VANCEVILLE, LOUISIANA

Vanceville, first called Shady Grove, was never more than a small community center. It was located on the Red River between Bossier City (across the river from Shreveport) and Benton. All that now remains to identify the site is the Vanceville Road sign, which marks the junction of that roadway with Benton Road (Louisiana State Highway 3). Vanceville, or Shady Grove, had its genesis in the Shady Grove Plantation. That plantation was initially a part of the Cash Point Plantation. The first tract of Cash Point was a 640-acre section of land purchased by Rezin Pleasant Bowie in the region's initial U. S. government land auctions of 1839. Rezin was a brother of James Bowie, and is said to have crafted his brother's first "Bowie knife." Bowie soon sold the tract to George O. Gilmer. Gilmer added several other pieces of adjacent land, to make up Cash Point, one of his several plantations. Before he died in 1849, George donated his properties to his children. Daughters Sally and Mary divided Cash Point between them. Sally's half retained the plantation name, and Mary renamed her plantation – which included most of the Bowie tract – Shady Grove.

Mary Gilmer Sandidge sold Shady Grove to the Shreveport plantation-outfitting firm of Walsh and Boisseau shortly before the "Bossier Riots." Shady Grove Plantation was the flash-point site of the "Bossier" or "Shady Grove Riots," precipitated by racial and political tensions preceding the fall 1868 presidential election. A traveler from Arkansas calling one of the plantation's black "freedmen" a "radical," and firing a pistol at him started the series of violent events. The Arkansas man was chained by the neck to a tree, to be delivered to the authorities in Bellevue the next day. He was freed that night by some local white men. In the escalation of events, several Shady Grove freedmen were killed by a "delegation" from Arkansas; two sons of local planters were killed by freedmen; and as many as 162 area freedmen (by one account) were killed by the "Arkansas delegation" and the planters (said to have included planters; John, Calvin, Tom and Whitfield Vance). A few months after the riots, the plantation was sold to neighboring planter and physician, Samuel W. "Whitfield" Vance.

The small town or community center of Shady Grove originated with and revolved around the plantation store. During the mid-1870's, Doctor Whitfield Vance employed a young man named Samuel J. Zeigler as his store manager. Doctor Vance's daughter Sarah petitioned for and was granted her emancipation in January 1877. Samuel Zeigler was one of those certifying that they believed "Sallie" to be the age of eighteen and capable of managing her own affairs. In February 1877, Whitfield traded properties with his daughter. He relinquished his 633-acre Shady Grove Plantation and additional acreage, totaling 968 acres. In return, Sallie gave her father the 975-acre Buckhall Plantation, just upriver. (Sallie's mother was the daughter of James B. Gilmer, the owner of even more plantations than his father, George. Whitfield was married to one of James Gilmer's daughters. After his wife's death, he became tutor to his minor daughter and the administrator of her share of the Gilmer estate, which included the Buckhall Plantation.) Samuel Zeigler and Sallie Vance were married February 13, 1877. Doctor S. W. Vance died suddenly a few months later.

Samuel Zeigler set about making a going enterprise of the Shady Grove store. He guaranteed in the Bossier Banner that through volume buying from St. Louis and New Orleans he could sell his groceries as low as any house in Shreveport – thus saving the people of Bossier Parish (county) seven miles hauling over bad roads. He advertised his line of liquor to be complete from the cheapest “bust head” to the finest Kentucky whiskey, brandy, wine, rum, gin and Champagne. He also advertised that he was able to accommodate travelers with meals and lodging to a limited extent. Mr. Zeigler was a progressive man, and would become one of northwest Louisiana’s foremost businessmen. He wanted and needed a telephone at Shady Grove. Shreveport had obtained a telephone exchange in 1882, but the company refused to carry its line beyond the city limits. Mr. Zeigler built and maintained his own line to Shreveport seven miles away, crossing the river from the tops of two tall cottonwood trees – giving Shady Grove the first telephone in Bossier Parish.

It was mandated by the state legislature in 1880 that the voters of Bossier Parish have an opportunity to choose a parish seat more centrally located than Bellevue. Shady Grove would have been a good location as pointed out in the Bossier Banner by its proponents. It had a central location; was on the Shreveport public road between Cain’s (Bossier City) and points north; and had a splendid steamboat landing. Sallie and Samuel offered the parish forty acres as an incentive to relocate the courthouse there. It was suggested that part of that acreage could be sold for development, and to defray relocation costs. This also satisfied an objection to Shady Grove because of its monopoly of ownership. The acreage was to be a solid block of land, which included river frontage. This would certainly have ensured the growth and development of the town. It was a very generous offer, but Shady Grove didn’t make the first runoff and withdrew. The coveted parish seat eventually went to Benton, but only after years of contested elections, petitions, injunctions, lawsuits, court challenges and appeals. Vanceville, as the town was called by the time the issue was finally settled, missed its chance for a secure existence.

A post office was approved for Shady Grove in 1887, but another town of Shady Grove in South Louisiana had that post office designation. Shady Grove became Vanceville. Sallie Vance Zeigler had died two years earlier, and the name was surely a memorial to her father, and Mr. Zeigler’s father-in-law, Doctor Samuel Whitfield Vance. Vanceville had ten postmasters before mail service was moved to Bossier City in 1907. (An 1839 conveyance record in Laurens County, South Carolina, shows that another Samuel Vance, probably Whitfield’s uncle or a great uncle, donated a site for the “Vanceville school.”) Mr. Zeigler helped promote, and was made first vice president of the Shreveport and Arkansas Railway Company. This branch line of the St. Louis and Southwestern, popularly called the “Cotton Belt,” was established between Shreveport and Lewisville, Arkansas, in 1888. The track was laid through the river plantations along the Bossier side of Red River. Mr. Zeigler sold the railroad a depot site for one dollar, and Vanceville became a station stop on the Cotton Belt Line.

A profile of Bossier Parish towns of 1900 appeared in the Bossier Banner that year. The article offered a sketch of Vanceville of that day: “We cannot boast of being a large place, but can assert that several good men get their mail there. It has one store, a doctor’s office, a church and a post office. The time was when Vanceville was noted for the big balls and entertainment given there, but – well, young people are not as plentiful now.” As alluded, those residing in the surrounding community were considered as living at Vanceville. The town long ago lost its landing when Red River changed course, cutting off the great loop on which Vanceville was situated. All the facilities enumerated above and the depot have long ago disappeared. The “Vanceville gin,” a last vestige, closed operations and was torn down in 1999. Although gone, “Vanceville” still appears on many maps, as is customary for old railway sites. Area residents still allude to Vanceville, but little is known about the place, and even less about Shady Grove.

In 1913 the U. S. Forest Service started buying privately owned land in order to create the Chattahoochee National Forest. They found many unclear titles to this land and it was necessary for the federal government to acquire much of this land through court proceedings. This book is a compilation of names, family relationships and other information found in the records of those proceedings.

The titles to most of the lands were found to be so poor that proceedings of condemnation had to be taken to the Federal Court before good titles could be obtained. The condemnation process required that an attempt be made to locate all parties who might have an interest in or claim to the land in question.

The genealogical data this process produced is invaluable to the researcher. Information was accumulated that has not been found in any other record to date. Most of the transactions affecting the land titles occurred in an earlier era and heirs of the deceased landowners were sought. Both maiden and married names of many female family members can be found. The addresses of those who had moved away also offer possible migration locations for family members.

Although the land involved is almost totally located in Rabun County, Georgia, the parties listed are located all over the United States. Anyone who had ancestors in the early 1800s who lived in the tri-state area of Georgia, North Carolina, and South Carolina would be interested in the information found in this book. This book was published in 1932 for the Cumberland and Westmorland Counties, England, Antiquarian Society. It has been assembled by Mr. Stephens in this book form.

This contains the baptisms, marriages and burials from 1565 through 1812 as recorded in the Cliburn Parish records.

The parish is a sparsely populated one, consisting of but 1821 acres; it is bounded on the North by Brougham, on the South by Morland, on the East by Bolton and on the West by Lowther. Mr. and Mrs. James Lee Gaines came to Texline and filed on land very early. She was the former Ida L. Darnall; the families had come from Georgia to Young County, Texas. In 1912, the J. L. Gaines family had moved to Dalhart, where Mr. Gaines served many years as judge of the police court. The Gaines children were Alma, Bill, Callie, Mae and Wayne.

Joe H. Langhorne - Page 147

Joe Langhorne was born in 1879 near Timpson, Texas, and came to Dalhart in May of 1908. He served as Dalhart City Councilman. There were five children in the family: R.A. (Bob), James W., Mary E., Mrs. R. M. Marshall and Joe Billy.

Dillard Ritchey - Page 152

The families of Dillard and Callie Gaines Ritchey were early settlers in Dalhart. Dillard's father Horace H. Ritchey was born in Putnam County, Tennessee July 3, 1875 and had moved to Fannin County, Texas c1882 with some Uncles. He married in Ladonia, Fannin County, Texas, Lela Bell Woods on July 1, 1894. They later moved to Young County, Texas and then to Dalhart in 1903. Dillard married Callie Gaines on June 30, 1918. They had three children: JoAnn, Maxine and Jack. Mr. Ritchey was with the Dalhart postoffice for over 42 years.

E. Emmett Williams - Page 159

The Coming of the "Little J"

Hear the train coming
Coming around the curve
Whistling and blowing
And straining every nerve

Gamblers Blues

Catalyst of change, the "Little J" railroad opened for operation on October 6, 1882. Available now were direct routes to summer resort cities on the Great Lakes and Appalachian Retreats. For some there was now a quick route to the annual Mardi Gras in New Orleans, or a Honeymoon along the Gulf. Political, Fraternal and veterans conventions were well attended. Sportsmen began traveling widely to attend events like horse racing, boxing and gamecock fights. Baseball fever spread and with parks along the rail lines the Cotton States held great promise. The health giving hot springs became even more popular. Some weekend parties and picnics along the "Little J," drew almost as many people as the 500 who came to the Hermanville political bar-b-cue. The grandest trip was the 1903 St. Louis World Fair run, and riding the trolley to see the exhibits and the buildings honoring every great nation. The rides were topped by the ferris wheel. Telephone equipment was for sale.

By 1903 the four a day whistles of the "Little J" had called the people of the Copiah Corners Communities and worshipers along the line to the churches of Carpenter. Visiting ministers moved more easily, and revivals drew a full house. As business verged on boom, traveling on the "Little J" became the vogue.

James Earl Price was raised in Scutchalo and nicknamed "Sam" in the early Carpenter days-when he worked on the Illinois Central, the old "Little J" line. His grandfather, Thomas Jefferson Price was a Confederate Civil War veteran, who moved his family to the "Corners" the area in 1881. His daddy, J. H. Price told him about excursions to Jackson to see Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show; and to see the Circus; plus a trip to Vicksburg, after 1910, to visit the Battleship Mississippi.

In the 1910 decade-traveling south from Carpenter, through Carlisle and Hermanville on the "Little J" the engineer found a young lady from the Serepta Community waiting at her station. Here's what that lady, Floy McKay Williams, who was ninety nine years young in 1997, had to say;

" Nothing thrilled me as much as standing in front of the depot in Pattison, looking up the train track and seeing the "Little J" coming around the bend". The "Little J" railroad ran through Pattison from Natchez to Jackson. To go by train to Vicksburg we had to change trains at Harriston. (Crossroad with seats which were comfortable. The rest rooms were tidy and well kept.

The conductor was the top notch person on board and his word was law. (Small children were put in his care on short trips-admonished with "Mind the conductor".

"The most welcome and exciting person to come through the coach was the "News Boy" in uniform and cap. He sold newspaper, magazines, fruit, candies and lots of goodies, such as peanuts, popcorn, etc. I can still taste those peppermint sticks."

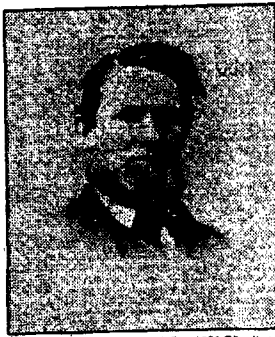

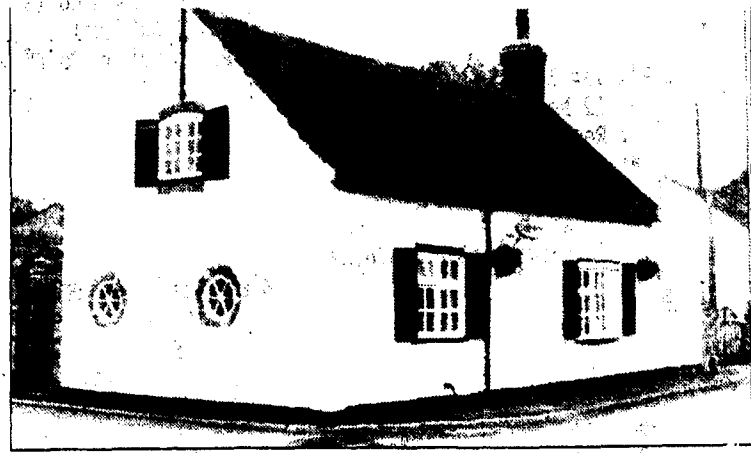

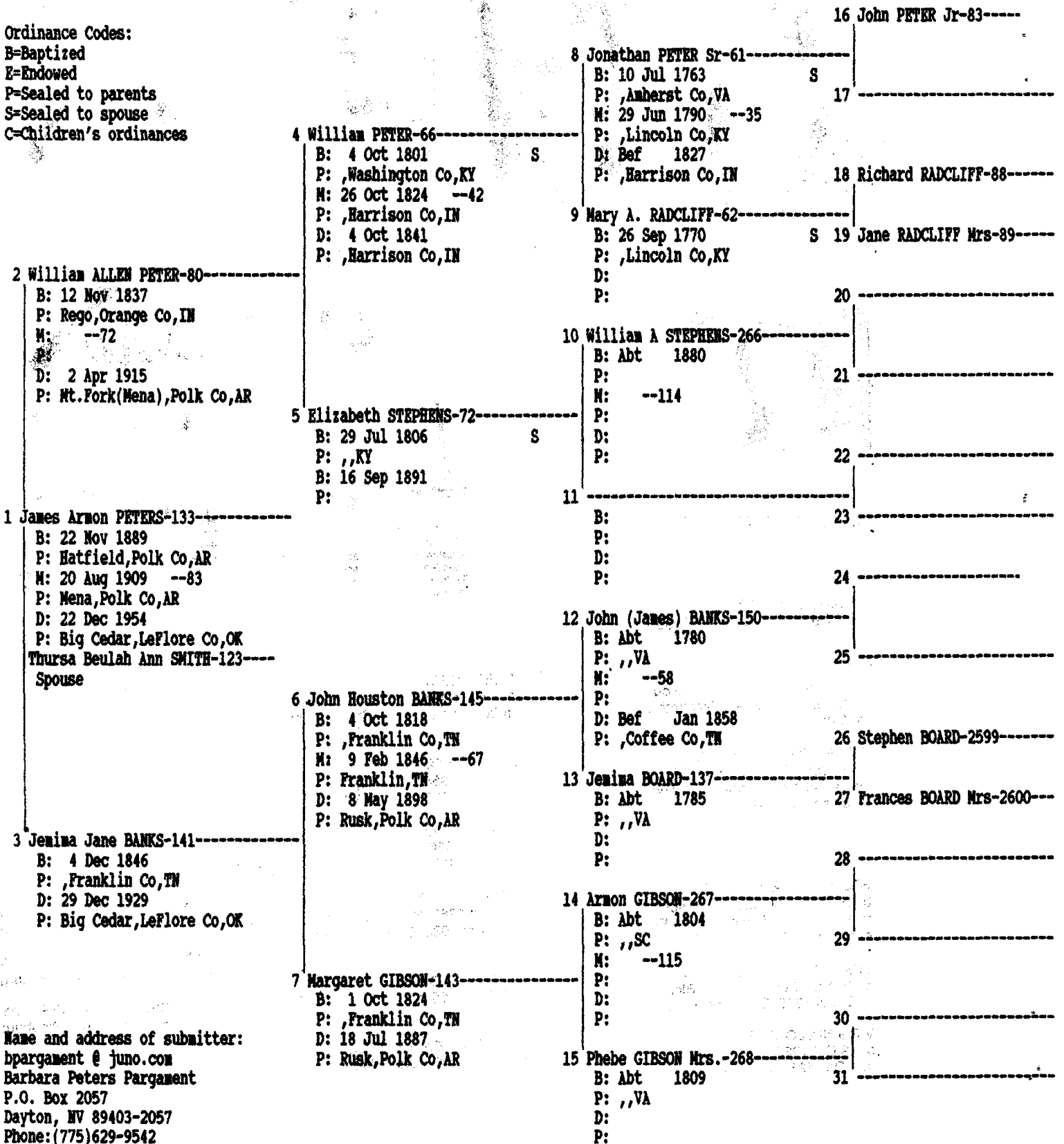
PEDIGREE CHART

Adventures Of Genealogy

There are certain times that we are required to begin a search for a family that we have known for a long time. There is no way to know when you first enter a new person in your data base how importance this surname will become in your family search. Persons who may have served as a witness on a deed may sometime at a later time be a name in your direct line. Take time to investigate new surnames when they are first discovered to be a part of your on-going search.

If you have been in family search any length of time at all you surely must have started a system of filing your documents, both primary and secondary. Don't be confused as to what a document may consist. I have talked to genealogist that will not treat a marriage record as a document unless it was obtained from the clerk of the court. Surely this would be a document far superior to what you may have taken from a printed list of county marriage records in your local library. Documents, primary or secondary, both deserve the same importance in your document file. Note in your document file, the source of your information. If there are other papers that will indicate how this information was obtained, have these records readily available so you may return to the record at a later time. It will save you time to make notes on the other surnames that appear in the document. Perhaps their importance is not imminent at their first appearance. Enter their names in your data base with a note, use some reference to the document number. "Note" if you do not have a Document File, stop entering further information until you have established a system that will allow you to return at a later time, produce the document and stating your source. The most common mistake beginners continue to make; data will be entered without a reference as to how it had been obtained. When questioned, and you will be questioned, and you are unable to produce proof, you have lost an opportunity to prove the dependability of your records. Serious genealogist will question your source, yes it may be in your files, but if it can't be found in a reasonable time, you have lost a chance to prove your records worth. I was given cause of concern when I was first asked to submit evidence of proof. Quite often there are conflicting names and dates in your files you could have made a mistake entering the information, go back and check it out. Have a reference number in your data that will take you direct to your source. After you have proven the records accurate and a difference still exist, and there is no agreement or changes to be made, continue with the records you have if not convinced you are in error.

At my house there are the two of us that are equally excited about our family search. There are good points and bad points where the surnames of the search are not in the same state. The question as to when and to where we will be going for our next search. There are some areas of search that will be of interest to each of us. There have been a number of places in middle Tennessee that have produced information for both of our files. When we were still new in genealogy our problems were different than they are now. It is not always easy to decide the most important direction to proceed. Sorry I will not say all of our methods are cut in stone, you must remain flexible. There are still times when we are going to a new court house or library, the choice of their importance must be considered based on the records you have gathered earlier. At times that we have planned a trip to Tennessee, we were happy we knew

ahead of time that there was a library and a court house that we had not been to before. Your home work may have supplied enough help, you may know the first place you should search. You may have found that there are Great amounts of information that have been placed in your reach through the internet. There is generally a library in the larger towns where the court house is generally located. As you go ask questions about other places where records may be stored. Don't overlook records from the local churches, city directories, many school records are making their way to the library.

Before starting out on a trip study maps of the area write yourself notes as to the lay of the land, your time has a way of running out as you travel. Where you have thought ahead as to where your day would end, be prepared to change your plans when necessary. Lets say you have found a certain person on two census records, you have assured yourself that there is one particular town where your people had lived. You have found cemetery records, marriage records and you may have found a person that you can contact on your arrival. Generally if you find all of this from your local records you decide there is a real need to visit the area, any information you would get from a living ancestor will add a personal touch to your family. Many surprises await you in the location, things you never really considered could happen. I cannot over emphasize the changes in your records after you have made a personal interview with a relative that still lives in the community of an ancestor.

Even after locating a cemetery on your map before your leaving home there are other differences when you get to the location, things don't match up right. Surroundings continue to change, appears you have made a wrong turn. I still have trouble finding a cemetery in the smaller towns that we have visited. There comes a time that you must get some help from a local person. I am not backward when it comes to asking questions from perfect strangers. I have had good luck, sometimes I have asked about a name and end up getting more on another person that had lived in the same location. Times I have had some records on this other person with me. I was pleased to have been given more material than what was on my papers.

After traveling several miles, was still in Tennessee, I realized I had come to a corner and would have to stop. There must have been a dozen people standing around a tent where they had items to sell. I stopped and lowered the car window and asked a lady who was walking away from the sale if there was a cemetery in this area. I had found records that there had been a Dabbs family that had lived near. I had records of two burials in one of the cemeteries in this town. The lady that I wished to speak had to come up closer to the car before she could tell what I had asked. After I was fully stopped she walked up to the car, close enough to look in the car. There in the car we had opened a note book that had Family Group Sheets of several Dabb families. This one lady was close enough to the car to understand what I had asked about the cemetery. so close she could see that there were records of people in our hands. Before we could let her look at our records she had read ahead of us and became very excited. What a big surprise when she screamed, "Why Is My Mothers Name On Those Papers " ? Her question caught us off guard, how were we to know why her mothers name happened to be on the Family Group Sheet that was on the top of all the papers we were looking at. This lady was looking at just one record, there were many more in the stack. She was not the only Dabbs, the sale had been run by several Dabbs families, they all had an interest in our records.

After a long interesting visit we met more Dabbs Family members than we had ever been with before. This experience was so unusual I could not let it be forgotten. This was a unexpected experience one of those instances where my intuition had brought me to people that I normally would not have had a reason to speak. Records that we were looking at were from a census record, none of this family had taken time to find these records for themselves. Some of these same people had been asked before this day for material, on Dabbs, in their area, none had complied.

Searching in a very remote location in the state of Tennessee we drove into the town of Bells, Crockett County. This was a part of the state that we had spent little time. There were hardly any people to be seen. It was mid-day, the streets were empty, no one around to ask as to the cemetery location. Hours of time of planning was given to our home work, we needed someone who would talk to us. There had been several families, some had lived in this area for three generations. There were some Patterson families that had settled here, some still make this area of Tennessee their homes. There wasn't a library, and no court house. This place was a dud, a waste of time. With what we had put together we were feeling good of our chances of adding another generation on our chart. The next best thing to look for would be the local gathering place. Had we have been there on a Sunday we would have visited the local church. In case you haven't guessed the local cafe or the corner drug store, that's where you will find the people. As it happened there was a small cafe still open, and it was the right time for a meal. Have you ever noticed how the locals in a small town can give you the once over when you enter their territory? This cafe was no exception, we were the new people in town. We just took a seat at the first table that was handy and the waiter was there with a menu. The special of the day looked good no need to look further unless you may be interested in the pies of the day. There weren't many people there was only one other table where several people were seated. While we were having our lunch we reviewed our records, there may have been other ancestors in the files we had overlooked, Bells Tennessee was an important town, Vernelle's mother, Mitty Taylor, was born there in 1895, her father was a farmer. There was a time when the family made a move to Chester County Tennessee. While the family was living there Mittie's aunt, Molly Hill of Houston, Texas, came to Tennessee for a visit. Mittie was about fifteen years old at this time, her aunt persuades her mother to let Mittie go to Houston and live with her. This small town in Tennessee did not have a choice of good schools as those of Houston. After Mittie arrived in Houston she first took a business course and later went into nurse training. She continued to live in Houston. Later she was married and made her home there.

We had a good meal must have taken thirty or forty minutes. We had decided that we would be leaving after lunch, there were other areas in this part of Tennessee on our list that may be of help. We were disappointed not to have found anything. Our time spent here had been a waste. I took the check to the cashier, and while standing there I got the idea that I should speak to the other people who had finished their lunch. They had finished what they had been eating, were sitting at their table talking and enjoying themselves. There were just the four, one man and three women, all middle age or older. I needed to know how to get to the cemetery. As I approached their table the man was watching me, I walked right up to him, pardon me, we are new in your town and wondered if you may tell us how to get to the cemetery? He was very friendly, was curious as to which cemetery we needed to find. There were more than one, we had not known to check earlier, we had assumed there would only be the

one. By trying to help, he asked if there were any particular name or person that we had known who had lived in Bells? We had not given any names to him before now. I was hesitant as to what family to say. The day before we had been in Haywood county, there were some Taylor family members that advised us that we should go to Bells, Crockett County. They also mentioned there was a Mr. Oscar Patterson that lived in Gibson County, if we were to go there it was known he could help us. We had not planned a trip to Gibson County, but it was known that there were some Patterson families who had made Bells their home also. There was a choice of Taylor or Patterson, Taylor's had been here before but they had moved away. There was some question in my mind as to what name to ask for. From the records we were carrying with us it was determined that we should ask about the Patterson's. Well Sir we have records on two families that had lived in Bells, we do have more on the Patterson's than we do on the Taylor's. I could see I had selected the right name, there were some bright faces, you could see their excitement, our selection had hit home. There was no delay the man in the group answered right away, "I am a Patterson, this is my wife and these two ladies are my sisters". What a surprise, the only people we had questioned they all had a Patterson name. Naturally he began to tell how the Patterson's had lived in this area for many years. He wanted to know more and asked if there were any particular families that we may want more information about. Patterson's are Vernelle's families and it had just been the day before when we had learned about the Oscar Patterson that was still living in Gibson County. We shared the story with him about the Patterson we had found out about the day before. The gentleman's face brightened up, he answered very quickly, "I am the Oscar Patterson you had been told to see". This Oscar Patterson was a son of Oscar Patterson who was the brother of Cora Patterson the mother of Mittie Taylor. These people had been in Bells just for the day, they lived in Gibson County. The possibilities of this coincidence, meeting this family of Pattersons was sheer Serendipity. The person we had believed we would not get to see was looking us in the face. Surprises for everyone, we were elated our search had come to an end here in Bells. We had the undivided interest of all four of the Patterson's. Now that we had made a contact we were able to do more than we could have possibly asked for. Oscar had been a family name that had been used for several generations, and names and dates from Oscar were readily available. Talking family with newly located kin is the reward of a genealogical search.

Trips that I have just described above are most unusual. Many of the time we have not been as lucky as we were in these instances. I must mention the importance of planning your search in your own living room. The records you have will multiply as you visit family sites. I continue to expect unusual happenings as I travel. If you have had these type of experiences, I would like to know of them. Books have been written describing some of the same type of events I have had in my Genealogical travels.

I am expecting to hear from some of you. Your input to the club quarterly could expand our present coverage. Articles on Serendipity would be great to publish.

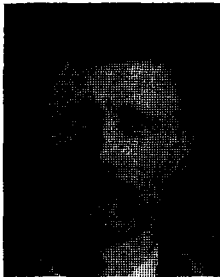

How Did Colonel Wolford Logsdon Get His Unusual First Name?

At a gathering of the grandchildren of Bejure Henderson and Alma Logsdon of Estill County, Kentucky, we pondered the question of why our great grandfather, Colonel Wolford Logsdon, was given his unusual first name. We resolved to find the answer to this question before our next reunion. To do that, we first had to answer two related questions.

Who was the original Colonel Wolford? Why did his parents, John B. and Sallie A. Logsdon, name their son after him?

The answer to our first question was found in *History of Kentucky*, written by Lewis Collins and published in 1882. The two-volume work contains a comprehensive chronology of the annals of Kentucky, where Logsdons have lived since shortly after the Revolutionary War. It contains many references to a Colonel Franklin (Frank) S. Wolford who was the Commanding Officer of the First Kentucky Cavalry Regiment in the Union Army. He was also a staunch Union Democrat, and an effective orator and politician. After reading about the exploits of Colonel Wolford in the *History of Kentucky*, it became clear that he is the namesake of our ancestor, Colonel Wolford Logsdon.

The first reference to Colonel Frank Wolford in the *History of Kentucky* was found in an account of a fierce encounter between Confederate and Union forces near Camp Wildcat, KY. The battle took place at the crossing of three roads leading to Mount Vernon, London, and Richmond, KY where seven thousand Confederate troops, under Brigadier General Zolencoffer, attacked the 7th Kentucky Infantry Regiment. The 1st Kentucky Cavalry, under the command of Colonel Wolford, was among the first Federal reinforcements that rushed to the scene.

The large Confederate force was repulsed after a desperate fight, and Colonel Frank Wolford was on his way to becoming a military hero to the people of Kentucky. The 1st Kentucky Cavalry was in the thick of most of the battles in and around Kentucky during the first two years of the Civil War. Units of the regiment were part of the force that pursued and captured Confederate Brigadier General Morgan and most of his cavalry troops after their raid through Kentucky and Ohio.

Colonel Frank Wolford was an outspoken Union Democrat who became personally entangled in the complicated politics of Kentucky during the tumultuous period of the civil war. He was a popular figure and was widely known both as a military commander and as a politician.

To understand why Colonel Wolford was important enough in the eyes of our great great grandparents to name a son for him, it helps to know something about the Logsdon family during the years before and during the Civil War.

Colonel Wolford Logsdon's father, John B. Logsdon, was born in Kentucky in 1803. He purchased land in Estill County in 1835 and lived there for more than 20 years. In 1858, Jackson County was formed from parts of Estill, Madison, Clay, and Owsley Counties, and John B. Logsdon bought land in nearby Jackson County. He lived there until his death in 1877.

The 1850 Federal Census for Estill County shows John at age 47 married to a cousin, Nancy Logsdon, age 43. At the time of the census there were seven sons and a daughter living in his household. Edward was 21 years old, William - 18, Rufus - 16, Ambrose - 9, Francis - 7, James - 5, and their daughter, Elizabeth was 11 years old.

Several of John's sons served in the Union Army. According to military records, William Logsdon served in the 2nd Kentucky Cavalry, Rufus and Ambrose in the 8th Kentucky Infantry, and Edward in the 32nd Kentucky Infantry. There is some indication that other sons may have served in the Confederate Army, but this has not been confirmed to date.

John Logsdon was nearly 60 years old when he remarried Sallie Ann (Woods) Tucker after the death of his first wife. Their first child, whom they named Colonel Wolford, was born in July 1863 at the height of the civil war. At that time, Confederate troops under General Scott were operating in Kentucky in the area close to the Logsdon's home.

On July 30, there was a sharp skirmish in Estill County to the north. With four sons in the Union Army and a newly born son, John B. Logsdon very likely had strong feelings about the presence of the Confederate cavalry unit operating so close to his home. Naming his new son after a well-known and respected Union military officer in those circumstances was very understandable.

Shortly after the birth of Colonel Wolford Logsdon, the fortunes of Colonel Frank Wolford turned against him, and ran afoul of the military authorities who controlled Kentucky while it was under martial law.

Early in the Civil War, the military Governor of Kentucky declared martial law throughout the state and suspended the rights of "disloyal citizens to vote". According to the *History of Kentucky*, nearly 40,000 citizens of the state were kept from the polls by military intimidation, and the Union Democrats lost the 1863 elections for Governor, Lt. Governor, and all the seats in Congress.

In May of 1864, Colonel Frank Wolford made a rousing, public speech in Lexington, Kentucky after which he was accused by the military Governor of Kentucky of using insulting language towards the President. He was placed under arrest and was relieved of his command. President Lincoln intervened as he was restored to command, only to be arrested three more times for his views.

While awaiting trial on the charge of disloyalty, he uttered a public challenge to his adversaries, "The man dies who stands between me and the polls!" In the end, Colonel Wolford was never prosecuted, and he continued to serve in the Union Army in spite of the efforts of his political enemies.

After the war ended, the Governor of Kentucky appointed Colonel Frank Wolford as Adjutant General of Kentucky and placed him in charge of the state militia. He also served as an elector from Kentucky in several national elections.

We probably will never know all of "the rest of the story" about why John B. and Sallie A. Logsdon named their son after Colonel Franklin S. Wolford. Whether they knew Colonel Frank Wolford personally or only by reputation will probably remain a mystery. In any event, they must have held Colonel Wolford in high esteem to name their son in his honor.

Colonel Wolford Logsdon married Margaret (Peggy) Richardson in 1883. They started their family in Estill County, Kentucky near Jinks where C.W. was a farmer and merchant. The Logsdons moved to Butler County, Ohio in the early 1900s where they raised their 13 children. "Wolf", as he was known to his family and friends, died in 1953 at the age of 90 after a full and productive life.

Please check for alternate spellings. The old hand written records are sometimes difficult to decipher." Common mistakes are w for m, W for M, I for J, n for r, S for L, n for u, and k for h and vice versa.
