William Atkins - born 1820 in S.C. was living in Ouachita County - Marion Township

Leander E. Atkins - born 1823 S.C. was living in Ouchita County - Marion Township

In the 1870 Census Charles Eton Atkins had moved from Miss. and was living in Union County - Jackson Township P.O. Eldorado.

John R. Atkins was in Columbia County - still in Taylor Township.

R. A. Atkins had died and his widow, Lucinda, was still in Ouachita Co. P.O. Liberty. Her son, William, his wife and baby were living with her.

## MARENGO COUNTY ALABAMA

There were probably more than three states that have records pertaining specifically to the followers of Napoleon who were compelled to leave France after his defeat at Waterloo. In fact one city in the State of Louisiana prepared a home for Napoleon himself with the hopes of their rescuing him from Elba, but he had died before their plan could be realized. The city of Napoleonville, Louisiana on Bayou LaFourche (the longest street in the world) is a reminder of those plans.

After Napoleon was exiled, the Bourbon Kings executed vengeance rapidly. Some were killed, some expelled, most of them suffered their property confiscated, some were imprisoned without a trial, and others forced to sell their property and take up habitation in another country.

A large number of these exiles, historians refer to them as Bonapartists, arrived in America in 1816 and 1817. An association of them was formed in Philadelphia to attempt to establish a colony in the "Wilds of the West" where they could start life on a new basis. Three men, Jean A. Penniers, Bazile Meslier and George N. Stewart were appointed to select a place where the climate was similar to that of France where they had lived. They were led to believe the ideal place for this colony would be near the confluence of the Tombigbee and Black Warrior Rivers. They were told the climate would be good for vineyards, and also there were people near who would be kindred, because this area had once acknowledged the supremacy of France.

3 March 1817 Congress passed an act granting land to the exiles, who agreed to the cultivation of Vine and Olive. This act did not allow complete ownership of the land by the individual, but they were assigned certain tracts which they were to cultivate. They would not be given deeds until complete payment was made according to the contract and terms of the act passed by Congress.

The discomforts these settlers suffered were almost unbelievable. They had been accustomed all their lives to live in luxury, and their ignorance concerning the most common domestic tasks was most pitiable. The clothes they wore doing their daily tasks were most unsuitable garments in which to work. Women could be seen in the fields dropping corn and wading in the mud to milk the cows, dressed in silk gowns and satin slippers which they had worn at court. The men plowed, ditched and cleared their fields dressed in their richest uniforms.

In spite of all their trials the refugees were happy and their native gayety prevailed. They brought with them their books, musical instruments, ornaments, and even fine china, crystal and silver. Among them was always seen the gay grace and social culture for which France is so famous. Even if the days were filled with trouble and hard labor, yet, when night came the day's troubles were forgotten and all enjoyed the social activities. It looked like a command attendance at Versailles with beautifully attired ladies accompanied by the best dressed gentlemen entering the rough cabins where music and dancing were enjoyed. Their tables were loaded with luxuries, rich wines (even before a grape was planted) and other unusual (for pioneers) viands sent them by friends at home. When a shipment arrived

from France, the little community put on the appearance of a minute French Village, the self-denial and hardships necessary for success in settling a wilderness was not evident here.

At the time of the negro insurrection in San Domingo, which drove the whites from the island, a band of these West India refugees escaped to the coast and sailed for America. At the time of the grant for the cultivation of the vine and olive these refugees had finally made their way to Philadelphia, and some of them decided to come with the "Tombeckbee Association". They did not come the first year, but in the year 1820 came to Alabama and joined in the venture. Among those who cast their lot with the colony in the canebrakes of Alabama were the Stollenworks, Fourniers, and the Ravésies.

This organization had a very brief life. The soil and climate were absolutely unsuited to cultivate neither the vine nor the olive, but as late as 1828 some of the grantees were still trying. Many of these exiles were allowed to return to France, where they were reinstated in their places among the leaders whether it be civil or military. Some moved to Mobile and ceased to be completely French, and those who remained were soon swallowed up by the great tide of American emigrants who were looking for fertile lands of the "black belt" of Alabama.

CATO METHODIST CHURCH

Cato Methodist Church was organized in 1872 under the name of Frenchman's Mountain, and it kept this name up to 1907 when, under the Pastorate of Rev. R.H. Grissett, the name was changed to Cato Methodist Church.

The first Church was built of logs in the winter of 1872-73. The first log (a sill) was dragged to the location by C.R. McPherson, who was driving a team of oxen. A man by the name of Burton took the contract to build that house of worship. Split logs served as benches and the whole structure was little more than a log hut. This building remained until 1880 when a better structure was built.

The Church took its name from a Frenchman who lived on top of the mountain immediately back of the Church. Soon, a small village was founded near by and the first settler was S. A. Stewart. He gave the name Cato to the town. His picture is seen in the picture of the two story Church building which was the second structure built by its members.

The Church has always been an inspiration to the little village of Cato. It nestles at the foot of a beautiful mountain among the large oak trees. A large cemetery joins the Church grounds, and here lies most of the early settlers awaiting the resurrection when all shall rise to meet the Lord. The first person buried in the Cemetery was a Mrs. Watts Capel in Feb. 1873.

## REVOLUTIONARY WAR APPLICATIONS

### ALEXANDER HODGE

North Carolina Service of ALEXANDER HODGE S 8737 application for pension August 28 1832 while resident of Mecklenberg County North Carolina. He stated he was born November 1, 1763 in IRELAND, and resided at PROVIDENCE: MECKLENBERG CO. N.C. when he enlisted and served as follows: 1778 under Capt. James Jack, Col. Thompson, 3 months; 1779 under Col. Francis Lock, was in battle of Stono; 5 months 1780 2nd Lieut. under Capt. Samuel Flennokin of Flanikon, and Col. Polk and Col. William R. Davie; was wounded in battle of Hanging Rock, - served 3 months. 1781 2nd Lieut. under Capt. Martin, Col. Davie was in battle of Guilford, - served 3 months. 1781 engaged in pursuit of desertors; 15 days - served as guard to Commissary Davie, 5 weeks - was in battle of Camden.

His claim was allowed. He died Sept. 24, 1836. There is no family data in this file.

### FEDERICK GRAY

South Carolina service of FEDERICK GRAY S 21779 He applied in Abbevil E District, S.C. 1832, age 74, states he entered service as a Militiaman for or in lieu of John Galmon, in regiment of Col. Giles, in Florida Expedition, under General Williamson, that he entered 1777 and marched to Alligator Bridge, Florida, had a skirmish with British and Indians, returned home, after the British took Charleston, he was then constantly out and was appointed a Captain by Col. Lindsey to Rage Bush River; that he was wounded and taken prisoner and carried to the Congoree Fort, and was then retaken by Col. Lee and Col. Liles, - states he was born in South Carolina and has resided in that State ever since. He knows of no one except Robert Talbert who can testify to his service. Affidavit of Hugh (Wardlaw or) Wilson a Clergyman and Robert Tolbert, both of Abbeville Dist. who state they believe in his statements.

### THOMAS MOORE

South Carolina Service S 21367 - who applied in Abbeville Dist, S.C. April 4, 1833, age 69 states he entered service at age 11 as a volunteer militiaman under Capt. Hugh Wardlaw, Major Noble and Col. Anderson, 1781 in the District of Ninety-Six S.C. And again entered under Fields Pardue A recruiting Officer same year to serve ten months in a corps of mounted horsemen commanded by Co. Samuel Hammond, in the regiment of Horsemen, and served under Capt. Richard Johnson, Lieut. Jas. Spaun, and ensign or Cornet Spraggins, and was marched to Augusta, Ga. and embodied in Grayson Fort, which was taken by Co Hammond and several of the enemy killed. Col. Hammond's Regiment remained about one week at this place and was then marched back to the District of 96 or Cambridge where General Green had then besieged and embodied British Forces under Col Cruger. Col. Hammond's Regiment of Horse here greatly aided the beseigers by patrolling and scouting throughout the adjacent country keeping the enemies of the country in and dread, guarding provisions wagons, driving cattle and etc. until General Green raised the seige and marched toward Broad River, in the State accompanied by Col. Hammond's Regiment of Horse, from Broad River these forces marched down towards the Congaree

River, near where the town of Columbia now stands, Col. Hammond's Regiment remained at this station about one month after which it was marched to meet General Green, who had previously marched his forces towards the Eutaw, where Co. Hammond's regiment again joined General Green and where the American forces met fought and conquered the British after this bloody and memorable battle in which Col. Hammond at the head of his regiment of horse bore a commissions and distinguished station which he sustained with honor to his country his regiment and himself. he marched his regiment, back to the district of ninety-six and here joined General Pickens Bridge and were employed constantly in ranging and reconcounting the country for at least two months. General Pickens then ordered Col. Hammons's regiment to a place called Bush River in the District of ninety-six and that part now called Newberry district where Col. Hammond regiment remained until March 1782 and the applicant was then and there together with the whole regiment discharged by Col Hammond.

The applicant subsewently volunteered his services under a Capt. Samuel Rosamond, and was marched by him under General Pickens to the Cherokee Nation, where some Indian towns were burned and the Indians reduced to the necessity of suing for peace - the army then returned after an absence of at least two months and were discharged, which closed the revolutionary service of the applicant who was in constant service from March 1781 until March 1782 to which he adds his two months tour against the Indians making in the aggregate fourteen months service he performed in the Revolutionary War in defense of the U. S. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, ----States he was born in IRELAND 1763 or 1764 as his parents informed him, that he was brought in to the United States at early age an infant child. States he was living in the District of Nirty-Six now called Abbeville District, S.C. where he was called into service, where he volunteered and enlisted as he has mentioned, General Green and Col. Lee were with the troops when he served, also Gen. Pickens Brigade of Militia. His acquaintances were John Hodges, Major John Hinton, James Sample, Esquire, and Joel Smith are the names of persons to whom he is known in his neighborhood, ---- affivavit made in Edgefield District, S.C. by S. Hammond who states that Thomas Moore, at present of the district of Abbeville was a soldier in his regiment, that he was enlisted by Field Prdue then Major of the said regiment, that was put to a company of Richard Johnson, and served the full term for which he was signed, a short time before the expiration of the 10th month General Pickens by letter which is yet preserved but not now with me requested that I persuade those whose time would expire shortly to go on and expedition with him against the Cherokee Indians, Moore voluntarily consented to perform that duty. Another letter from Samuel Hammond 1836. Varrell Farm Near Hamburg S.C. Feb. 17, 1836.

JOHN FINLEY

South Carolina Service of John Finley and Sally Finley W 1257 Page 76 As aforesaid was more than 18 months. That sometime in 1780 he went to the State of Pennsylvania where he had some relatives with whom he remained until the close of the Revolutionary War, that he was sickly and frail and unable to perform military duty after his return and escape from the prison and British in St. Augustine in Florida as aforesaid.

He states he was born in Craven County - afterward Ninety-six District now Laurens District, South Carolina; that he was born November 1760. Affidavit of Franklin Branch a Clergyman residing in the Dist. of Abbeville, S.C. and Major John Hodges, residing in same certify they are well acquainted with the soldier and that he is reputed by his neighbors to have served. Affidavit of Paul Finley, resident of Laurens District but affidavit made in Abbeville District, 1832, and states he is the next youngest brother of John Finley and knows the facts set forth in his brother's declaration are true, as the character his brother has always sustained as a man of truth and veracity and from the well known fact of his whip principles and Revolutionary war service, signed Paul Finley. An affidavit of Leander Bryan in Abbeville Dist. S.C. 1833 states he has long known Paul Finley of Laurens Dist. S.C.; that he is reputable and highly esteemed by his neighbors.

Affidavit in Abbeville Dist, S.C. by Moses Taggart Judge of the Court of Ordinary for Abbeville Dist, certify that Sally Finley, Widow of the late John Finley, deceased, a pensioner of the U.S. under act of Congress passed 6-7-1832, appeared personally and produced the family Bible of the said John Finley deceased, in which is recorded the marriage of John Finley decd on the 25 Dec.-----? that independent of this testimony. Benjamin Lane Posey a credible witness appeared before me and proved that he was present when John Finley and Sally Finley (who was Sally Posey) were married by Rev. Arthur Williams, a Baptist Minister on the 25 Dec. (it is shown the date was "1880," but they surely meant 1780 as this affidavit was made 1836 therefore it could not have been the date he wrote as "1880") and that by the oaths of Benj. L. Posey, Charles Dendy, Wm. Logan and Thomas P. Spier in all credible witnesses who appeared before me in court and proved that the said John Finley died in the village of Abbeville on the night of the 17 Sept 1836, that the widow Sally Finley produced the pension certificate of said John Finley, entitling him to receive \$60 per annum during his natural life, No. 16,122 and given at the war office of the U.S. on the 8th July 1833 and etc. And that the record in the Bible mentioned, I personally know to be in the hand writing of said John Finley. In the application of widow the date of marriage she states was 25 Dec. 1808. The widow in 1853 Abbeville District, S. C. applied.

In 1856 Sumterville, S.C. it is noted that Mrs. Pamela Shillito only surviving child of Sally Finley, decd. and one James Taylor was agent for claimant. In 1856 Sept. 6, Mrs. Pannelia or Tannelia Shillito was addressed as Aberdeen, Mississippi, at that time her Mother Sally Finley was deceased.

### ANDREW LOGAN

South Carolina Service of Andrew Logan of S.C. Service S 9375 Bounty Land warrant No. 36528 - 160-55.

1832 Oct. 25, Abbeville District, S.C. Andrew Logan resident of Abbeville Dist. Age 67 or 68; states he entered service age 16 or 17 as a militiaman under Capt. John Irwin and was called into service about the time of seige of Ninety - six was raised by General Green in the summer of 1781 he was marched from 96 and crossed the Saluda River above the Indian boundary to

the Fish Dam Ford on Broad River in S.C. thence marched to N.C. thence by change of course down the Congaree River where he with the troops lay or were encamped for two weeks, thence to Dutch Fork; thence to Capt. Beall's company killed several British soldiers and took several prisoners from the ridge he was marched back to Cambridge or 96 which place on the arrival of the troops was in ruins and smoking from the fire put to it by the evacuated British, here he states Capt. John Irwin's Company with the rest of the troops were dismissed or discharged after being out at least one month the principal object of which tour of duty was to keep the torries in awe and dread of the Whig Force in the upper part of South Carolina, that in a few days after his return and discharge with Capt. John Irwin's company he volunteered his service under one Capt. Samuel Moore, a partisan officer and continued to perform duty in the said company as a private mounted horseman from the fall ferries of six months skirmishing scouting and moving from place to place with certainty to keep the torries in subjection and in dread of the friends of liberty this corps was always dreaded by the torries and done important service to the country. He again entered service as a militiaman under Capt. John Irwin, who was ordered to march to the Cherokee Country by General Pickens who commanded and conducted the expedition in person - the troops entered the Cherokee Nation and arrived before a place called by the Indians, Chota Town where a battle was fought and the Indians defeated a large number of whom were put to flight, 40 or 50 and about 100 taken prisoners their town and several villages were destroyed - their corn and their defeats so complete that security to the whites were ensured by the humble terms they offered for peace - states he and the Army returned to the settlements and were dismissed after an absence and duty in this Indian campaign of four or five weeks and which ended his services in the Revolutionary war. Andrew Logan states he was born in North Carolina, but raised in Abbeville from the age of nine months and from his knowledge he was born 1764. That the record of his age was destroyed by the British. That he was living in 96 now Abbeville Dist. and within seven mile of 96 or Cambridge when he was called into service, and has lived within ten miles of Cambridge or 96 since the Revolutionary War, where he now lives.

His acquaintances were Wm Buchanan, James Irwin, Addison McGehe and Dr. Ephraim Calhoun, who can testify to his character.

Affidavit of John Hodge, made 1832 in Abbeville, states that he served with said Andrew Logan as a brother soldier in the different services. He has declared we were together although in different commands at the seige of 96 - marched with Green to the Congaree River and back the route the applicant has declared, to Cambridge again, we were under Capt. Samuel Moore and were in the Indian Battle at Choata Town, together.

Name of Officers under whom he served were Capt. John Irwin, Capt. Samuel Moore and General Pickens.

In 1855 he made application again in Abbeville Dist. S.C. at the age of 90--A Clergyman made affidavit, his name was James W. Chiles - also E.R. Calhoun a resident of same were well acquainted with the soldier-- A statement from Comptroller General's office Columbia, No. 14 1855 was filed with the papers as follows: Number 156 Book P issued the 1 Apr 1785 to Mr. Andrew Logan for 19 lbs. sterling for 105 days militia duty as private

horseman from 1780 to 1785 per account audited, principal L 15 Annual interest L - 1-6 - 7 State of South Carolina. Dr. to Andrew Logan, for duty as private horseman - Capt. Jno Irvin, pay bill Cong. in 1780 ending in 1785, say 100 days at 2% 130 L.

South Carolina: Abbeville County To Peter Boquet, and James Mitchell, Esq. indent due to me from the public as also for the interest due thereon and oblige, Your humble servant Andrew Logan, 11-6-1785. I do certify that I did see Andrew Logan sign his name to the above order 11-6-1785 signed Wm Moore, J.P. Received 12 April 1785, of full satisfaction for the within in in an indent 156 Book P signed John Logan, I do certify that the above indent, account and etc. are true copies of the original in this office. Signed by Thos. P. Walker, Deputy Commissioner General. Certified to by Wm. Hill, Judge of the court of ordinary by for Abbeville District, S.C. 1855.

JOHN HODGES AND FRANCES

South Carolina Service of John Hodges and Frances W 10117 of South Carolina Service, (born in Virginia) applied in Abbeville District. Said John Hodges a Regiment of Abbeville District, S.C. Age 67, states he entered service April 1, 1780 under command of Capt. Samuel Rosamon, who commanded a beat or militia company in Ninety six district, now Abbeville, S.C., and was marched to Beach Island, in this State, near Augusta, Ga. where he was taken sick and left by his company under care of Capt. Tutt, a regular officer under whose care he soon recovered and then returned home, and soon again rejoined Capt. Rosamond's Company. He re-enlisted several times. John Hodges stated he was born in Essex County Va. from information from older branches of his family in the year 1765, states his record was burned with a house in South Carolina, that he was living in Ninety six, now Abbeville when he entered service as a volunteer, where he has since lived. Affidavit of Wm Wardlow made 1832, in Abbeville, who states he is well acquainted with the soldier and that he was a true Whig, that deponent was personally with John Hodges at the seige of Ninety six, was with him under Capt. Moore and Capt. Maxwell, and in the Indian Battle of Choata Town.

Affidavit of one Richard L. Anderson, made in Abbeville District, S.C. who states his father enlisted to this District from Virginia, when this deponent was in his eleventh year of age and settled in the same neighborhood in which deponent now lives and in which John Hodges then and afterward lived, until his death; that his father so settled here as deponent well recollects sixty four years and last May viz; in May 1790 and that early that fall 1790 said John Hodges married this deponent's sister Frances Anderson and they continued to live together as husband and wife until Hodges died, about 2 years ago, that deponent was not personally present at their marriage yet he knows distinctly that they went to a JP of the neighborhood for that purpose and returned and were afterwards received and believed by the community in which they lived to have been lawfully married; that said John Hodges drew a pension from the Government leaving this deponent's said sister as his widow and that she remained such until ten years and , when she died in this district, that the said John and Frances Hodges have now of their surviving children, the present Matilda Sharpe, George W. Hodge, Gabriel Hodges, Drucilla Douglass, Sarah Magee, Margaret Leach, John A Hodges, Samuel A. Hodges, Frances Weatherall,

James Hodges, Mary Nash, Benjamin Hodges, Mahulda McKellar, Absolom T. Hodges, Robert H. W. Hodges, and Lucy W. Davis, signed 1835.

Affidavit made by G.W. Hodges; states he has a family record of dates of births of his father's children and they were as follows; Eldest child Matilda born 7-12-1791 date of his father John Hodge's death 24 December 1834, and his mother died (Frances Hodge widow of said John who drew pension, her death 14 March 1844, --- Affidavit of Gabriel Hodges, a resident of Abbeville Dist. S.C. 1855, states he is a son and heir of Mrs. Frances Hodges, widow of John Hodges, deceased. States his mother was married to his father in the fall of 1790, that the family is in possession of the record of the births of their parents' children by which it appears that their oldest child was born 12 July 1791.

### JOHN HODGES

John Hodge of South Carolina Service S 21825 - Was born in York County Pennsylvania about 1762. While living on the Pacolet River in Ninety six District, South Carolina, he enlisted in 1776 and served about one month as a private in Capt. Zachariah Bullock's South Carolina Company under General Williamson and was in an expedition against the Indians. He enlisted October 1780 and served as a private in Capt. John Thomson's Co. Col. Brandon's South Carolina regiment and was in the battles of Blackstocks Ford, Hammond's Store and Cowpens and was discharged Feb. 1, 1781. He enlisted 1781 and served three months as a private in Capt. John Thomson's Co., Col. Farr's South Carolina regiment. He enlisted 1782 and served three months in Colonels Farr and Brandon's South Carolina Regiment. He was allowed pension on his application executed October 11, 1832, while a resident of Union Dist. South Carolina, formerly called Ninety Six District. There is no family data on file.

### BENJAMIN HODGE AND NANCY

Benjamin Hodge and Nancy of South Carolina Service W 10115 - Benjamin Hodge was born in Richland District South Carolina, date not given.

While a resident of Richland Dist. S.C. he enlisted 1775, and served 21 months as private in Capt. Robert Goodwin's company in Col. Wm. Thompson's South Carolina regiment and was in the battle of Sullivan's Island. Soon after this service he enlisted and served in Capt. Craig's company in Col. Wynne's S.C. regiment. He was allowed pension on his application executed Oct. 2, 1832 at which time he was about 80 years of age and was a resident of Richland Dist. S.C. He died Jan. 22 or 28 1837 in Richland Dist., S.C.

The soldier married 1778 Nancy - her maiden name not given. She died October 10, 1845, leaving the following children: Trinity, widow of Joseph Martin - Sarah widow of Randall Grant - Lotty, widow of Jordan Lee - Lucy, wife of Daniel Martin - Anna, wife of Reuben Cusad - Margaret, wife of William Brown - Zady Hodge.

On October 13, 1847 Trinity Martin a resident of Richland District S.C. age 64 applied for the pension that was due Nancy Hodge as the widow of Benjamin Hodge. The claim was allowed for the benefit of said Trinity Martin and the other children who survived the widow Nancy Hodge.

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SPANISH - AMERICAN WAR VETERAN DIES AT 96

CHARLES C. JOHNSON SR. of Shreveport, one of the nation's few surviving veterans of the Spanish-American War died Friday in Houston, Tex. He was 96.

Johnson, who lived at 619 W. 71st. St., was the only Spanish-American War veteran in Caddo Parish in January, 1976 according to the Veterans Administration.

At that time there were only 997 in the nation, 8 in Louisiana, officials said.

Johnson told The Times in a 1976 interview that he never saw combat. "Before we got through training, they canceled the deal." He mustered out of the military on Dec. 20, 1898.

He came to the Shreveport area in about 1899, later left Shreveport, but returned about 1936. He had lived here since.

Johnson was active in the Shreveport Camp of the Spanish - American War Veterans. (The Shreveport Times Shreveport, Louisiana July 3, 1977.)

## BOOK REVIEWS

JACOB HUTCHINS OF ATHOL, Revolutionary Soldier by Jack Randolph Hutchins  
384 pp., hard cover, \$7.50 Postpaid.

This is a complete history of the war presented in the form of a biography of Jacob Hutchins who served at Bunker Hill, White Plains, Stanwix, Saratoga. Charts show many of his descendats including Elias Hutchings discoverer of the Mammoth Cave in Kentucky and early LDS member (builder at Kirkland, member of Zion's Camp to Missouri, First Quorum of Seventies, buried Nauvoo, Ill.) The history also describes the activities of all 196 soldiers, sailors, and marines named Hutchins-Hutchings-Hutchens who served in the American Army as well as the six members of the family who remained loyal to England and who moved to Canada.

The brief history included of the Hutchins-Hutchins-Hutchings-Hutchens family of America starts with Thomas Hutchins of London, England who joined with Winthrop, Saltonstall, Adams, and twenty-two other individuals to form the Massachusetts Bay Company in 1628. They received as a grant from the King the land between the Charles River of Massachusetts and the Pacific Ocean. Brief histories and charts show five generations of the branches of the family located at the time of the Revolution in New England, New Jersey, New York, Virginia, North Carolina, and Mississippi. Names and addresses of the known principal historians of each branch are given. Complete copies of the 1885 genealogy of the David Hutchins family of Attleboro, Mass.; Westmoreland, N.H.; Vt.; N.Y.; Iowa; etc. and the 1935 summary of the Strangeman Hutchins-Hutchens family of Virginia, North Carolina, and the Ohio Valley are also included.

This book in addition to being interesting general reading is a key to all Hutchins-Hutchings-Hutchens research. Shown are the names and Revolutionary records of the soldiers from each colony and location of the Hutchins-Hutchings-Hutchens families in 1790 and 1970. This original history of the Revolutionary war contains many pointers for researchers working on records of the Revolutionary War soldiers. Indexed. Order from: Jack R. Several years were spent collecting material from hundreds of sources, including periodicals, genealogies and correspondence. The effort to amass data covers all states except New York and New England. In the book are over 1000 Johnsons born before 1850. Some could be your ancestors.

JOHN HUTCHINS OF HAVERHILL - Compiled by: Edwin Colby Byam PhD. Edited By: Jack Randolph Hutchins.

The Hutchins Families of America are of English or Scottish origin and came to America in two separate waves of immigration. The earliest settlers were from England and arrived in America during the first one hundred years of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, or between 1630 and 1730. A second wave arrived later from England and Scotland and came generally in the early 1800's.

This book on The Hutchins Families contains 545 pages. It has References, Geographical Index, Historical Events Index and Name Index. The Hutchins family Origin, Name and Coat of Arms is discussed. It contains the first five generations and descendants of John Hutchins. There are twelve generations in the book. It is a must book for those who have relatives in the Massachusetts area. PIKE - WALTHALL CO. CEMETERIES

By: Mr. & Mrs. William A. Lampton

A comprehensive recording of 134 cemeteries with their gravestone inscriptions was published by Mr. & Mrs. William A. Lampton of Tylertown, Miss. The cemetery list includes many old family cemeteries of some of Southwest Mississippi's earliest families. All graveyards are located in Walthall County which was formed in 1914 from old Pike County and a part of Marion County.

The book, printed offset on quality bond paper and is 9" X 12" in size, has 402 pages including an excellent surname index. The cemeteries are indexed alphabetically by its traditional name with any other historical name in which it may be known also included. In addition, each cemetery is preceded with a legal description as to location, its present condition, and the date it was copied. The earliest known date in each burial ground is denoted with a starred entry.

Although many of the 134 cemeteries are practically forgotten or lost to all but a few of the older generation, some of the larger, well-known historical ones are included such as the China Grove Cemetery, the New Zion Cemetery, Founder's Cemetery in Tylertown, and Elliott Cemetery.

Begun in 1976, the compilation's significance is that Pike County Court House Records were lost in a fire in 1881. Records of the early Mississippi families who settled in Pike-Walthall County area during the territorial period are consequently lost. The seeking out and recording of these cemeteries forges an important link in re-establishing some of this lost history.

For anyone doing research in this area of Mississippi, or Southeast La. the book must be considered a necessity. The book can be ordered from the compilers, Mr. & Mrs. William A. Lampton, Box 467, Tylertown, Miss. 39667 for \$18.00 postpaid. A very limited number of these books have been printed.

VOWELLS MILL, LOUISIANA

References made to record books and pages will all be Natchitoches Parish Courthouse records unless otherwise noted.

Author: Fern Ainsworth. Taken from materials she obtained from her father, Charles B. Clark and added to by her "Aunt Dean" (Mrs. Parthenia Delenious (Clark) Morris), Age 93 in 1977.

This community was named for the Vowell Family who operated a grist mill and cotton gin on Chori Creek about ½ mile east of Red Rock Cemetery. Red Rock is located on Hwy 478 between Vowells Mill and Robeline, is well kept and people are still being buried there.

There were three Vowell brothers who came to the area that was known as Vowells Mill - Hamp (Hampton or Hamilton G., William F., and Andy (Andrew). Hamp married Martha Ann Self 20 Feb. 1873. (Marriage, Bk. 5,

P. 197). The Vowell Family, as well as the Self Family, were from Georgia. Their children were: Mary, Joseph, Samuel and Lydia.

William married Mary J. Self 2 Feb. 1879 (Marriage, Book 5, P. 197). Both of these brothers were millers. Any was a farmer. 1880 Census of Natchitoches Parish Louisiana shows:

Hamp Vowell's wife, Martha Ann, was the daughter of James Self who owned a small grist mill on Spring or Little Chori.

Billy Menasco owned a small grist mill on Chori but was not doing too well with it and the property Mr. Vowell bought was across the creek from the mill. They swapped places and the Vowell brothers in addition to the grist mill established a cotton gin, and the construction was such that as recent as ten years ago portions of the wood structure was intact. Some of the stones used for grinding are still at the site.

The only way a post office could be established was to arrange a contract with someone to deliver the mail, so Mr. Lewis Gilchrist (Gilcrease), son-in-law of Hampton Vowell agreed to carry the mail for one year for 75¢. Lewis Gilchrist (Gilcrease) married Lizzie Vowell 21 Feb. 1889 (Book 11, P. 54). She was the daughter of Jamp Vowell and Martha Ann Self. On 1880 Census she is listed as Mary. Her name was Mary Elizabeth but called Lizzie.

There was Indian blood in both the Vowell and Self families. Between the years 1890 and 1900 they sold their holding and moved to Indian Territory, and according to Mrs. Morris, became quite wealthy because of their holdings in the territory.

The first mention of the Vowells Family in the Natchitoches Parish Courthouse records is the purchase of land as recorded in Conv. Book #65, Page 44, 1863 described as S½ of Sect. #20, Township #7 Range 9 West - 320 acres sold to Hampton G. Vowell by Thomas H. Airey formerly of firm of Airey and Colton. This land acquired by mortgage from Allen Fox under date of 1861. This same property was on tax delinquent list of 1872. Book 69, Page 156, February 18, 1891 Instrument #20321, Book #88, Page #618 Hamilton (sic) G. Vowell traded with William J. Manasco S½ of Sect. 20 Twp. #7 Range 9 West. Book 83, Pages 698 through 701 dated 1885 from heirs of James Self, H.G. (Hampton G.) and W.F. (William F.) Vowell acquired 320 acres E½ Section 21, Twp 7 Range 9. It was this parcel of land on which the mill operated by Hampton and William Vowell was located. There was another brother, Andy Vowell, but he farmed and even though he lived in Natchitoches Parish, he never helped with the mill.

Instrument #23521 Notarial Book #96, Page 322, dated 28 July 1897 J. J. Wagley (See note #1, Natchitoches Parish Notes) bought at Tax Sale E $\frac{1}{2}$  Section 21, Twp 7 Range 9 and all of Section 22, Twp 7, Range 9 except E $\frac{1}{2}$  of NE $\frac{1}{2}$  Section 22, Twp 7 Range 9.

Instrument #23562, Notarial Book #96, Page 388: H. G. Vowell of INDIAN TERRITORY unto A. Clark of Natchitoches Parish La. E $\frac{1}{2}$  of NE $\frac{1}{2}$ , Section 22, Twp 7 Range 9, 80 acres, 30 Dec. 1895.

Inserted here is a letter written by Julia (Clark) Mc Cann, dated 1882, to her sister, Kate Walters. It mentions Andy Vowell, and it also gives a little insight to the way of life then:

November the 26 1882

"Emma I Dear Sister I have come to the conclusion drop you a few lines. We received your kind letter which gave us great satisfaction to here from you and Johnney Dear Sister sad news to wrigh the deth of our Dear Brotheringlaw also the deth off Willy Lester in which we mourn with our Dear Sister Dear Sister I must say something about Katie She is agoin to get mariade next Thursday Weeak too Clem Royston We are all well at (?) Mack I and the childring all sends there best love and compliments James Mack came to see us last knew years and sends his love too you and Johnney Johnney you must try to bring Emma back to sea us again Poor little Jack is mariade and his wife writes how she would like to see you and form acquaintance wih you Dear Sister I wile a little knews Taylor Creg is sent to the penetenuary also Andy Vowell is in jale for stealing horses and cows Dear Sister I would bee so glad to sea you and Johnney and hear you tell your ups and downs Rubin is in bad helth he would like mity well to sea you he wants you to right my dear sweat sister Poor Dear Mother I speak off now She is very well today I (?) to know if you want to sell your cows James Self wants to buy them He said he would you the money A loveing sister I must close Katy and Rubin and Letty sakes the floor so bad that I cant hardly right and (?) too Excuse my bad hand right and Jack three I like to forgot him Write soon so nothing more at tis tim only Remaining your loveing sister until deth

Katie said tell Johnney Bowdens wife howdy.

When the Vowell F mily left Bowells Mill, he sold the land to Mr. Cassy Campbell, son of Zimro Campbell who came from Alabama. Mr. Cassy (a nickname) Campbell married Margaret Wagley, daughter of John J. Wagley. (see Natchitoches Parish Note #1). When they left Vowells Mill they went to West Texas where the wind blew all the time. They lived in a dougout, which was dirty and very cold in the wintertime.

Mr. John Wagley operated the mill next and also ran the postoffice. He moved to Robertsville (close to Provencal, La.) and left the post-office and mill in charge of his son, Alexander Wagley. While Alexander

was postmaster, he moved the postoffice from where the mill was located to the present town of Vowells Mill. It has been over 80 years since the Vowell Family left and even though the postoffice was discontinued when Mrs. E. D. Morris retired as postmistress about 18 years ago, the name still appears on the map.

Other known postmasters, after Alexander Wagley, were J. J. Holt, George Rials, Mr. Clark (a Baptist Preacher), Will and Joe Frantum, Raleigh Self, Amy Rhodes, Mr. John Canady and Mrs. Ed Morris who operated it until she retired.

The first school close to Vowells Mill was Pine Knot between Victoria and Vowells Mill. Mr. Wister Bott and Miss Susie Cobb both taught here.

The Red Rock School house was taught by Mr. Cassy Campbell who also operated the mill that had belonged to the Vowell brothers. It was a one, then a two-room school standing close to where Red Rock Cemetery is now located. The next school was called Vowells Mill school house and it is located at the crossroads of highway #478 and the old Vowells Mill - Provencal Road. It was first two rooms with an auditorium, then 2 more rooms were added. It is still standing though not in very good condition. I believe this school was moved from Red Rock to its present location, and the auditorium added at that time.

Some of the early teachers when the school was located at Red Rock were: Mr. McFarland, Cassy Campbell, Viola Holliday, Necie Lucius, Allie Keagan, John McCain and John Longino. After its removal to the present site some of the teachers were: Mr. Bott and his daughter Lillie and son, Euell, Charlie Webb, Mr. Peterson, Ernest Deas, Mr. & Mrs. Jow Fowler and the Thixtons. Mr. Thixton had a wooden leg and they were an unusual family in many ways. It was nothing to see snakes crawling from the bureau drawers or from around the children's neck. The daughters were Caroline and Dixie; the son, Dillard. Others were: Miss Barr, an old crippled lady, at least I (the author) remember her as being old. She was very spry though when a boy about 13 or 14 tried to take the switch away when she tried to punish him. His name was Ivy Holland, and she nearly killed that boy, he never tried that again, and after all that, I hate to think what he looked like when his father got through with him. That was the way it was, if we got licked at school, just prepare for another one when you got home; Miss Reppy Rhodes, Miss Stoker, Valentine, Sanders, Hawthorne, Hattie Hensley, Miss Valentine (from Mississippi) and Miss Annie Lee Taylor.

There was a teachers cottage built on the ground where the teacher lived, as part of their salary. One person in the educational field stands out, one who everyone has praised, and in most households was synonymous with the 3 R's. His name is Professor George Coverdale. He had come from England to New Orleans, had lost his last \$20.00 to a dishonest hack driver, so made his way up the Mississippi River teaching for himself, his wife and three sons, George, Milton and Bertie. He finally made his way to Natchitoches and was hired to teach the school at Provencal. He taught one year (I think it was only held for three months a year) and then had to appear before the school committee to have tests. This was the custom at that time, and he was so astounded at the questions given to the teachers, he remarked his 10-year old could solve all the problems and answer all the questions. Since he was from England, they told him to give them a test

he thought would be appropriate for a teacher. He did so and none of them could answer all the questions, nor could they solve the problems. He told them his 10-year old could still have passed his examination. As a result, he was never given a teaching position in the public school system again.

Professor Coverdale started teaching in John Jefferson Holt's cotton gin house. Soon there were more children attending his private school than the public one. He taught a 8-month school year. The cost was \$1.00 per month per pupil. Professor Coverdale had to farm to supply food for his family but this proved a problem because when he went into the field to plow, hoe, etc., he would see a different butterfly, another species of flower or some other interesting thing, follow it, get lost and then his wife would have to send one of the children to find him.

When Victoria Lumber Company bought timber and moved into the area, they hired Prof. Coverdale to scale the lumber. They transferred him to Orange, Texas, then to Monroe, La. where he died. One of his sons was Sheriff of Ouachita Parish for many years. Professor Coverdale was a great asset to the Vowells Mill Community and almost all of the younger (50 to 65) people remember their parents extolling his virtues. He was probably the person most responsible for this community's attitude toward their children acquiring all the education available.

There are probably many old cemeteries which have completely disappeared and which are unknown to anyone now living, but the ones listed below are those known to the older people of the community. All of these will be published as Natchitoches Parish Notes continues: Old Cedron, Cedron, Fox, Red Rock, Wagley, Becky Murray, Foshee, Stacy and VOWELL.

The first Saturday in June this year (1977) Red Rock Cemetery held what we always called GRAVEYARD WORKING, but I understand it is called some places HOMECOMING. When I was young it was exactly what we still call it. One day a year each family who had dead ones buried in the cemetery met and cleaned, repaired markers, and formed the graves that had sunk a little into a mound again. Now we have a caretaker who is paid from donations to keep the cemetery in good repair, but we still meet, have a short service, prayer and we all spread our lunch together. However, we used to call it DINNER ON THE GROUND, no card tables then.

We met as usual, had our lunch and then we planned to visit the VOWELL CEMETERY which was close to their old mill. We first visited the FOX CEMETERY, and I was so shocked when I saw it. I remember it as a child, at least 50 years ago, attending the funeral of a small girl, about two years old, who was being buried there. There were at least 50 markers there then, but I would have never found the place by myself. We went in a truck over untravelled hills, gullies, dense growth and finally stopped. I could not understand why the cousin stopped, but after getting from the truck I could see the remains of a fence surrounding large trees, big bushes, heavy undergrowth and 12 neglected, blackened markers. There was not one FOX marker left. The old FOX home which was still standing 25 years ago, gone without a trace. Such is PROGRESS and CIVILIZATION? The FOX CEMETERY will be published in THE GENIE when I write Note #9.

My father had told me over 10 years ago, that an owner (I'll not call names but he did) removed all the markers from the graves in the VOWELL CEMETERY, set them against a fence and planted potatoes there. I had hoped to find the markers at least and copy them to go along with this article. I did not get near the place. There were seven of us, we were not  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile from the old mill when we were at Red Rock Cemetery, but an uncle said there was a road right up to the VOWELL place. NOT SO. At least we didn't find it, but we did find blackberry vines, briars, fallen logs, locust thorn trees, red bugs, seed ticks, yearling ticks, any kind of ticks, you name it. Have you ever tried to make a long step over a big log - well, in that area, don't. Oh, the fragrance of the honeysuckle; oh, the delicate colors, forget it! Blast those honeysuckle vines. After 3 hours of stumbling, falling, losing my shoes and going through berry vines, I gave up. One cousin found the remains of the old mill, the stones, but he was on the other side of Chori Creek. The only two people Mrs. Morris knew to be buried there are Mr and Mrs. James Self. They were in the process of moving to Texas or Indian Territory, had come by the VOWELL Place to spend the night, and during the night Mr. Self died. After he was buried the next day, the family decided to go on, but Mrs. Self went out to visit her husband's grave and she did not come back for quite a while. When they went to look for her, they found her lying across her husband's grave. She was also dead. This was not a very large cemetery, possibly 20 or 30 people buried there and as far as we know there was none of the VOWELL Family buried there.

Mr. Bill Richie erected a sawmill down from the school house and across the road from the cotton gin. There are still a few timbers at the site. The Victoria Lumber had built a railroad from Victoria to Fisher, La. and there was a loading dock at Vowells Mill. Mr. John Canady lived at Middle Creek, La. but had become interested in property at Vowells Mill. For reasons unknown Mr. Henry Jones shot Mr. Canady (not fatally) and threatened Charles B. Clark. Mr. Jones came on to Vowells Mill that night after shooting Mr. Canady, but did not find Mr. Clark. Between 1 and 4 A.M. in the morning a shot was heard and they found Mr. Jones on the loading dock dead. He had committed suicide. No one seems to understand it but there

are two headstones in Red Rock Cemetery for Mr. Jones. My aunt says both dates are wrong.

There was another happening in the community, in fact, perhaps this same thing happened more places than we realize. There was a man, unknown to anyone in the community who came there ill and covered with large running lesions. Everyone was scared to be near him. Mrs. Lula (Treadway) Etheridge gave pillows, quilts, etc. and her husband, A. G. Etheridge, and Charles Clark nursed him. The Doctor was called, he could not diagnose the illness and advised no one to go around him, because of the open lesions. The man died, was buried at Red Rock Cemetery, and so he lies there today, unknown and perhaps loved ones anxiously awaiting his return.

After the postoffice was moved to where the community of Vowells Mill is now located, a cotton gin was erected by Mr. A. G. Etheridge and Charles B. Clark across the road from the present school building. It was at this place where my father's brother, Clyde was killed in 1914.

### SAND HILL - Elijah Clark Home

This was the home of Elijah Clark and Eliza Jane Holt Clark, and the site where most of the 16 children of this family were born. It was built at the top of a long sandy hill with a spring in the creek at the bottom, which, when cleaned, still has real cold water. There is still a black walnut tree standing bearing nuts that the children remembered. The surviving children for many years meet there in October each year and have a picnic. It was situated on the Hatton Ferry Road and between the house and the spring was a road called the Robber Trail. Elijah Clark, according to Mrs. Morris (the author's aunt) and Charles B. Clark (the author's father) often slept with a rope tied to his horse and the other end to his toe, with a gun in his hands because of the robbers who infested the area. He would come to the house in the morning and tell his wife the girls should not go to the spring that day, and they knew there would be outlaws camped there.

One of the early churches was on the Provencal - Vowells Mill Road and about 500 yards east of where Highway 478 crosses it. The Methodists tore up an old Church close to Many, La. and rebuilt it here 1910 - 1915. They used it for quite a while then sold it to the Baptist Church but one old lady wouldn't attend because she said the devil was in it. Almost everyone attended all the meetings regardless of the sect. Mr. Ernest Deas taught singing lessons in the Church and almost all the children attended.

Another church was called Tick Misery. This was a tabernacle and was erected for a community church. Every church was supposed to hold services there. Mrs. Morris said she thought Victoria Lumber Company donated the land out in the woods. There was an Apostolic Minister by the name of Monk who was most responsible for the community effort, and because he was of that faith, he was not allowed to preach.

## Natchitoches Parish Notes (cont.)

The things remembered by the author are centipedes (all of 12 inches long, tarantulas, sawdust on the ground for a floor, and hard, rough benches. The name, TICK MISERY, according to Mrs. Morris, came from the vats erected nearby to dip cows to keep ticks off, and that area was infested with them, and the dipping was so bad for the cows, the name TICK MISERY just stuck.

The children of Vowells Mill were fortunate to have transportation to school. The covered wagon that transported the children was called the transfer, and the drivers were A. V. Clark, Vernon Flenniken and Ed Morris. The transfer always operated; the only time I know it did not was the time the creeks were up so high because of flooding it could not run.

The Provencal - Vowells Mill Road is practically unusable because logging trucks have ruined it. Of course, in the wintertime it was not usable before logging. Red clay hills when it are impossible to travel, so the road most used now is \$478 which is off Hwy #117.

Vowells Mill today has no postoffice, no school, no church, no store and no industry. Most of the property is owned by a lumber or plywood company. There are no farms, perhaps a few cattle, a garden patch, chickens and much timber. As in most communities, there are stories in every family, many unusual characters, many tragedies, much sorrow and great happiness. Vowells Mill is no different. It is true, many of the people who settled in the outlaw strip were one step ahead of the law, but there were many families who came seeking more and better land, greater opportunities and/or a better life. There are descendants of the original settlers still living there, still using some of the cemeteries, still travelling the same roads their ancestors travelled with the exception of ox-wagons they now use automobiles and motorcycles.

My children and my grandchildren have been reared with stories my grandmother taught me, with little finger plays, poems, etc., and I hope every grand child has had this experience.

On Sunday afternoon we played quiet games. DO YOU REMEMBER THIS?

William, William tremble toe, he's a good fisherman, catches hens, puts them in pens. Wire, briar, limber lock, 6 geese in a flock, 2 flew east, 2 flew west, 2 flew over the cuckoo's nest. O-U-T spells out you dirty dishrag you are out.
