men of years past to see some of their pain and hardships. It should
remind all of us what a privilege it is to live in our great country, no
matter how imperfect.

Camp Jackson, Ark.
October the 2nd 1861

Dear Wife

I received your letter of September the 10th on yesterday and hasten
this morning to answer the same. Your letter gave me pleasure to hear
from you and to hear that you were well and it gave me pain to hear that
some of you were chilling. It also pained me to see the disposition you
have of grumbling at me. It is true you are somewhat left in a bad
situation but I had thought that we would make corn enough and to spare
that you could sell enough to supply all the money you would need to buy
your necessaries and had hoped that Tarpley had payed you the money
he so faithfully promised to do and I had assurance from several that you
should have plenty of meat to do you and if there promises are all com-
plied with I cant see why you cant get along comfortable for one year
and my wages here during the year will enable me when i get hime to buy
us place where we can again be settled and have a home of our own. I
feel for you. I know you are lonesome and feel distressed about me but
I will try to take good care of myself as i can and I do hope to meet
you all in good health again at the expiration of my term of service
and think will never part from you again during life. You also grumble
about me not writing oftner I have wrote I think this is eight times and
have only received two letters from you and then you complain about

having to pay the postage. This is hard but I dont see how i can help it and did not know it was the case untill lately and cant help it. There is no Post office here and they wont receive any any money from us to prepay postage as our letters goes by express from here to Fort Smith where they are mailed. You must try to sell wheat or corn enough to pay your postage. Others write to there husbands here and write like they were contented and satisfied with there husbands being in the army but I will say no more - it has pained me to say thus much. My health has been bad for the last ten days - have had some fever but are improving and getting well. We received the package of clothing you sent us which is thankfully received. We have no pens to write we have not been outside of the encampment since we came to this place and I have no doubt that it hurts me to be absent from home as much as any of you and with the advantages you have of keeping comfortable and dry at home. I am suffering more than any of you and now while writing this morning with no chair to set upon down on the flat ground my back nearly breaks into to write one letter. I have not seen a cup and saucer a chair or table since i left home - eat standing up or on the ground with a tin cup for my coffee and a tin plate with my pocket knife for knife and fork to say nothing of the rain and wind and storming. It is raining hard this morning while i am writing and can hardly keep my paper dry enough to write upon. Our tent leaks badly and should we have to camp in tents all winter we will have a pretty rough time of it. It is rough at best so you see we have a plenty of trouble of our own a thousand and one that you have no idea of, and under these circumstances it would be refreshing to here that our wives and the children were happy and contented at home and would give us consolation in our trouble and dangers while so far from them. I would like very much that Nathan or Horace one would live near you though I have faith in Jerome that he will do all he can to make you comfortable and will try to make a good crop. Tell him to do his best and if i am discharged in Missouri I will try to buy a good horse to go home upon and he will probably get it for his own when i get home. Tell Nathan I will pay him for all his extra trouble in gathering and taking care of the crop. Our men or a great many of them are still sick but are improving some. Capt Black & Floyd are sick and have gone out into the country until they get well. Lieut McColliem (?) is well and has not been sick but very little since he left home. Baldwin is in good health now has been sick a few days. We do not know how long we may stay here or where we may be sent from here but are determined to try and discharge our duty knowing that it is our duty to our country honestly and faithfully untill we are honorably discharged from the service and can return in honor (can't read) to be with our family and (cannot read) our having left you so long and do hope you will not grieve so much. Have more fortitude and hope for the best and put your trust in God who is able to protect the widow and the orphans and who has promised he will do it and never see the Righteous forsaken or his seed begging bread. I want you to write how the crop turned out and how you are getting along and how you are going to make a crop whether Nathan or Horace is going to crop with you and whether or not you have sowed any wheat and your prospects for meat. Uncle Joe Hutson promised me if hogs did not get fat he would let you have the hogs to fatten yourself and I certainly think we have made corn enough to fatten meat and have a plenty to do you besides and probably some to sell. All

i can say is do the best you can under the circumstances and maybe all will be right some day. Give my best love and respects to all the children and to Couss (?) Nathan & Puss (?) Horace & Nancy Dave and Polly and all of there children and with inquiring friends and for yourself except the warmest love of your absent but ever devoted husband.

Write as often as you can I would be glad to hear from you often tell Horace and Nathan & Joe and Dave all to writefor it is a long time between letters, having only received (can't read) and it is nearly time (can't read) make an effort for November and I would advise all our boys that is Nathan Joe and Horace to stay at home as i do not see any great necessity for troops here and it is a hard rough life enough so to nearly kill a man who has not got a good constitution. Write soon.

SOME EARLY PIONEER RECORDS

In the year of 1818 a man named John Murrell with his wife and children, a few household goods and a rifle, boarded a flat boat (sometimes called a keel boat), in the bend of the Cumberland River at Horse Shoe, Tenn. They were bound for the far west in search of a home and fortune.

They floated down the river to Nashville, Tenn.; where they were joined by other families that were bound for the same unknown destination. There were about ten families in all, namely: Wallace, Clark, Manifi, Ward, Dwyer, "Big Joe" Hutson, Robinson, Duty, Dooley, Peterson and Murrell. Descending the Cumberland, they entered the Mississippi and floated down that river to the mouth of Red River.

After resting here a few days---days of toil and much loss of time in working their way through and around the Great Raft and among monster alligators, they landed safely at Long Prairie, in the Arkansas territory. This was in the latter part of the year of 1818. All were charmed with the new country---it was so fresh and new but they were alone in a primitive world. Not a sound of an ax or a rifle was to be heard nor was the smoke of a cabin to be seen. Murrell and Wallace pitched their camps on the bank of the river, put up rude shelters, cut down a small patch of cane and planted corn and vegetables.

In June of the following year, Murrell, with about one hundred dollars in cash, followed a trail to Natchitoches to invest in cattle. It must be remembered that the only pass ways were the hunter or Indian trails or paths. Between Long Prairie and Natchitoches there were only two cabins, one of which, built by a man by the name of Bosel, was vacant. The other was the home of Isaac Alden. Alden and his wife entreated Murrell to bring his family and take possession of the vacant cabin but Murrell wanted cattle. So he went ahead on his cow hunt. South of Natchitoches he found and bought ten cows and calves.

When he got back to his home at Long Prairie, he found a member of his family sick with fever and at once determined to get his family away from the river. The deserted cabin on the Natchitoches trail came to his mind and he resolved to leave the poisonous Red River and find a shelter in this lonely cabin as soon as his family was able to travel. On August the 6th, 1819, he stopped in front of that vacant cabin and thankfully placed his family beneath its humble shelter. Indians could be seen daily but they were inoffensive, committing no depredations on stock or other property. They lived in small villages and moved from place to place as their hunting expeditions required.

Murrell went to work at once and in a few days rigged up in working order a first class "Armstrong Mill". This mill, though simple in appearance, combined several mechanical powers, operating through a spring pole to a pestle in a mortar box, or hole, burnt into the end of a heavy block of wood. The spring pole was worked up and down by hand---hence the name, "Armstrong Mill".

Murrell cultivated his first crop with a hoe. The woods, abounding with all manner of game, a turkey for dinner required only a few minutes hunt and venison steak was to be had at any hour. Bear in the proper season was readily converted into the best of bacon. Wolves were common too. They could be seen on any moonlight night traveling around the house or cow lot.

As previously stated, there were no roads, but in lieu thereof were two trails leading through the country---one from Mt. Prairie in Hempstead County, Arkansas, to Monroe, Louisiana, or Ouachita Parish which then embraced Clairborne Parish, extending from Rapides north to Arkansas Territory, and from Ouachita Parish on east to the Spanish Country (Texas) on the west.

LONG SPRINGS

Davis Long settled the place known as Long Springs in 1819, and lived there, near Minden, several years. In 1836 he married and raised a clever family of children, among them Miss Lucy Long for whom a boat was named. At one time the "Lucy Long" freighted cotton down the Ouachita River from Camden. Other pioneer settlers were Martin Allen, the first Justice of the Peace appointed in the parish, Holcomb, Brazil, Diskill, and Crownover. Later there were the Grays and Millers. The old man Miller died the second year after he came and his grave was the first grave made in Clairborne Parish, which was composed of Clairborne, Webster, Bienville and Bossier. There was also a Dr. Walker and a Jesse Williams in the parish by this time.

DREW SETTLED IN PARISH

In 1821 Newt Drew settled on Black Bayou near Driskell. He was a gunsmith by trade but turned his attention to farming. Mr. Drew had an old servant called Jack and one morning he sent him out to drive up the horses. While he was looking for the horses Jack came upon a bear turning over a log in search of bugs, and thinking himself a bear hunter, he picked up a pine knot and made for the bear. Slipping close up he let drive at the bear; the bear wheeled around to see what the trouble was. Seeing Jack, the bear laid his ears back and made for him but Jack, trusting to his legs, fled like a scared wolf. He escaped from the bear but when he stopped in his flight, he was lost. He wandered around for three or four days when he was found in Dorchest Swamp near Long Springs, about twenty miles from home. Jack quit the bear hunting business.

Mr. Drew afterwards moved down on the Dorchest, established the lower landing and got the town of Overton under way. It was at the head of navigation and it was thought would become a big city. He also built the first saw and grist mill in the parish---it was on Coolie and was run by water power.

Much might be said of this old pioneer. He and his wife were true old Tennessee Baptists. His eldest son, Thomas Drew, became Governor of Ark-

ansas, his youngest son, Harmon Drew, became District Judge in the State and Richard Drew, another son, died while probate Judge of this parish. some of his daughters married well, but some, contrary to the old man's wishes, did not do so well.

In 1821 the first marriage ceremony took place and was performed in Arkansas. John Allen and Miss Mary Holcomb were the happy pair. It soon became the fashion to go to Arkansas to get married, and there was a certain pine log in Arkansas that became famous because it was here that the happy couples would come to be married. Sometimes the Justice of the Peace would be absent on a bear hunt---sometimes attending court at Champ Anolle or Echore Fabre. This being the case the young people would just camp out and wait patiently.

There were no such things as store clothes in those days. Every family had their cotton cards, spinning wheel and loom. Shirts and pants were homespun. Buck-skin pants, hunting shirt, moccasins and a pair of good, heavy home made shoes made one feel very proud.

McCally's salt works were in the vicinity of Drake's old salt works in Bienville Parish and the first school was taught by James Ashburner in 1822 at a salary of fourteen dollars a month. He was employed by John Murrell, the main subject of this sketch.

In 1822 Harrison and Hopkins of Natchitoches sent up a small stock of goods in charge of a Frenchman named Forche. He opened a store in a small cabin near John Murrell's. The first post office was established in 1823 on a route from Natchitoches to Washington, Arkansas, and was called "Allen Settlement Post Office". Allen was the first Justice and John Murrell was appointed Postmaster. Trips were made back and forth twice a month. Letters conveyed over five hundred miles cost twenty-five cents to send. Under five hundred miles, twelve and one-half cents.

The first cotton gin was erected by Thomas Moore in 1824 for Adam Reynolds who sold it to Russell Jones in 1825.

The first camp-meeting was held in 1825 and conducted by William Stevenson, McMahan and Ross.

Let it be known that the John Murrell of this sketch is not the J. A. Murrell of out-law fame.

NOTES ON APALACHEE INDIANS - Submitted by Juanita Racine

The Apalachee Indians, when first discovered, occupied that portion of what is now West Florida between the Ocilla River on the east and Ocklocknee and its branches on the west, probably extending into Georgia. Tallahassee is near the center of their ancient domain.

John Clark Redpath in his "History of the United States" writing of DeSoto says "In October 1539 they arrived at the country of the Appalachians on the left bank of the Flint River, where they spent the winter. They remained with the Appalachians for four months and sent out exploring parties in all directions.

In 1593, twelve Franciscan Fathers were sent to St. Augustine to serve old stations and establish new ones. By 1606 the province of Apalachee called for missionaries. In 1633 the first mission was established and two years later the number baptised was reported at five thousand. In 1639 the Apalachee Chief of Cupaye went to St. Augustine to be instructed and baptised. On his return a Franciscan Father accompanied him to found missions in his part of the country. The Indian Chiefs in Spanish Florida at that time were able to write their names.

By 1702 the French settled Mobile, Ala. and the western country was under the command of Pierre LeMoyne, Sieur D'Iberville. He persuaded the Spanish to join the French in an attempt to check the advance of the English from the Atlantic seaboard. In January 1702, Iberville persuaded the Apalachee Indians to join this combination, but the French only laid the plans and sent no soldiers.

In May 1702, Col. Moore, afterwards Governor of South Carolina, launched his attack against Spanish Posts in the Apalachee district. The Apalachee Disaster is given in two accounts - one a letter of Col Moore to the Governor of South Carolina and the Spanish version in a letter to the king written by Gov. Don Jose de Zuniga, May 30, 1704. In both accounts many Indians were slaughtered and many captured. The Apalachee of Northern Florida never fully recovered from this blow.

Some of the remaining Apalachee Indians moved into the territory of Mobile where Rienville, then Governor, furnished them with corn to plant their first crop.

In Charles E. Nolan's "A Southern Catholic Heritage, Vol. 1", he states "The Apalachee Mission was especially noteworthy. This Christian tribe in 1763 moved from the Mobile area to the present day Alexandria area". Many baptisms, marriages and deaths of the Apalachee village are recorded in the Church Records of Immaculate Conception Church, Natchitoches, La.

Hawes' Regt., Virginia Cont'l Line...troops were guarding the captured army of Cornwallis at Winchester--all under Gen. Muhlenburg. After prisoners were sent North, he was marched to Point of Fork in Virginia; discharged, or furloughed until called for. I was never after called for. Whole service btwn 12 and 18 months. Refers to testimony of Vincent Bustle (alias Bussell) & Newton Philips.

Schedule of property shows (necessary bedding and wearing clothes excepted) viz: 1 pine table, 1 flagbottom chair, 2 plates, 1 dish, 1 desk, 1 knife & fork, 2 pewter spoons, 1 iron skillet, 2 jugs--while valued by Court at \$0.

Says he is abt seventy, has no family living with him. Is not of any trade, and now unable to labor because of infirmities.

Vincent Bustle & Newton Philips, both of Stafford Co., appeared in Court...they belonged to company of Capt. Booker--same mess with James Barnwell; all at Barracks at Winchester, arriving within a few days of each other.

Virginia, Fauquier County..26 August 1823, in open Court appeared JAES BARNWELL, aged abt seventy years resident said county - enlisted for 3 yrs under Capt. Booker, etc...

Application sent in from Falmouth, Va. by Zach. Vowles.

James Barnwell on Virginia Roll at \$8 per month. Commencing 26 Aug. 1823. Cert. #19,048 issued 6 Sept. 1823. Sent to Zachariah Vowles, Es.

Died 27 April 1824.

Again ordered to Wilmington, remained encamped near there until latter part of April 1776; disbanded. Marched frm Greenville, N.C. abt 1st of May 1778 under Lieut. Austin Spain, proceeded to Halifax, N.C. to Virginia...to West Point, where he helped build the fort...to Philadelphia - remained there until Apr. 1779, under Col. John Mebane - Col. Hogan having become General. Back to Halifax, N.C., discharged. He thinks he reached home the 11th May 1779.

N.C....Secretary's Office, 15 June 1819. William Hill. Sec'y of States, certifies that from the Muster-roll of N.C. Continental Line, Rev. War, it appears that Hy Barnhill was a private in Capt. Child's company. on the 20th of July 1778 for nine months.

On N.C. Roll at \$30 per annum. Certf. 12,163 issued 21 Nov. 1837. (Earlier Cert. #12,163 issued 3 April 1833 at \$80 per annum.)

Mrs. John F. Barnhill, 5369 Pine Tree Drive, Miami Beach, Florida wrote Veterans Admin. Sept. 6, 1937 inquiring abt services of Henry Barnhill, James Barnhill and David Barnhill. Their reply gave inf. on pensions of first two, and stated they had no record of David.

Hon. Ezekiel Candler, Corinth, Miss. wrote abt Henry and William Barnhill, Oct. 6, 1909. Reply - had nothing on William.

The author of the book died in June 1974, and it has been published by his wife, Marian, who worked closely with him from its beginning.

This is a history and genealogy of the JAMES HART family, which had its beginning in South Carolina where the earliest records of James were found in United States. It covers ten generations and a period of 225 years (around 1750 to present) Though the beginning was in South Carolina, its ending represents almost every state in the U.S.A.

These Harts were a prolific family. James and his wife, Elizabeth, had six children. One son, Henry, who married Nancy Rainey, migrated to Bedford County, Tenn. where he reared 14 children. Henry's children married into families of Gott, Jones, Farris, Martin, Coats, Gossage, Rice, Morris, Shook, Frier and Hill.

James' son, Derryl, married Jane Pitts and migrated to Chambers County, Ala., where he raised 8 children who married into families of Boyd, Walker, Taylor, Calloway, Strahan, Harper, and Avery. Some of James' children continued to live in Edgefield, S.C., where the records were found of James' first land grants and his record of service in the Revolutionary War.

The six allied families are: the John Rainey family (Va., Carolinas and Tenn.); the Gossage family (England, Maryland, N.C., S.C. and Tenn.); Randolph family (Illinois); Wasson family (Tenn. & Ill.); Dixon family (Tenn. & Ill.) and a very lengthy chapter on the Morris family (S. C., Tenn., Ala. and many other places). it is 6 X 9 - 456 pages - hard back - indexed with 7,000 names.

An intriguing map made by Azariah Dunham in 1766 prompted Joseph Kearney to begin his tremendous nine-year project of compiling these 8 charts. Dunham's Map, besides showing churches, taverns and even trees, named fifty families who lived along a road that divided Somerset and Middlesex Counties in New Jersey. Kearney's Charts are a result of his search into the background

of these families whose forebears came from Europe in 1600's. Though his interest was sparked by 50 families, his charts begin with 105 families, the first generation he has recorded.

Colonial Kinsman is 8 pages 25 X 38 inches. Each page is divided into six columns with each column representing a generation. Individuals in each column are code connected to adjacent columns - parents to the left, children to the right. All persons on the charts are connected by blood or marriage.

Every abstracted will, shown in the New Jersey Archives up through 1817, was studied for possible application or significance in creating Colonial Kinsman. In all, more than 500 wills were used in weaving the kinship fabric.

The very great number of documentary sources used and cited are intended to immediately equip the user with multiple reference sources to enable him to expand upon charted data in the specific areas of his personal interest.

The author feels that Colonial Kinsman should be looked upon as a very large and reliable framework of genealogical "building blocks" applicable to enormous numbers of people now living. For such people it should be used as a "floor" upon which to build and expand their own genealogies.

This is the enchanting story of Frank Villines, his family and the people of the Arkansas Ozarks near the Buffalo River. Frank was born on the "Creek" in Newton County, caught his first fish from it and never lived very far from its banks. Billie Touchstone Hardaway met Frank Villines in the fall of 1970 when he was 86 years old and she spent the next two years recording his tales about life in this rough and beautiful country. They traveled hundreds of miles to visit the people and places mentioned in Frank's story of his home on the river.

These Hills, My Home depicts the lives of the settlers of Newton County and their blacksmithing, Cedar harvest, "lasses making", and of course tall tales. For readers with a genealogical interest, Mrs. Hardaway has included information and burial records on these families. Marriage records of Newton County, Ark. from 1867 through 1871 are at the end of the book. There are lots of pictures of people in the stories. It is a 5½ x 8½ - 180 pages paperback or hardback - indexed.

This 1860 census of Hunt County is the second Hunt County census transcribed by Loraine Dodson Story, a lifelong resident of Hunt County and a family genealogist. The Mortality and Slave schedules have been added by the editors. It should be noted that the handwriting in this census is, in many cases, extremely difficult to decipher. All possible spellings of surnames should be checked. For instance - Lively and Linley, McCombs and MacCombs, etc. No effort has been made to correct the original spelling. The names are copied as the Census taker wrote and spelled them.

This printed census is not in the same order as that on the microfilm. The Census itself was microfilmed out of order, splitting precincts and families. In several instances the head of the household, his wife and one or two children will be listed. The rest of the family will not appear on the microfilm until ten or twenty pages later. They have restored the children to their parents by typing each precinct or beat number as a whole, however, they made no effort to arrange the precincts in numerical order. 8½ X 11 - softbound - 144 pages - Indexed.

The first section of this book is on the Family of Haile, Heale, Hale and Interrelated Families. George Hale arrived in Virginia on the ship "Supply" around 1620. He married around 1626 a young lady of English blood. His son Nicholas is the second generation. This family is taken through eleven generations. Back of each head of family, be it male or female, will be found their ancestors back to generation one. This makes for fast and easy tracing - Interrelated families are Hambleton, Grant, Ford, Saylor, Chamberlain, Boring, Chenoweth, Miller and Range.

The second section is The Family of Crowe, Crow, Cro and Interrelated families. The first Crowe to sail the mighty Atlantic was John Crowe, and he arrived by 1619 in Virginia. The researcher believes he married in Ireland and brought his wife with him to the New World. This family is also taken through eleven generations and the same format is used as for the Hale family. Interrelated families are McPhatridge, Tilson, Comer, Hyland and the French Huguenot family of Agee. It is a 6 X 9 - hardback - 228 pages - indexed.

William Aulls was born Jan. 21, 1748 and died Feb. 23, 1816. He is believed to be the son of William Aulls who was born April 30, 1730 and died Feb. 16, 1806 and Elizabeth Calhoun, who died Sept. 28, 1792. Of Scotch ancestry, he came to America from Londonderry, Ireland in 1767. He went back to Ireland after a short time and returned in 1771. On Oct. 11, 1772 he married Elizabeth (Daniels) Morris, who was born 1746 and died Aug 17, 1823. She was a young widow of a sea captain. William settled in New Jersey where he was a merchant and Miller.

In 1775 he moved to Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and during his stay in Pennsylvania he fought in the Revolutionary War. After the war, he moved his family to Pleasant Valley, N. Y.

The history of his descendants is given through nine generations. The dates of birth and death, date of marriage and name of spouse and their parents is given for each descendant.
