"MY EXPERIENCES IN THE CONFEDERACY"

We then went to Marshall. The Federals kept pretty close after us, until we crossed a stream a mile or two from town. Shanks' regiment was ordered to hold Brown while we attacked the town. He succeeded in holding Brown several hours; but we were whipped.

We tried to get away by the north, but our command was out in two. We went into camp at Malta Bend. Here forty pounds of ammunition were issued to each man and our artillery wagon was thrown into the river. We had lost one piece at Marshall, and Colonel Hunter had taken the other with him, so we had none. The next morning at dawn we passed through Waverly. As our rear guard left town the Federal advance guard came in.

I was weak and sick. At this point I dropped out of the command, going to the home of my uncle, William L. Lewis. I had been there only two days when captured by Federals.

I was first taken to Masonic College, Lexington. Here we were treated regally. Ladies were allowed to visit us and we were fed bountifully. The boys, accompanied by guards, were allowed to call on the young ladies of the town.

I was imprisoned here for two or three weeks. Then with about fifteen others, I was sent to Jefferson City, where we were kept in a house on High Street. This house was within a stockade. After fifty years, I have seen this house again, and except for the stockade it remains unchanged!

In December 1863 I was sent to Gratiot Street Prison, Saint Louis. This had formerly been McDowell College. Over a thousand prisoners were kept here -- it being a distributing prison. Prisoners from there went to Alton, Little Rock, Rock Island, Camp Douglas, Johnson's Island and other places.

We had only two meals daily. These usually consisted of light bread, salt meat, potatoes and a cup of coffee, -- short rations!

I was sick during my entire confinement in prison. Ague, which I took at Little Rock, continued fourteen months. On three different occasions I was in the hospital.

That winter was extreme. I remember on New Year's day 1864, the thermometer registered thirty degrees below zero. I was confined in the "Round Room", as it was called. The officers' prison was directly above us. Colonel Owen, a friend of mine from Clinton was brought here, wounded, one night during my stay.

The windows in this room were large and many of the panes of glass were gone--so the wind had full sweep. This made the cold doubly hard to bear.

Two large coal stoves were there to heat the room, but the prison was out of coal, so wood was burned. As many prisoners as could do so crowed about

the stoves to warm. The others marched about the room, time after time, until warmed, and then jumped in their bunks. These were all around the walls. I think there were probably four hundred men confined in this room.

I once saw a man, named Ricketts, from Arkansas, pay twenty-five cents for a rat, which he cooked and ate!!

The Sisters of Charity visited the prison daily and were ministering angels to all the afflicted. They were the only women that we saw. The Catholic priests were the only representatives of the clergy whom I saw there.

My release came February 11th, 1864, and was quite unexpected by me. Dr. Nathaniel English, my mother's brother, married to my father's sister Hannah Warth, had been working earnestly in my behalf. He lived at Jacksonville, Illinois, and was a man of prominence in his state. He was the governor's physician--who had sent him to look after the wounded Illinois soldiers on the battlefields of Pea Ridge, Corinth and others. He was also well acquainted with Lincoln and when I was released, said to me: "Sam, if my efforts to secure your release had proved futile in this case, I should have gone to Washington and seen Father Abraham in your behalf." A worth-while kinsman!

When I was captured and sent to Gratiot Street Prison Uncle Nat went to Springfield and saw Governor Yates in my behalf. Yates wrote a request to General Schofield asking my release. This Dr. English took with him to Saint Louis, and sought an interview with the general. This he was three days in securing.

Schofield read the letter and told my uncle to go home, that I should be released in a few days.

Dr. English returned home and awaited my coming with impatience, but in vain. In glancing over the Missouri Republican a few days after, he saw I had been sentenced to Alton Prison, at hard labor, for the period of the war. Ominous news!

At once he went to Springfield and saw the governor who wrote a second letter to Schofield. My uncle followed his first procedure and was again told I would be released in a few days. This message was correct, for I was released shortly thereafter. My uncle was not allowed to see me in the prison. This time it was not to be a case of "hope deferred which maketh the heart sick".

On the morning of February 11, 1864, I was standing in the prison door, much depressed in spirit. An officer stepped into the room, drew a paper from his pocket, and called: "S. V. Warth!"

I answered: "Here."

He told me to get my clothes, that I was wanted at Headquarters. This did not take long--a prisoner's wardrobe always being scanty. The boys called out: "How are you, Alton? We'll be with you in a few days!"

I was taken to the prison office and my baggage was searched for contraband articles. A guard was told I was wanted at Headquarters. I followed him, wondering what might be in store for me. The soldier rode some distance ahead of me. I knew, of course, that nothing very bad could be awaiting me, or a

stricter watch would have been kept over me. The soldier, at times, was so far ahead of me that I easily could have made my escape were it not for my great weakness.

He reached Headquarters a block ahead of me, and awaited my coming. We went upstairs, he opened a door, set my grip inside, and told me to take a seat.

There was only one other person in the room, a man at a desk, busily engaged in writing. He looked up presently and enquired my name. When told this, he shoved a paper before me and told me to sign. I did so, not reading the document. He then asked me to sign another. When I had done so, he told me to take one of them home, I was once more a free man!

However, I was not to remain in Missouri, but was to go to Illinois. Had they but known it, this suited me exactly for my people were no longer in Missouri, conditions having become so unpleasant they could not remain. They had gone to Jacksonville, Illinois.

We had formerly lived at Clinton, Missouri and when the war ceased, we returned there.

On leaving Headquarters I enquired when I could get a train to Jacksonville. The train did not leave until afternoon. In the meantime I went to an Olive Street hotel and registered--after my name I wrote "Just out of Gratiot Street Prison". The clerk looked at me closely, also a Federal officer who chanced to be there, and many guests examined the register.

That dinner was the first square meal I had had in a long time and I overate myself. I took the train for Springfield that afternoon and reached Jacksonville next morning.

The prisoner's return was a season of rejoicing to my father, my mother, my youngest brother and to my sisters, and most of all to myself.

EXPERIENCES IN THE CONFEDERACY By Samuel V. Warth - Continued

In compliance with Special Orders No. 25, par. 7, Headquarters Dept. of the Mo. of date January 28th, 1864 Samuel V. Warth, a citizen of Lafayette County, Mo. will be released from Gratiot Street Prison and banished to the State of Illinois, there to remain during the present rebellion. He will report to this office weekly by letter.

The foregoing account of his "Experiences in the Confederacy" was obtained through the courtesy of Mary Medearis, Southwest Regional Arkansas Archives. The article was a part of an unpublished manuscript of Family History written by his son & only child, John Thornton Warth, who was born Sept. 2, 1875, Nevada, Missouri and died June 5, 1949, Nevada, Missouri.

Samuel Vance Warth, was b. Oct. 31, 1837, Malden, Virginia, d. May 19, 1928, Anderson, Missouri, son of Mary English and George Harrison Warth, and younger brother of my paternal great grandmother, Priscilla Jane Warth Shrewsbury Gaiter.

He served in the Army of the Confederacy as Private, Co. B., 1st. Missouri Cavalry, Frank Gordon's Regiment, from Aug. 1862 to Feb. 1864. He married June 23, 1874 Clara Thornton (b. July 3, 1843, Batavia, Ohio, and died Dec. 29, 1910, Nevada, Missouri.)

LETTERBOOK OF THE NATCHITOCHESES -- SULPHUR FORK FACTORY 1809-1821

INTRODUCTORY NOTE

On the single roll of this microfilm publication is reproduced the Letterbook of the Natchitoches--Sulphur Fork Factory, which contains copies of letters sent from June 21, 1809, to December 31, 1821. Most of the letters were sent to the Superintendent of Indian Trade in Washington, D.C., and some were sent to military officers, merchants, and other persons.

An act of Congress approved March 3, 1795 (1 Stat. 443), which provided for trading with the Indians, authorized that a sum not exceeding \$50,000 be appropriated to the purchase of goods for supplying the Indians within the limits of the United States, and that the sale of such goods be made under the direction of the President of the United States. Underlying this venture in Government ownership and operation of business were broad considerations of public policy. Through the publicly owned trading houses and through a parallel system of licensing private trades, it was hoped to attach the Indians more closely to the Government, to exclude foreigners from the fur trade, and to supply the Indians with good quality merchandise at fair prices. The headquarters for supplying the factories and for receiving furs and pelts was at first in Philadelphia, but it was moved to Georgetown, D. C., in 1807.

The legislative history of the venture after 1795 was subject to many acts of Congress that extended and sometimes modified the Indian trading house system. Among them were the acts of April 18, 1796 (1 Stat. 452), April 30, 1802 (2 Stat. 173), April 21, 1806 (2 Stat. 402), and May 6, 1822 (3 Stat. 679). The first of these acts authorized the President to establish Government trading houses or factories on the western and southern frontiers or in the Indian country, provided for the appointment of necessary personnel, and appropriated funds for the purpose of carrying on a liberal trade with the several Indian nations. This act expired in 1799 but was revived and extended by the act of 1802. The act of 1806 restated with modifications the principal provisions of the act of 1796 and created the post of Superintendent of Indian Trade as central purchasing officer and general supervisor of the trading houses. The act of 1822 abolished the trading house system.

The Natchitoches Trading House, or "factory" as it was called, was established in October 1805 and was one of the first trading houses situated west of the Mississippi River after the Louisiana Purchase. Its first location was on Red River in present-day Louisiana, a short distance above Natchitoches. In 1818 it was moved farther up the river to Sulphur Fork in present-day Arkansas, where it remained until the trading house or factory system was abolished in 1822.

The three factors who served at the Natchitoches--Sulphur Fork Factory were Thomas M. Linnard, 1805-16; John Fowler, 1816-20; and William McClellan, 1821-22. There are copies of letters sent from each of these factors, but there is a gap in the chronology from May 26, 1820, to March 9, 1821. Apparently Fowler did not transcribe copies of his letters during the last several months before his death in the winter of 1820, and after his death there was no factor until McClellan assumed control in 1821.

CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS AND FAMILIES IN BRAZIL

Our thanks to Mr. Rayburn G. Pyle, Jr. for letting us use his material on this Confederate exodus to Brazil and Tombstone Records of The "Campo" Cemetery which will be published in future issues.

No great stretch of imagination is required to understand the state of mind of the Confederate soldier when he returned home in late spring or early summer of 1865. The brutalizing effects of four years of war had made conditions in the South frightful. They were made infinitely worse by the reconstruction program which the Federal government undertook to improve upon the conquered section. Some decided to flee their native land and start anew under foreign flags---some chose Mexico, Central America and South America. Brazil attracted more ex-Confederates than any other country. The period of heaviest migration was 1865-1870, but Brazil continued to receive southern settlers in lesser numbers until the early years of the 20th century.

From the National Archives, the following list of Americans in Brazil in 1906 from the U.S. Consular Dispatches in Santos Brazil:

The letters in the volume reproduced in this microfilm publication are arranged in chronological order. Blank numbered pages have not been filmed.

The letterbook is part of the records in the National Archives designated as Record Group 75, Records of the Bureau of Indian Affairs. In the same record group are closely related records consisting of journals, daybooks, ledgers, index to ledgers, package books, invoices inward, and miscellaneous accounts of the Natchitoches--Sulphur Fork Factory. Additional related records include a series of Letters Sent by the Superintendent of Indian Trade, 1807-23 (Microcopy 16), which also includes copies of letters sent to the Natchitoches--Sulphur Fork Factory, and a series of Letters Received by the Superintendent of Indian Trade, 1806-24 (Microcopy T-58), which also includes a few original letters received from the factory.

Other related records in the same record group include Letters Sent by the Secretary of War Relating to Indian Affairs, 1800-24 (Microcopy 15); Letters Received by the Office of the Secretary of War Relating to Indian Affairs, 1800-23 (Microcopy 271); Letterbook of the Creek Trading House, 1795-1816 (Microcopy 4); Letterbook of the Arkansas Trading House 1805-10) Microcopy 142); and Records of the Choctaw Trading House, 1803-25 (Microcopy T-500).

The records reproduced in this microcopy were prepared for filming by Herman J. Viola, who also wrote these introductory remarks and provided the other editorial material.

NATCHITOCHE PARISH NOTES

By Fern Ainsworth

T H E N A S H F A M I L Y

The name "NASH" may have been a corruption of ATTENASH - at the Ash. A place near Bristol, England is called "NAISH" and in Gaelic it is "NAISG". The name is found early in Oxford, Worcester, London, Suffolk and Lancaster in England, as well as Ulster, Ireland and Wales.

According to one source, "The Media Research Bureau, Washington, D.C., the family and names are of Saxon origin and is claimed to have been in England before the Norman conquest in 1066, but because of its early association with the De La Roche family of Lorraine I would like to see more research on the pre-Norman Nash family in England.

The family of ROCH derives from Le Seure De Rochville or "DE LA ROCHE" who accompanied The Duke of Normandy (William - a descendant of Rolla the Norseman) at the invasion of England and was one of the knights who fought at the Battle of Hastings 1066 when William defeated Harald. This event united England with Normandy, France under William's leadership as king. For his military service at this battle and others, De La Roche received from the conqueror three lordships in Wales. The name was sometimes spelled De Rupe and was with a band of Anglo-Normans who went with Strongbow (The Earl of Pembroke) in their successful conquest of the southern provinces of Ireland. He was given the estate of Rosso-lihir where he built a magnificent castle on the River Brandon. Richard De La Roche married Amy the heiress of Sir William Flemming, Lord of Arnoy, and with his bride, received the district which was made a barony, giving Roch the title of Lord.

1171 in a list of passengers from Wales to Ireland is found the name NAISH. The NASHES were early settlers in Limerick and Clare counties as listed in "Irish Pedigrees" by John O'Hart. Interesting also are some of the names of families in the same area. ROCHE - BARNHILL, TAYLOR, etc. All Normans who came with William 200 years before.

Ireland was subjugated by a colony of Welsh under Strongbow 1172, and in 1210 King John (of Magna Charta fame) appointed 12 shires in Leinster and Munster. "The lands of Ballycullen were granted in 1210" to the progenitor of Carroll - Patrick Naish, Esq., of Ballycullen, County, Limerick, born 1801 whose great grandfather was Carroll Naish, Esq., of Ballycullen.

John Nash was sheriff of city of Limerick in 1327, and in Glamorganshire, stands "Nash Manor House" built pre 1500.

Ireland has been noted for its rebellions and the 17th century was filled with revolts, and when we consider the deeds of Oliver Cromwell in his transplanting of Irish people and confiscating their lands and homes, it should not be surprising to people in the 20th century that they are still rebelling. The Nash Family fared quite badly during the 1600's - as shown by the lists of deportations to the colonies and lists of property confiscated. To quote a few (almost all of this list is taken from John O'Hart's Irish Landed Gentry when Cromwell came to England and Hotten's Lists).

INDEX TO COMPILED SERVICE RECORDS OF VOLUNTEER SOLDIERS WHO SERVED DURING
THE FLORIDA WAR IN ORGANIZATIONS FROM THE STATE OF LOUISIANA

On the roll of this microfilm publication is reproduced an alphabetical card index to the compiled service records of volunteer soldiers belonging to units from the State of Louisiana who served in Florida in a campaign referred to by these records as the Florida War. The index contains most of the names of Louisiana soldiers to which references were found in the records used in compiling the service records. The cards give the name of the soldier, his rank, and the unit in which he served. There are cross-reference cards for soldiers' names that appeared in the records under more than one spelling.

The supposedly correct name of a soldier from Louisiana may not appear in this index for several reasons. First, he may not have served in a Louisiana unit. Second, he may have served under a different name or used a different spelling of his name. Third, proper records of his service may not have been made, or, if made, may have been destroyed or lost in the confusion that often attended the initial mobilization or subsequent military operations and disbandment of troops. Fourth, the reference to the soldier in the original records may be so vague that it has not been practicable to determine his correct name or the unit in which he served. Fifth, the soldier may have served in the Regular Army instead of a volunteer organization.

The index cards reproduced in this microcopy are part of a body of records in the National Archives designated as Record Group 94, Records of the Office of The Adjutant General. Other microfilm publications of State indexes to compiled service records have been issued or are being prepared.

The compiled service records indexed by this microcopy have not been reproduced. They consist of a jacket-envelope for each soldier, labeled with his name and typically containing card abstracts of entries relating to the soldier as found in original muster rolls. A typical example of a compiled service record is reproduced on the first roll of this microcopy.

The compiled service records of soldiers belonging to units from a particular state are arranged according to a complicated organizational breakdown ending with the regiment or independent battalion or company. Under each unit the service records are arranged alphabetically by soldiers' surnames. Unless the unit in which a soldier served is already known, his compiled service record can be located only through the use of an index, such as the one reproduced here for the State of Louisiana, that gives the unit in which he served.

The compilation of service records of soldiers of the Florida War was begun around 1891 under the direction of Maj. Fred C. Ainsworth head of the Record and Pension Division of the War Department. The abstracts made from the original records were verified by a separate operation of comparison and every conceivable precaution was taken to ensure that the abstracts and indexes were accurate.

Reproduction of compiled service records corresponding to entries in the index reproduced in this microcopy may be obtained from the National Archives for a fee. Requests for such reproductions should give the State, regiment

These marriages are extracted from Indian Chieftain Newspapers. The land of the Cherokees was first occupied by full blood members of the tribe and intermarried whites and Cherokee Indians and later by hordes of intruders.

As the years passed, there was created still another class of citizens of the Cherokee Nation - White men and women with a right to live in the land because of their profession. These included doctors, missionaries, U.S. Government employees and people whose skills were needed by the Nation.

So the Cherokee Nation became to a degree, a melting pot of peoples, and here men and women of all classes married, children were born and people died. The early newspapers recorded these events.

It is from the Indian Chieftain and Daily Chieftain that the compilers of this valuable addition to the history of the Cherokee Nation have obtained the names of persons marrying in the Nation or nearby states during the years 1884 through 1901. The oldest civil records to be found in St. James Parish, La. are contained in two ledgers entitled, "Spanish Land Grants", and cover the years 1782 through 1787. There are no land grants in these two volumes; they contain records of land and slave sales, marriages and successions, such as those found in old Conveyance books. The records are in French, with the exception of several Spanish documents of the New Orleans Notaries. All are signed by Michel Cantrell, the Commandant of St. James from 1776 - 1805.

This book contains the abstracts of 250 documents; land and slave sales, marriage contracts and successions. Two appendices (1) Marriage contracts from Acts - 1808 (2) Confirmation of Administrators, guardians, etc. 1812 - 1878. All documents have been translated. 8½ X 11, soft bound - 93 pages - indexed.

This is a major presentation of genealogical research, with records of 11 generations of descendants of Johannes Schoenholtzer, the German immigrant who settled in Chester Co., PA. in 1727. His descendants were traced into almost every state in the nation from 1727 through 1979, including female lines. After the Revolutionary War a major branch of the family migrated to Frederick Co., Va., and then settled in Hampshire Co., Va. (now West Virginia), in 1798. Another branch moved westward into Ohio during the early 1800s.

The name was spelled originally Schoenholtzer in German, meaning "expert wood-cutter or carver." The most common spellings of the name today are: Shanholtzer, considered to be the correct translation into English, Shanholtz, meaning beautiful forest; Shainholtz, the prevalent spelling for those who did not migrate to Virginia; Shinholtz; Shinholt; and Shinott, a branch which settled in Jennings Co., Indiana, during the 1830s.

This book contains a number of features not found in the typical family history. There are 223 pictures, most of which represent the earlier generations of people born between 1792 and 1900; a picture album within itself. A historical perspective is presented with an account of the name, family characteristics, religion, occupations, military records, education, migration patterns, the land, customs, family reunions, language, and biographical sketches and geographical location of individual families. A simple numbering system assists the reader in tracing lineages back through successive generations to the immigrant ancestor. Names of parental in-laws are given, where known. In addition to the Shanholtzer family tree, the book contains a 136-page account of allied family roots, including the origin and early beginnings of families such as Buckwalter, Buzzard, Cowgill, Fries, Fultz, Hott, Keiter, Kerns, Loy, Parlett, Poston, Queen, Ritchie, Saville, Whitacre, Williams, and Yeakley. Most of these families migrated from Pennsylvania to Virginia during the 1700s. These are only a few of the family names in the text.

Frederick T. Newbraugh, noted historian in Berkeley Springs, West Virginia, stated in the Foreword that this scholarly presentation is a new adventure in genealogical writing, and that the work will become a collector's item. It has value and interest to historians and genealogists on families other than Shanholtzer.

The book contains 1,056 printed pages, including frontmatter and an index with almost 20,000 entries. Typeset with mixed composition in text; easy to read. Hard textbook cover.

A DIFFERENT STORY offers a black history of a Virginia city and surrounding counties important in the early development of the state and nation.

Already known for such Revolutionary War era residents as George Washington, Hugh Mercer, Fielding Lewis and James Monroe, the area is gaining a growing awareness of the role played by the black community in its total history.

In an area settled in the late 1600s, Fredericksburg and its neighbor, Falmouth, were colonial seaports where ships' cargoes included African slaves. Continuing beyond the American Revolution as an agricultural and trading center, the area had a population which included a significant number of free blacks, some of them families which became prominent in other states, such as Michigan and Illinois.

Midway between Washington, D.C. and Richmond, the city of Fredericksburg was on the route of many runaway slaves including Georgia's innovative Ellen and William Craft. It was also a center for the area's African colonization movement which sent many blacks to Liberia before the Civil War. The strategically located region suffered through several major battles of the Civil War, fought in part by area blacks whose military participation dates from the Revolutionary War.

Frequently representative of the nation's black history in general, stories of the area's families, schools and churches are presented in this volume. Topics covered include free blacks and slaves before the Civil War, occupations and owners, rebellions and runaways, alternatives to slavery, the Civil War itself, and politics and community life from emancipation through the years following World War I. In concluding chapters by three Fredericksburg area residents writing from personal experience, recent history from the 1930s through the 1970s is detailed, including segregation, politics, the sit-ins, the growth of the area's civil rights movements and other developments, such as the election of Fredericksburg's first black mayor in 1976.

A DIFFERENT STORY contains hundreds of family names, many of which can still be found in the area. Descendants of other early residents live throughout the U.S. It also presents much newly found information about the black communities of the area and will interest genealogists and scholars as well as general readers. 336 pages - annotated and indexed.

Between 1714 and 1803 the colonial Louisiana outpost of Natchitoches was home to more than 6,000 hardy colonists. Many of their lives are sketched in the records of the parish church which have been translated and published as Volumes 2 and 4 of this series. Yet, even these priceless records are woefully incomplete, leaving many gaps that plague the colonial researcher.

NATCHITOCHEES COLONIALS seeks to fill many of these gaps. These volumes were maintained from 1750 until 1804 and contain records of transactions from the early days of the colony in the 1730's through the beginning of the American Revolution, as well as documents relating to the disposition of lands confiscated from Loyalists during and after the war.

Also included in the book are an index to names contained in tree related records of sales of confiscated lands and an index to names mentioned in related legislation.
