Purchase was completed, the residents of Natchitoches experienced an unusual happening. Many people born in the latter part of the 18th century and early years of the 19th, saw the flag over their fort change three times. September 3, 1762 the Province of Louisiana was ceded to Spain, but in 1802 the flag shifted back to France, when, by the Treaty of Madrid, Napoleon forced Charles IV to refeede the territory back to France. The third change took place 30 April 1803 when the U.S. bought Louisiana and raised the flag of 15 stars and 15 stripes over the old fort.

On October 1, 1804, Louisiana was divided into two parts by Congressional action. The upper portion was given the name "District of Louisiana" and the lower portion "Territory of Orleans". Immediately after the formation of the Territory of Orleans, large numbers of Americans from South of the Ohio moved into the new acquisition. In 1805 Louisiana was divided into 12 counties and in 1807 the Orleans Territory was partitioned into 19 parishes. Parts or all of the following counties have been carved from Natchitoches Parish: Bienville, Bossier, Caddo, Claiborne, DeSoto, Grant, Jackson, Lincoln, Red River, Sabine, Vernon, Webster and Winn.

THERE WILL ALSO BE COMMENTS ABOUT CERTAIN AREAS, OLD TOWNS THAT HAVE COMPLETELY DISAPPEARED, LARGE LAND GRANTS, ETC.

The first family enumerated in this parish is that of PHILLIP WAGLEY. There will be an asterisk and #1 by his name. It is mere coincidence that the author has much information about this family and will write the first note in this undertaking. There are many ways to spell the above name WAGLEY. The following list is just a few.

Waegele, Waegiel, Waegelin, Waegil, Wageley, Wagele, Wagelik, Wagelin, Waggley, Waggel, Waglay, Wagli, Wagly, Wegèlin, Weggeli, Weglie, Wegli, Weggelin, Weigle, Weigley, Wigle, Wiglie, Wigley and Wigly.

At different periods various causes and motives induced the Germanic peoples to abandon their VATERLAND and since the year 1606 millions have left their old homes to seek new ones.

In 1689 during one of the many French Wars, the countries for miles around, and especially in the Duchy of Baden, which is part of the Palitinate were laid waste as this had happened so many times in the past the citizens homes, farms and business pillaged and uprooted, they realized they could not exist much longer. The period from 1702 to 1727 marked an era in the early German emigration. Between forty and fifty thousand left their native country.

Between the years 1708-09 thirty-three thousand at the invitation of Queen Anne, left the Rhine Country for Londaon. They were destitute, and as so many came at once, England could not care for all of them. Some were sent to Ireland and many others to the colonies.

In the New York Archives is a copy of a paper read before a Palatine gathering giving the history of one of the groups of 40 families who left England for New York to extract tar for her Majesties Navy. The experiment was a complete failure. The tar was not of the quality to waterproof the boats and these 40 families were left destitute. They were indentured and placed on Livingston Manor. To escape oppression and starvation, they left there late in the autumn of 1712 for Schoharie Valley. Then in the spring of 1723, 33 families moved to Tulpehocken, Pennsylvania.

In this group of Palatines to New York was Hans Michael Weigle. (Henceforth in my articles spelled WAGLEY.)

From- 'HISTORY OF LOWER SALFORD TOWNSHIP' by James Y. Heckler - printed 1883, Harleysville, Pa.

"On Jan. 10, 1736, George Wagley bought land from Gerhart Clemens, but it appears from several circumstances that Hans Michael Wagley had owned the land several years previous and payment was made by annual installments. In 1734 tax list we find Hans Michael Wagley rated on 100 acres, and in conveyance given by Gerhart Clemens and wife to William Gerges in 1735, the land on one side is not bounded by George Wagley, but by Michael Wagley. From other circumstances it appears Michael Wagley bought the land as early as 1720, and later the conveyance itself made to George Wagley. In 24 Aug. 1759, George and wife Margaret sold land to George Schambach and we have nothing more on this family in Pa.

There may have been a tie between the Magley family and the Quakers or perhaps the Palatines moved with the Quakers as they sent colonies south, particularly North Carolina, between 1760 and 1800.

A the holding of slaves became more and more of an issue, there was a wholesale exodus of Quakers, and there who were strongly opposed to slavery from Virginia, North Carolina and Couth carolina, as to free states particularly Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

This is the migration pattern of this Wagley family.

In 1760 we find in Burke County, N.C. John E. gley who would be the right age to be the son of Hans Michael of Lower Salford Township Pennsylvania, and who was born in Pennsylvania. It is <u>believed</u>, but <u>not proven</u>, that this John was son of the original Hans Michael of the group over to New York to extract tar. John Wagley was father on one boy and three girls. The son, Abraham born 2 February 1768 in Burke Co., N.C. lived in Filinois, Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas. He died in Clarksville, Red River County, Texas 1842/43 where his estate was probated.

South of Rayville, La. just beyond a modern housing development on Nelson Bend Road, a clearing project is underway reminiscent of pioneer days. But instead of the steady swinging of axes, chopping away at the growth of trees, there is the whine of chain saws. Tall trees fall. Dozens of them have come crashing to the ground. Dense smoke fills the air, burning the great piles of dried out trees and brush with more stacked up as work progresses. Fire runs across the ground burning dry grass, weeds, and bathes cane that pops and hisses. Smoke smudged tombstones, some standing, and some lying flat on the ground appear forlorn in this sacred place.

Clearing the overgrown Horn Cemetery is a Bicentennial project undertaken by the Rayville United Methodist Church. Deeded to the Methodist Episcopal Church South back in 1860, by John Horn and his wife, Patience Sims Horn for the sum of twenty dollars, the one square acre remains the property of the church. This was the site of the first Methodist Church in Rayville. Because of its historical significance the church is endeavoring to restore the cemetery to a state of dignity.

However, this project calls for the concern and interest of the entire community. And in particularly, those families who have relatives buried here. Action is needed to keep the old cemetery in a state of respect and dignity.

Monday afternoon, the writer visited the cemetery to copy the tombstone inscriptions. A surprisingly large number of markers were found, with some graves marked with a piece of pipe, and others with water well pipe points. Roaming about the gloomy grounds, many unmarked sunken places were noted, and some were still covered with fallen trees and brush.

Of markers recorded, the name of Nelson was frequently found, which should give credence in the naming of the road, Nelson Bend. Another name of prominence was that of Narcissus Francis Chennault and Stephen Nelson Chennault, grandparents of General Claire Chennault of Flying Tiger fame.

About a dozen appear to be receiving regular care, with the plots cleaned and a bouquet of artifiacial flowers tucked around the combstone. At Cynthia and in Antley's grave, golden daffodils are in bloom beside the cement slab that cov-- 10 \$000 ers her grave. Charnar Branch's grave is also covered with a slab and is in the 1. C ( good condition; Adolphus P. and Addie R tcliff's grave are beautifully cared for with poinsettias tucked at the base of large monuments. Mary E. Moore's plot is surrounded by a high hurricane fence, and is in good condition, as the second well as those that are buried nearby. These families are to be commended for their concern. - S. 197

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# MILITARY SERVICE RECORDS AND PENSIONS (A MUST for Researchers)

The benefit of the military service records and pensions records has been a debatable issue for some time, but personally, I think they are one of the best fields for research outside of the census records. True, many of the papers may be of little value or have almost no information at all, but this is true of many research problems. On one census you MIGHT find your family, then again you might not, thus it is true also with the military and pension records. But for the persons interested in joining historical organizations such as, the United Daughters of the Confederacy, National Society of the Daughters of 1812, or the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, these records are a <u>MUST</u>. Copies of these military records MUST be included with application papers for these and any other o ganization of this type.

From the very earliest of Wars and Conflicts, the records of military service, pension records, and bounty records have been collected and deposited in the National Archives, Washington, D.C. These records (copies) can be obtained from the Archives for a nominal fee of \$3.00 per file searched or requested. Example- If your ancestor happened to be listed in two spallings of his name, there might be a fee of \$6.00. If you then want pension files, another \$3.00. I might caution that although it is <u>usually not</u> the case--you might only receive one piece of paper with information. The normal file received usually runs from 6-10 pages and if it is a very large file, the Archivist in Washington will abstract the most important papers, sending them to you. In a case like this, where you have received a large file, you might again request; or at the first request, ask for the entire file sent to you. The cost at that time will be higher than the \$3.00 fee. At one time it was 10¢ per page over the normal sent, the cost may now be 15¢.

The MILITARY RECORDS will consist of roster cards listing; if the man was present at roll call, giving pay, rank, and other military-linked statements, BUT, they will also list at time, the man's age, place of enlistment, and a brief description of him. Also, his place of discharge or where he was paroled or died. Many clues for the researchers can be found among these records.

<u>Pension records</u> are one of the greatest aids to the researcher, in my opinion, even though, they too have exceptions. For the most part, these sworn affidavits given by the veteran at the Circuit Court of the County in which he lives at time of pension application, contain records that often-times can be found no place else. Besides listing his military service as to where and under whom he served, he may also include his birthplace, wife's name, marriage dates, bible records, children's names (those still living at home). There may also be a WIDOW'S pension application, after the veteran's death, containing more information to add to your records. But you must bear in mind, these pensions could only be applied for in case of medical disability, ill health due to age, and little or no real property. As an example- one of my ancestral uncles

applied for pension after a court clerk had appraised his farm at about \$2000.00 and his pension at that time was rejected. Later it was appraised again at about \$1300.00 and he was eligible to draw pension, therefore, I would guess the limit of owning land and pension eligibility must have been aroun \$1500.00. Therefore, even if the pension was REJECTED, do not overlook, seeking it, it would still contain the same affidavits. Tension records are available from Revolutionary War through the War Between the States (Civil war), if application was made.

Before I continue with this article, I would give you a word of caution---NEVER, NEVER SEND MONEY WITH YOUR REQUEST FOR ANY OF THESE RECORDS. If the records are found, copies will be sent to you with a bill for the cost. This is ALWAYS THE CASE OF THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES. In some State Archives, they will also bill in this manner, while others will advise you, per your SASE (selfaddressed stamped envelope) of their cost for copies of your ancestor's records. M st State Archives require 10¢ or 15¢ per page for copy, others are higher, so be sure and ASK, COST PER COPY.

Bounty Land Records, are another source of information that will help you locate where the veteran lived after his service and give you the locality to search for will probate, marriage records and land deeds of the county in which he settled. A the Bounty Land recorde run only from the Revolutionary War through the Mexican War, these are of benefit in assisting the researcher in finding ancestors that wished to cut new trails over a vast horizon which beckoned them with vast tracts of "free land". These records are of great assistance in that gap between the Revolutionary war and the Civil War; for the War of 1812 and the Mexican War records also had much to aid in research and should NOT BE OVERLOOKED.

The Mar Between the States (Civil Mar) records are a bit different in locating as the Federal (Union) records are all found in the National Archives if they are to be had at all, but the Confederate records are not. THERE ARE MANY CONFEDERATE RECORDS IN THE NATIONAL ARCHIVES, BUT NOT ALL. And, should you have the opportunity to visit the Archives at Mashington, do NOT look for the Confederate records among the regular military service records, as they will NOT be there. They are filed, I have been told, under Foreign Government records. Fortunately, all of the Confederate military rosters that had not been lost, burned or destroyed, and were turned in by the Confederate States, have been put on micro-filem--listing the veteran's name, rank, and state and unit from which he served, nothing else. But, they will assist you in writing for the service record. There are 167 rolls of micro-film of the Confederate service men on file in our Shreve Memorial Library. These films have been donated primarily by the Sons of Confederate Veterans and although this is not a complete set of the Confederate rolls, they may contain your encestor. If not, the film have been \$12.00 a roll and would make a fine donation to the library. if yours is not among them. The Genealogical Room librarians will be glad to assist you in this project, if you desire information.

As stated earlier, the National Auchives does house many of the Confederate records, but it <u>does not</u> contain <u>any OF THE CONFEDERATE PENSION</u> <u>RECORDS</u>. These records were contained in the state from which the veteran served and/or lived when he applied for pension. They were also paid by the state when funds were made available, for the war had many Southern States Treasuries, stripped of funds. Most of them did manage to pay some small amount to their veterans. Because of these Confederate Pension records being

contained by the respective state, I will include at the close of this article the list of the Southern states having information pertaining to Confederate Pensions, as furnished by the National Archives.

This article is not meant as a complete study of the Military Service Records, Pensions, and Bounty Land Claims, but rather as a means to inform you of their content, point out their value, and advise you where these records may be obtained. It would also be impossible to write into this article all of the benefits of these records, but I would point out in the genealogy study course now being conducted by our Ark-La-Tex Genealogical Association, I have been asked to share with you from time to time, a class on Researching these records. At those times, I will try to share with you the many things I have learned, show you the forms used (and I have a few to give out), show you some actual records on ALL the types mentioned in this article, and will do my utmost, to answer any questions or help with any problems as our time permits. In closing, I would like to leave one thought with you that I have felt since my first days of research and still do, even more strongly today -- NEVER, NEVER get discouraged, for if these records you seek are not at one place, or that ancestor where you thought he was, he is surely to be someplace else; it will just take a little longer to find him. This is my personal thought and it is my hope that this article will encourage you to look to these most rewarding Military records.

After enlistment, he was marched to Petersburgh, Va., Hillsborough, N.C., Salabury, N.C.-- to Charlotte, then Camden, S.C., Nelson's Ferry, then to ?? in South Carolina, back to Camden, then to Hanging Rock where taken prisoner.

(Signed by his mark)

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Witnesses by John Cocke, clerk of the court, 20 Aug 1832.

It appears they cut off his pension and he went back to restate his deposition in 1st Oct. 1843-- records do not show if he regained it. Letter also attached from a Mrs. John McBee, Mobile, Ala. 23 Nov., 1933 appears to be in reference to Wardry McBee, Commissioner stated Vardry Mabgly.

# McBEE, SILAS --#S 7202

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Applied for pension at Loundes Co., Mississippi 13 Feb. 1833. Circuit Court sitting at Columbus, Miss.-- age 68 years. Enlisted July 1781 near Tates Ferry, South Carolina under Col. Thomas Brandon in Company of Capt. John Thompson and Lt. Isiah Tanner. Marched south to Ft. Anderson, then marched to join Gen. Thomas Sumpter, later attached to Gen. Williams Brigade to Kings Mountain by 17 Oct. 1781. After battle served three more months, discharged returned home to Spartanburg Dist., where he had been raised as a child from one year. States his father emigrated from Virginia, where he (Silas) was born, "in early part of Nov. 1781 re-enlisted under command of Capt. Fields under command of Col. Andrew Picking until March or April 1782, then discharged. Silas McBee died 6 Jan. 1845, survived by widow- (name not given) --one paper seems to imply she (widow) applied for pension on 12th March 1846-- drawing \$20.00 per annum.)

On July 1852 1st day Elizabeth Byram age 62 made affidavit in Franklin Co. Tenn. states she is daughter of Martha Holt widow of Shadrach Holt a pensioner, that her mother Martha Holt died 23 November 1846 leaving the following children: NANCY LOCKEY or LOKY) ELIJAH HOLT AND affiant Elizabeth Byran, that her father was married to her mother prior to 1st Jan. 1794.

AFFIDAVIT OF JACOB REYNOLDS made in Franklin Co. Tenn. July 1 1852 states he was well acquainted with Shadrach Holt a pensioner, and knows he was husband of Martha Holt decd. That he is well acquainted with the children of them states Martha Holt died 28 Nov. 1846.

Affidavit made by James Byran in F anklin Co. Tenn. age 64 that he died leaving widow Martha Holt, that he is well acquainted with Elijah Holt one of their children.

AFFIDAVIT made in Orange County North Carolina by I. Allison county court clerk, 1852 December 23, stating that he has made diligent search for the marriage record of Shadrach Holt to MARTHA SALINGER that that said bond cannot be found. I further certify that although the records of this office dates back 100 years yet there are no marriage bonds older than 71 years, the oldest being dated 1781, that there is but one dated in that year and that the files appear to have been carelessly kept, for many years afterwards and I have no doubt many bonds are mislaid or entirely lost.

THERE IS A SEPARATE MPER SHOWING THE CHILD OF SHADRACH HOLT deceased was a pensioner of the roll of the Nashville agency at rate of \$20 per year under Law of June 7 1832. dated Oct 5 1853 but did not show which child. As the death dates are given for both he and widow we might find the final payment papers, but I would require at least \$2.50 as it is very times taking.

Almost all students of history are fairly well acquainted with the facts of the mid-century revolution in Germany. However, few realize that these German uprisings had a direct bearing on the history of northern Alabama.

Most of the political foundations of central Europe had been overthrown by Bonaparte around the beginnings of the 19th century. His desire to create an empire like other despots was defeated at the battle of Leipzig by soldiers from Germany and Austria. Having taken such a heroic part in the struggle for victory the people had hoped for a type of government in which they might have part. Or course this never happened. The rulers denied them all participation so the people reacted and there began a long period of oppression. Many left their fatherland and came to America hoping to establish homes in a free land and a new outlet for their talents. Others resisted and became leaders in a struggle for liberty which resulted in the revolutionary outbreaks of the year 1848.

In May 1848, the Revolution broke out in Bavaria and a youth of twentyfive years, John G. Cullman (Johann Gottfried Cullman) made himself a part of it from that time until it ended in 1864.

-Cullman was well educated, having attended the city school of Frankenweiler, of which his father was principal. After making a good record at Frankenweiler he entered Polytechnic College at Zweibruecken at age thirteen. After he graduated here he entered the mercantile business.

By now he was full grown and he moved to Neustadt an der Haard where he soon advanced to an independent position as american exporter.

At Newstadt he met Josephine Loeb, and they were married in 1848 only a few months before the revolution in Bavaria. There were three children from the marriage, Theodore Gottlieb, Otto Gottfried and Maria.

From 1848 until 1864 he was involved with the revolutionary pattern for southern Germany. Open and armed revolt began in Baden and in the Palatinate, a department of Bavaria. (The Palatinate has also been called Rhine Bavaria, in German Pfalz.) The revolutionist proclaimed the sovereignty of the people at Kaiserlantern, a place only a few miles from the Cullman ancestral home. The Palatinato was declared an independent state and a government set up. Soon prussian troops advanced into Rhine Bavaria.

The rebellion was nipped in the bud, but it did'nt remedy the causes that brought it about. Jails were so overcrowded that prisoners had to be sent away in order to have room for new arrivals. In addition to this, starvation and proverty made its appearance. There had been two successive crop failures, and business was at a complete stand-still.

As the country could no longer support its population many people of this region came to America. The press stated 5,700 Palatines came in 1851, and 8,900 in 1852, came to America. John Cullman took up his old life again, but as his participation in the revolution was known he had to be careful. His wife was ill, he had lost quite a fortune and he began to make definite plans to come to America. He left his wife, in 1864, in the care of his daughter, Mrs. Ludwig Richard, who lived at Franfort and Main and came to America, not only to make a new home for himself but forhis fellow countrymen. # CULIMAN COUNTY ALABAMA(cont)

Johann Gottfried Cullman was born 2 July 1823 at Frankenweiler, Canton Lardau, Rheimpfalz, Baiern. He was the son of Gottfried and Julia (Schneider) Cullman, the grandson of Gottfried and Louise (Becker) Cullman and of Jacob and Christianna (Laugel) Schneider, who were all residents of Frankenweiler.

When Cullman arrived in New York he had very little money and no friends. He clerked in a book store, and moved on to Philadelphia, where his work was not commensurate with his ability. He began to realize he would have to go to a place which had a large German element and encourage some of them to follow him to a locale where a German community could be established. He went to Cincinnati, Ohio where he became a partner in a law office. He lived there three years and spent the next two years traveling all over the U.S. visiting various German colonies for the purpose of getting information concerning the founding of such colonies.

In the year 1871 he was at Floreace, Alabama talking with the ex-governor who become so interested in Cullman's colonizing scheme he furnished him with horses to explore north central Alabama, which constitutes today the counties of Cullman, Blount, Marshall, Winston and Morgan.

The central part of the above section, which now comprises Cullman Co., and then known as Brindley mountain, was a wilderness comparatively unknown to the rest of Alabama. It had been a perfect hiding place for deserters and outlaws. At the same time there were a few hardy pioneers from the older counties of the state who had penetrated this wilderness, built log cabins, and established homes. These old timers could recount perilous experiences equal to those of the pioneers of the west. Among those hardy pioneer class, which was to be largely supplanted later by Germans, were such names as the Brindleys, Glasscocks, Lloyds, Williams, Selfs, McPhersons, Kinneys, Fullers, Sheets, Bates, McGlatherys, James, Sawyers, Morrows and Sims.

In the latter part of 1871 Mr. Cullman brought his first immigrants to Tuscumbia and Florence. As this was private property that had to be purchased from large estate property holders and they were not in favor of immigration they did all in their power to discourage it. Mr. Cullman became discouraged and went back to cincinnati. His son Theodore, came to America, took over his fathers legal transactions so he could distrubute colonizing propaganda. After helping his father for a month he became sick with typhoid fever and died at age twenty-five.

Mr. Cullman was planning another trip to Alabama(1872) when he heard of the completion of the railroad from Decatur to Montgomery. He became associated with the general manager of the railroad and he made a trip to the area around Brindley mountain with Mr. Cullman. The manager, Mr. Fink, was interested in the sale of 350,000 acres that his company owned. They explored the country and decided on the area which became the county that bears Cullman's name.

Cullman went back to Cincinnati in 1873 and persuaded fifteen families to move with him back to Alabama. The group dwindled to five families consisting of ten people. Their names were: Mr. & Mrs. W.O. Meisner, Mr. & Mrs. William Richard, Mr. & Mrs. G.A. Prinz, Mr. & Mrs. Adolph Brodrecht and Mr. & Mrs. Frank Beyer.

Later on the following families came: Julius Damus, Rudolph Damas, Dr. George Heidelburg, Fred Betz, Henry Dietz, John Fromhold and John Langhoff, Adolph Held, August Henning & George Strobeck. April 1977, GENIE 109 This was an old Bible. It had no back and was mutilated except for this record of Births, Deaths and Marriages. There is no other available information. It is given in the hope it will help someone.
