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

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IRENE E. MCCARTY DIARY

DIARY OF A TRIP FROM PESDIDO, GOLIAD COUNTY TO MARSHALL, HARRISON COUNTY (All in Texas) By: Irene E. & George McCarty in 1873.

Irene E. McCarty was born July 8, 1839 in Mississippi. She died November 15, 1933. She taught school and kept books for the family ranch. George McCarty was a younger cousin the family raised. Irene E., is the sister of J.L. McCarty, Sr.

Wednesday, Sept. 11, 1873

Left Pesdido, Goliad County and came in a buggy to Cuero, the present terminis of the railroad. Put up at a German Hotel. Rather poor accomodations but good as is usually found in these mushroom towns. Like all such places it appears to be decidedly fast and most disagreeable. But the case is we have to remain here another day waiting for the stage. It will be a long, long day to me. I am so anxious to be going on, feel like a caged bird shut up in this warm, uncomfortable room, with not a single object of interest in sight and so will try to while away the tedious hours reading and writing.

Thursday, Sept. 12

Another weary day to pass in the same room. It is a fine thing that I have a good store of patience, and in this case must needs let it have its perfect work.

Friday, September 13

Took the stage past 2 o'clock p.m. for Gonales. My first experience in staging. I count it anything but pleasant or agreeable to travel over a bad road on a dark night in a crowded and overloaded stage coach. It would be difficult to imagine a more disagreeable situation for the length of time---16 hours---we arrived Saturday the 14th at 6:00 o'clock a.m. hungry, tired oh! so tired and sleepy. Had breakfast and went to bed for a good rest. Got up very much refreshed and eager to be again on the road but the stage has'nt come. It is supposed to be water bound and here again we will have to lie over no telling how long. Not long I hope for patience is growing threadbare. Though we have reason to congratulate ourselves upon having a most pleasant and agreeable place to stop at. Rained all the forenoon but faired off beautifully in the evening. Haven't had an opportunity of seeing the town which must be a considerable place.

Our fellow travelers of the stage were a man about the worst deformed one I ever saw and his bride of three months and a German and his wife who either sit up and gabble like geese to each other or nodded and swayed from side to side to the eminent danger of giving and receiving some hearty bumps from their next neighbors. They were all en route to Seguin and left on the stage

bound for that place this evening. George has fever & I feel some uneasiness about him being sick. Hope, however, it may be nothing serious. I dread the idea of either of us getting sick on the way. We have played the mischief here. He registered our names as brother & sister & we are stopping here so long that in conversation with our hostess I let it out that we were cousins. I had told him he might register us that way but I didn't really know that he had. I suppose, however, it makes but little or no difference & George is caught in a story. It only pays him back for giving me such a fright for taking his pocketbook which he had placed in my companion for me to take care of & then making me believe that I had lost it or let it get stolen. If I had not felt so much relieved when I found he had it I really would have been vexed. He thinks I am too careless & have too much confidence in everybody & wished to give me a lesson in precaution I think.

Sunday, Sept. 14

No stage yet. It has faired off & is a cool, bright, beautiful morning. Would like to go to church but it is wet & muddy to walk.. George reports himself better, has no fever this morning, hope he wont't have any more. There is a pretty baby & a pet canary here, and between them & some magazines & my books I hope to be able to endure this tiresome dentention. I ought to write some letters to friends I have left, but feel too restless & excited to set myself to the task. Stage arrives just before night & leaves again after supper & now for another long wearysonem night ride. How I dread it, but the thought that I am going home sustains me through all the wearyness, difficulities & dangers. Reports of yellow fever from everywhere but I am not afraid.

Sept. 15

Arrive at Lockhart about 5:00 o'clock a.m. both tired & sleepy. Took a room & slept until breakfast. Got up somewhat rested & refreshed. Had a good breakfast though George was so unfortunate as to break a bad egg on his plate which spoiled his appetite. The proprietors of the house are a singular family consisting of two brothers & two sisters, old maids & old bachelors. A very good place to stop at. Good beds & good fare. The rotten egg was an accident. Left immediately after breakfast on the stage for Austin, only one fellow passenger, a Dutch Jew. Had a long discussion on scripture & religion, myself being the only professing Christian, I would fain have persuaded them to believe likewise. The day was warm & the ride rough & tiresome. Got to the river (Colorado) about 3:00 o'clock p.m. A great many waiting to cross----had to wait an hour before we could get over. Crossed on a ferry boat, the late freshet having washed away at the pontoon. Got into the city about 5:00 warm, dirty & almost sick with fatigue. Took rooms at the Avenue Hotel. Find considerable excitement prevailing on account of the yellow fever. Two cases reported as having died in this house since our arrival. If I was much of a coward or very excitable I would be in a bad fix & would be sure to take it. Not

arfaid for myself but I feel some uneasiness for George. He will be more likely to contact it because he will go around peering into every hole & corner. He brought a tumbler of brandy toddy & insisted on me drinking it, said I must keep half drunk all the time as the doctors say it is the best preventative of the fever. So he had a bottle made up but I rebelled at the order to keep half drunk, though I will take what is necessary not withstanding I am temperance. George won't take a drop himself, thinks the remedy is worse than the disease for him.

Tuesday, Sept. 16

Felt rested & refreshed after a good night's sleep. Received a telegram from Marshall. No yellow fever there, feel greatly relieved over this. Don't know how long it will be before we get off from here. Probably not at all but have to return. The road we wish to travel ia quarantined beyond Hemstead. The idea of going back is very distasteful to me. We have decided to remain here a day or two at any rate to see what the chances are for getting on & must needs try & pass the time as pleasantly as possible & so we are to take a drive out to the Lunatic Asylum this afternoon. George says he will take me there to look around & see if I like the place for he expects nothing else but to have to carry me there for safe keeping if it so happens that I cannot go on home. Well we had our ride & an enoyable one it was too in the saftest & easiest carriage -- \$2000 turnout after being cooped up here all day. We drove first to the Lunatic Asylum & went in to view the grounds & go through the buildings. It is a beautiful place to look at but oh what a horrible sight are the poor demented inmates. I was not prepared to see such a low, almost beastly appearance as most of them presented. A human face without the soul lit eyes is the most repulsive spectacle to be seen. I came away thanking my heavenly Father for my reason. There are about thirty or forty inmates at present. We came back by the Asylum for the blind & went through that institution. Had one of the pupils read Their books are all printed in raised letters & they read for us. by feeling. It is very wonderful the facility with which they can trace the words by feeling. The house is undergoing some repairs & improvements at present. The managers of the institution are very polite & accomodating to visitors, appearing to take much pleasure in showing all that would be interesting. Had the unexpected pleasure of meeting an acquaintance at the supper table, Mr. Leroy Roberts. Went to the parlour & chatted until 9:00 o'clock. He has been up in the mountains, he says to get a breath of fresh air to recuperate flesh & strength of which he was surely sadly in need as he only weighed 250 lbs. before he left & now he is as broad as he is long.

Wednesday, September 17th

No train to Hemstead this morning, fear we will not be able to go on. We will wait here two more days. Received a telegram from a friend in Marshall--all well at home. Took a ride this evening all round the city. Great many out riding & some splendid turnouts.

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It does one good to see the fine horses. Had a good view of the places. Some very fine residences, one I noticed in particular, in imitation brownstone, is a splendid affair & our host tells me it cost \$30,000 & belongs a a man by the name of LAYTON (a northern man). By the way our host is a very communative & withall a very pleasant man. Had some music in the house after supper, a couple of little minstrel boys with harp & violin. They played very well. George complaining again tonight. Feel uneasy about him.. What would become of me if anything should happen to him. Would be a forlorn condition indeed. It would be better me than him for several reasons but Providence will protect & I will not fear though George laughs at my faith & says he afraid Providence will get me away from him yet.

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Thursday, Sept. 18th

Train went out from Hemstead. The fever excitement seem abating. George is better this morning. If it were not for the anxiety & expense I would like to stay here a week or so. Drove out to the deaf & dumb asylum this evening. Went over the building. It seems to be well arranged & quite comfortable & the young people appear perfectly contented & happy. Have just received notice that the quarantine is raised so we leave tonight on the 7:00 o'clock train and I am so glad that I won't have to go back. Well I must say I have felt all the time like I would go. George has gone to get the tickets & I must gather up & prepare to start. We have been putting up here so long that everything is about like home. Dr. MOORE appears to take a great interest in us. Came up just now to bring the intelligence that the blockade had been raised. There are three Indians stopping here tonight, peace commissioners, I reckon. George carried me in the room to look at them. They are repulsive looking. Well now our baggage is gone & after a little rest we will be off.

Friday, Sept. 19th

Arrived at Hemstead at 9:00 o'clock a.m. Had to wait until 12 for the next train. Got breakfast, took a room & lie down to rest and try to sleep awhile. I don't like the looks of this place. It is bound to be sickly and from the appearance of the country we have passed since daylight I am not astonished that they are subject to yellow fever here. Left Hemstead on the 12 o'clock train for Hearne. It is an excessively warm day almost like midsummer with no breeze at all. The dust & smoke almost stiffling on the cars. A good many passengers, the Indians we saw at the hotel among the rest. George is complaining of not feeling well today. He seems to be taking a severe cold. He looks tired & worried but no wonder this stopping every whipstich & the anxiety of not knowing whether we can go or or will have to go back is very annoying & enough to wear out the patience of a saint. Reached Hearne 4 p.m. & here we must lie over again until tomorrow cooped up in this little stove of a room. There has been quarantine on and the second second

all these roads for sometime past. The way is open now but the trains are running on irregular time & do not make connecti9ns. The yellow fever excitement seems to be subsiding.

Saturday, Sept. 20th

We leave on the 10:00 o'clock train for Longview. Hope we will get home without any further adventures or delays. A jolly old gentleman with his two daughters, a single one & a married one with three little children & a nephew are fellow passengers as far as Palestine. They are on their way home from Tenn. where they have been for a visit. The old gentleman said he had come all around the country to get home & avoid the yellow fever whereupon I not thinking about what the consequences might be thought I would give him a little scare & so told him about the two persons dying in the house where I had been stopping when he threatened to inform the health officer at Palestine & have us quarantined & declared that George looked like he had the fever then. I was a little puzzled how to get out of it but carried it through as a joke & I rather had the laugh on my side when we arrived at Palestine when the officer aboard to check the passengers who were to stop & passed by those who were going through but the old gentlemen was known as he lived in the vicinity & they let him off too. The day passed off very pleasantly. We changed cars here & have to wait for the next train. Sat down in some rubbish in the floor of a new building & listened impatiently for the whistle. Can't see much of the town though it appears to be a considerable place. I do not like the country over which we passed today, a low swampy, brush, sickly looking country. The Treasle works across the Trinty River are about a mile long and looking from the car window to the ground is about twenty feet & is a dangerous looking place. Looking out what should I see but George lying out on the platform in front of the car with head & shoulders thrown as far out as possible trying to look under the I did hope he would lose that miserable ugly old hat. He car. wouldn't put on a clean shirt to please me but I guess he would have if he had known he was to meet such a pretty girl on the cars. He' keeps his coat buttoned up very high I notice, I know he wishes he had minded me but he shakes his head when I tell him so. Wait half a hour & take the train about 6:00 o'clock for Longview which place we will reach at 11 p.m. Feel very badly & have to take a dose of medicine. Try to make our selves comfortable on the seats and make out to sleep & rest a little. Car stops about 9:00 o'clock for supper. George went out to get his & brought me the nicest lunch I ever saw, but I had no appetite & felt too sick to eat. Arrive at Longview almost worn out & sick. Got off the car & went into a hotel to wait till George could make inquiries about when we would leave that place for Marshall. Found everybody cross and not desposed to every satisfactory on account of being roused from sleep I suppose at that late hour. George reported no passenger train out before Monday night but a freight train would leave about 12 o'clock & the conductor said he could take us down quite comfortably and on time. He left it to me whether we should go or

not and I feeling so badly wanted to be at home & dreading the delay so near home too decided to make the venture. That two hour ride I shall never forget. I almost was sick enough to die but George was in the highest of spirits & gayest of humors sang, danced & whistled, begged me to let him go on top of the cars & finally subsided in to nap on the bench beside me. After we started I began to think how we would get from the depot to a hotel. I did not feel I was able to walk to save my life and its being night I knew it would be impossible to get a conveyance. Neither of us thought of that before we started and when I mentioned it to George he seemed to be nonplussed but I determined to make myself easy & trust to Providence as usual & as a reward for my confidence there was a man aboard who said he could direct us to a good boarding house very close to the depot. When we got off the train, the man piloted us to the gate & we went up to the door & George hailed & inquired if we could get lodging for the night. They answered that we could not, that the house was crammed full of men whereupon George told them he had A LADY WITH HIM AND IF WE COULD DO no better he would like to have a light and a room to sit in till morning. There was another gentleman with us, a doctor from Houston en route to Shreveport to nurse yellow fever patients. The man of the house said if the lady had no objections she could share the room with his wife. They struck a match lit a light & I went in. I found myself with an old acquaintance & I was soon made as comfortable as the circumstances of the case could admit of.

Sunday, Sept. 20

Felt almost too sick to get up but George was up bright & early making preparations to be off home. I am ready, he has been to the stable & brought round a two horse buggy to take us out home and we were soon on our last ride. Too early for many people to be on the streets, didn't see anyone I knew. The place somewhat improved and greatly changed. George grumbled all the way down about the bad roads & the brush; said it would be no pleasure to him to take a ride with a young lady on these roads. He would be sure to overset the buggy or fetch up against the tree or stump for he would be bound to look at her at all hazards but I made him keep his eyes on his business and so here I am landed safe & sound at home once more where I am glad to be & thankful to find my dearest ones all here & glad to see the wanderers returned.

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CLD CEDRON CEMETERY VOWELLS MILL,LOUISIANA

By: Fern Ainsworth

There are nine cemeteries, and perhaps more, licated in the area known as Vowells Mill, La. Seven of which will be enumerated under cemetery inscriptions with a notation to see "Natchitoche Parish Note" # 2. These inscriptions will be referred to many times in relation to the project of transcribing 1850 census with notes relating to those families known by the author, Fern Ainsworth, and titled "NATCHITOCHES PARISH NOTES." The cemeteries in Vowells Mill area will be denoted as Vowells Mill Cemetery VMC-1, UMC-2, etc.

VMC-1 OLD CEDRON CEMETERY

Old Cedron was once a very large cemetery. Between 1923 & 1925 the author's father, Charles B. Clark, was blasting trees & old stumps from the road between Provencal & Vowells Mill, they thought they had missed the cemetery but as they blasted they realized the road came through the cemetery. There was nothing they could do, there were no markers, so we give the inscriptions from old cedron cemetery realizaing not one fourth are listed. The first date of burial us 1862, and by coincidence is a relative of the author of "Natchitoche Parish Notes".

This cemetery is located in the woods about two miles off Vowells Mill & Robeline Hiway, very hard to find, completely abandoned, overgrown with brush, and the last dated marker 1914, but the copier attended the funeral of a daughter age 1-2 of John Zoo Rials who was buried there between 1920 & 1924. At that time the Fox home was still standing, there were 50-100 markers standing, the cemetery was well tended & under fence.

OAKLAND CEMETERY SHREVEPORT, LOUISIANA

One of the oldest cemeteries in Shreveport is Oakland Cemetery, at Baker and Milam streets. It has been accepted for listing in the NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES.

It is one of the most attractive parklike areas in the city. It is like a trip down memory lane to walk along its many paths. Many of the town's earliest pioneers are buried here, including 14 early mayors, several clergymen, Confederate veterans and victims of yellow fever epidemics of 1853 & 1873.

There is a special section at the northeast corner, set aside for members of the Jewish faith. Headstones there carry inscriptions in Hebrew and are decorated with the seven branched menorah.

When the cemetery was laid out over a century ago, an area just to the left of the east gate was designed as "a place for the friendless," probably for those whose remains were unclaimed by any relative.

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METHODIST HISTORY OF ADAIR COUNTY, KENTUCKY (1782-1969) By: Vista Royce Allison

This book contains 419 pages, is not indexed but gives many names of people who came from other places to settle in Adair Co. They were lead by Bishops, Circuit Riders, finding suitable places to live and worship, founding towns and churches. Now the old large cemeteries show many people lived there and died. Some still being used. Daniel Boone's family were among the first settlers. After Churches were built, conferences were held, names of members and workers included such as: Moss, Poythness, Sebrell, Williamson, Massie, Tatum, Lew, O'Cull, Haggard, Combs, McHenry, Snelling, Barker, Brooks, Cartwright, Willis, Helm, Stephenson, Davis, Durkin, Hardin.

The author did research in many areas, churches, towns, families, cemeteries, geography of the land, Bishops, Circuit Riders, births, marriages, deaths, history. There are many names some will find helpful, if by chance your ancestor came in or through Adair County. Stories of people are plentiful some sad but many interesting, giving one an idea of how people lived, made friends, helped each other.

LEGENDS OF LE DETROIT By: Marie Caroline Watson Hamlin

The heritage of Detroit is rich in French folktales and folklore. Nearly one hundred years ago, Marie Caroline Watson Hamlin set down many of these tales in her Legends of Le Detroit. Long out of print, Legends of Le Detroit (317 pp./\$10.00) is now available in reprint edition from Gale Research Co. This delightful book presents 31 tales of French or Indian origin, together with valuable genealogical data on 44 prominent French families in Detroit.

The first tale related by Mrs. Hamlin, "The Cross and the Manitou," stems from the era of the Jesuit explorations of 1669-1670. The last tales date from 1815, the close of the War of 1812. The entire book is resplendent in its retelling of quaint

customs weird tales, and beautiful traditions, all handed down from generation to generation by the families of Norman descent which first settled in the "City of the Straits."

There are tales of Belle Isle, Grosse Pointe, Lake Sainte Claire, Grosse lle, the Canadian shore, and of early Detroit. Throughout the work, Mrs. Hamlin's notes and footnotes provide historical details of the persons and places significant in the tales and in early Detroit history. There is even a tale of Le Lutin, a goblin horseman whose adventures precede those of Washington Irving's Headless Horseman.

In the name of God Amen. I Christian Brinberg of Christiania hundred for the County of New Castle, yeoman, being weak and infirm of body but of sound mind and memory praised be Almighty God for the same do make this my last Will and Testament in manner following to say, principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul for the hands of God that gave it, and for my body I recommend it to the earth to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner at the discretion of my executors hereinafter named.

And as touching such worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me in this life I give, devise, and dispose of the same in manner and form following.

Imprinis. I give and bequeat unto my son Peter Brinberg the full sum of five shillings sterling to be paid him or his heirs in manner as will be hereinafter mentioned.

Item: I give and devise unto my son Swain one hundred and forty acres of my land whereon I now live to be laid off on the east side, with the dwelling houses and improvements thereon built, and five acres of my marsh to be laid off next John Richardson's marsh to front on a creek and run all the way back, to hold to him and his heirs and assigns forever.

Item: I give and bequeath unto my son Mathias sixty acres of my land, being all the remainder of the tract where I now live with the improvements thereon bullt; also four acres of my marsh to be laid off next his brother Swain's in regular order, to hold to him, his heirs and assigns forever. And it is my will that he shall be let out to a trade within convenient time after my decease.

Item: I give and devise unto my daughter Mary and her heirs and assigns forever one acre of marsh next her brother Mathias, to be laid off in regular order.

Item: I give and devise unto my daughter Hanah and her heirs and assigns forever one acre of my marsh to be laid off next her sister Mary's Marsh.

Item: I give and devise unto my daughter Elizabeth and her heirs and assigns forever one acre of marsh adjoining the other, it being all the remainder of my twelve acre piece of marsh that I purchased of Linnis.

Item: I give and devise unto my son Swain the best mare on the place, and his choice of one cow, and constitute and appoint the said Swain Brinberg my son one of my Executors of this my Last Will and Testament, which mare and cow shall be his full pay for his trouble in executing this my will.

I give unto my son in law Philip Stalcop who I appoint Item: Executor with my son Swain of this my last will one acre of marsh which I bought of Cisber Walraver which shall be his full pay for his trouble, except reasonable charges, to hold to him, his heirs and assigns forever.

4, 1 - 1 Item: After my just debts and funeral charges are well and truly paid, I give and devise all the remainder of my personal estate unto my four daughters, to be equally divided between them after the said moveables have been appraised by three freeholders of this place, only Elizabeth, and it is my will that Elizabeth shall have the largest share and five pounds more than the rest and as to my estate I give and devise it to all my children to go share and share alike therein. si n neendt wet be

And further it is my will that my son Swain shall pay the above five shillings to my son Petermand if my son Mathias shall a die before he arrives to the age of 21, then I give and divise his part of the land to my son Swain and his heirs and assigns Z and the off the contract of the forever

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CAPT. SAMUEL BRADY

Samuel Brady, called the "Marion of the West," was born at Shippensburg, Pa., 1756, and was the son of Jn. Brady who was made a captain in the Colonial army for his services in the old French & Indian war. In 1776 Samuel joined the army, was commissioned Lieutenant and marched to Boston. He continued with the army and was in all the principal battles until after that of Monmouth, when he was ordered to the west and joined Gen. Broadhead. Broadhead employed Brady as a spy to ascertain the strength, resources of the savages. Disguised as savages, Brady, Willimason & Wetzel reached the Indian towns on the upper Sandusky. They entered the Indian village at night and made a thorough reconnoissance, & then retreated, traveling all night. In the morning they discovered the savages in pursuit, but finally escaped, having killed one of the enemy. Satisfied with the information brought by Brady & his companions, Broad-head's army moved onward. During all the Indian wars up to 1794 Brady took an active part & no braver or bolder man ever drew a sword or fired a fifle. He married a daughter of Capt. Van Swearengen, of Ohio Co., & left descendants.

Dear Lewis:

I propose now as I know to give you the ancestral lineage of the Cheathams & Handcock families --- Cheathams, Hancocks, Rudd all from England proper, Bakers from Wales. These four families (with the exception of John Hancock of Rev. memory who settled in Mass) all settled in Shartoll (Charlotte) & Chesterfield Co's., in Colony of Va. All were considered wealthy. Your great grandfather was by the name Obediah. He married Margaret Rudd. They had but two children Arthur who was your grandfather Cheatham, & sister Lavania. Your great grandfather Obediah was with Gen. Washington in his retreat through N.J. in the fall of 1776, in several battles, suffered a great many hardships, was never wounded, returned home on furlough sick & died the latter part of 1776 or 1777. His wife, your great grandmother Cheatham, whose maiden name was Margaret Rudd, afterwards married Barnette Cheatham, who was a distant cousin of her first husband, by whom she had three children, Obedience who was called Aunt Bidsey, Charles & Thomas. They were all half brothers & sisters to your Grandfather Arthur Cheatham. John Hancock who settled in Mass. & Anthony Hancock your great grandfather were cousins. Anthony married Sarah Baker some time in 1751. (Her parents not given. MN) ----- (about Hancocks here) Your grandfather Arthur Cheatham married your grandmother Ann Hancock in 1792. He was only 19 years old & she a little over 17. They had twelve children: Sarah Baker, Anthony Robinson, Obediah Pride, Arthur Rudd, Your father John Isom myself, Thomas Hancock, Martha Ann, Barbary Jane, Caroline Lavania, Mary Douglas, Sophia Obedience and Martha who died 5 Sept 1805. Your grandfather Cheatham died 30 January 1818 age 45 years 6 mo. 14 days. Your grandmother Ann Cheatham in Monroe, Walton Co., Ga. 4 Sept 1839 age 66 years 3 mo. 18 days.
